Vicar's Letter

Hello Everyone,

In 1985 the film director Philip Groning contacted the Prior of the Grande Chartreuse Monastery, in the French Alps with a request to be allowed to film inside the monastery. Grande Chartreuse is the Mother House of the silent and contemplative order of Carthusian Monks. It sits right in the heart of the Chartreuse Mountains, is home to a community of monks vowed to a life of silence and prayer, and is only accessible by a thirty minute walk from the nearest carpark. When Philip Groning made his request in 1985 the last photos that had been taken inside the monastery were from the 1960's.

Philip Groning's request was met with the response 'it's too early, maybe in ten or fifteen years.' Well it transpires that Philip Groning is a very patient man who was prepared to spend those years establishing and maintaining a relationship with the Prior, while the Monastery pursued its gentle and ancient rhythm of daily life and work. It was out of those long years of trusted relationship and patient waiting that, one day, came the simple message from the Prior, 'now is the time.'

The ensuing film, which was released in 2005, twenty years after its conception, is called, 'Into Great Silence.' It's an almost silent documentary on life in the monastery; there are no interviews, no commentary and the only singing is the chanting of the monks. To watch the film is a meditative experience, which gives a feeling of being a part of life inside the monastery, rather than an observer of another lifestyle.

The history of the making of the film is a story of patience and faith and trust.

Bishop Richard's Prayer Pilgrimage

The bishop's visit will be quite short – around thirty minutes – and it would be lovely if some folks from around the benefice were able to be there to meet and pray with him. Bishop's Letter



Dear Friends

I hope this letter find you well. Firstly, I want to express my thanks for all your support for the ministry in one of our local churches in the Diocese of Hereford. These have been difficult months for all of us. Being out of our church buildings has been especially hard for many. Although we are rejoicing at our return, nonetheless the continued restrictions make this a challenging time.

I have been continually impressed by the creativity displayed over this time. Pastoral care has continued; new people have been contacted, especially through our online services, and the church has demonstrated sacrificial care and love in our communities. Our churches have truly shown what it is to be the body of Christ.

I am hugely grateful for the leadership offered in all this by our clergy and lay volunteers. They have shown clearly that buildings may have been closed but the church has been very much alive.

One of the struggles in this time has been financial. The loss of fee income and fund-raising events mean that many parishes are struggling. People's incomes are under threat if they are in employment. However, many of us find we have saved a lot of money over this period as we've been unable to access our normal social activities.

I am writing to ask you to prayerfully consider participating in our diocesan-wide parish Gift Day. This will be either on Sunday, September 20th or on a Sunday close to that date. In part this will be our response of gratitude to God for his gifts to us. Generosity is part of our response to a loving God. Parish Offer pays for the cost of the ministry so wonderfully demonstrated over these last few months. In most cases, what parishes give is well below these costs and the gap is made up either by the generosity of other parishes, or central reserves. This has been the case for a number of years. COVID has made the situation much worse and our current situation is unsustainable. If it continues, we will be forced into some very difficult choices about ministry provision.

This Gift Day is an opportunity to invite people to give to the ministry and mission at your local church to allow your PCC to have the confidence to make a generous Parish Offer towards the cost of ministry during 2021. hold a Gift Resources support you Day at your church www.hereford.anglican.org/documents/gift-day-guide/ The reverse of this letter gives you more detail about how Parish Offer is used to help towards funding the costs of ministry within your parishes and deanery and throughout the Diocese. I want to reassure you that we run a very tight ship centrally. The vast majority of our costs go towards funding local ministry. Please do join me in praying for the life of our Diocese in the four Saturdays leading up to the Gift Day.



Diocesan and parish finances

In 2020, our Diocese planned a 'balanced budget', with income and expenditure of £5.9m. However, the COVID-19 restrictions have led to a reduction in voluntary income in parishes and, in turn, this has translated into an estimated 15% decline in Parish Offer contributions and a 40% reduction in statutory fee income. This means that, even with 12 diocesan staff furloughed, we are forecasting a full year operating loss of ~£700,000. We pray that through the forthcoming Gift Day in many parishes, PCCs will be able to make good some or all of the reductions in income they have experienced recently and be better placed to renew their Parish Offer commitments this year and next.

Generous giving from PCCs provides £3.8m or 65% of total diocesan income. Every pound of Parish Offer is used to resource our local churches – in fact £4.6m or 78% of total diocesan expenditure is invested in parish ministry & mission. The balance of expenditure is shown in the chart below:



So, what are the costs of Parish Ministry in our Diocese? Perhaps a lot more than many of us realise! In 2020, the total cost of this ministry is around £77,000 per stipendiary clergy post. The Hereford Diocesan Board of Finance covers some £16,000 of this, leaving just over £60,000 for each group of PCCs to provide through their Parish Offer. While this is a significant challenge for many parishes, we are all invited to respond to God in prayer and in faith, and give to parish ministry and mission realistically and generously.



Annual 'current parish clergy' costs comprise £26k stipend, £10k pension contribution, £2k national insurance, £6.5k housing-related costs plus £8k provision of parsonage (met by Diocese), £3k ministry development and training, and £1.5k towards costs incurred by voluntary ministers and rural deans.

Tai Chi

You may have passed the common on a Wednesday morning and wondered why there is a group of people wielding bamboo sticks ... we're certainly not staking tomatoes!

This is just one of the qigong practices we do in our qigong and Taiji class.

With our instructor Jane Fleet, we begin class with a series of qigong movements to regulate the breath, loosen the joints and awaken the qi, followed by learning Sun style Taiji form and then qigong bamboo stick exercises.

All these practices have many benefits, such as reducing stress, improving breathing, balance, energy and flexibility and employ slow movements which are suitable for everyone.

And it's always fun!

What is qigong? Qigong translates as cultivating qi. 'Qi' is energy or life force and 'gong' means to study or cultivate and is achieved with a series of gentle flowing movements which help the qi to flow, the joints to be loosened and at the same time activated.

Taiji is based on qigong and employs similar movements but is a martial art originally developed for self-defence. It is a choreographed set of flowing moves. We practice Sun style and you may have heard of Chen and Yang style too.

The text above has been written by Jane Fleet who is expertly guiding us through the moves she discusses. She has a very mixed bunch of pupils to deal with, which incorporates a wide range of abilities and aged 4 to almost 90. Everyone who is attending the class has been made to feel so welcome and every single one of us is enjoying the class. It has been so good to be able to see and chat to each other, whilst working hard, of course. Self-esteem and morale have been boosted and we are of course much more flexible, well maybe!

During the current strange times we live in, we only meet on the common in fair weather. We also are somewhat confused by the government guidelines as to how many people should be attending. It could be 6, or if a sporting activity, it can be 30 socially distanced people. We are socially distanced by the length of our bamboo sticks! The charge is £5 per class.

The Short but Eventful Life of an African Beetle

There are many species of beetle in Africa. This is the story of *Scarabaeus Currus Germanicus,* Kansas Beige in colour, and quite rare.

I was sent to Lusaka, Zambia in 1971 to run my firm's small office there. In those days, a big advantage of being posted overseas was that one could buy and export a new car free of tax and duty. This provided an exciting opportunity for me to own my first new car. I had been in Lusaka for several months when papers arrived from the shipping company advising that my VW Beetle 1302S had been unloaded at the Mozambican port of Beira. I flew to Salisbury, Rhodesia (now Harare, Zimbabwe) and hitched a lift with friends to the Gorangoza game reserve in Mozambique, famed at that time for its enormous population of elephants. (Sadly, the population was decimated in the subsequent war). Having been chased by several of these magnificent beasts, I bade farewell to my friends and took the short bus ride to Beira, where I presented myself and the papers to the port customs officials. The port of Beira had an extensive system of railway sidings and, in those days, many steam locomotives, so everything was caked in soot, oil, or both. The customs officials studied the papers, frowned in a solemn and dignified fashion and pronounced that they knew nothing of the vehicle under reference. I was naturally dismayed and cast a doleful eye over the acres of sidings surrounding the customs offices. In the distance I could see a solitary jet black mound, about the size of a car. More in desperation than hope, I asked what this might be." Oh", they said, "that's been there for weeks. It's a car that arrived without an ignition key, so we can't move it". The solemn and dignified frowns were replaced by expressions of resignation, rather than enlightenment. Anyway, the customs officers were persuaded to join me in a hazardous expedition over the rail tracks, between the frantic shunting activities. Upon inspection, the black mound did seem to be an example of Scarabaeus Currus Germanicus. (I should point out that, in those days, new cars were shipped in a thick



protective coating of something like candle wax, which was very good at attracting soot). Having convinced the customs officials that this was indeed the vehicle under reference, I discussed with them the problem of gaining access to it. They recommended that I should contact the Beira Mercedes Benz dealer. This yielded amazing results. Within half an hour, a big black Merc. arrived and I was taken to the dealership. I explained the problem and they were keen to help (perhaps mistakenly hoping that I might one day aspire to a Mercedes). They bade me wait a while in a big armchair, with excellent coffee. After about half an hour, a little chap appeared in a flat cap, bearing a leather Gladstone bag. He was of English extraction, probably Cockney, and I thought it wise not to enquire about his career history, or why he ended up in Mozambique. Anyway, we were driven back to the port, where my new friend inspected the black mound and said "No problem, Guv'nor!" He extracted from the Gladstone bag a

welding rod, which he bent into a strange shape and within seconds he had the car door open. The ignition key, as you may have guessed, was in the glove box. I said something along the lines of "What do I owe you, good man?" fearing a massive Mercedes Benz style bill. I was much relieved when he chuckled and said "No charge Guv'nor". By this time it was getting dark and too late to embark on the 1000km drive to Lusaka, so I found a modest hotel in Beira for the night. Having scraped the candle wax and soot from the windscreen of the black mound, I set off early on the long drive at "running-in" speed to Lusaka, arriving, very tired, at about midnight.

The next morning, I rose at about 7.30 to find my faithful domestic helper, Gibson, preparing breakfast as usual. Gibson's breakfasts were unusual, in that they usually included fried onions and sometimes cabbage. The garage led off the kitchen and I opened the door to find the Beetle no longer black but Kansas Beige and spotless. I turned to Gibson to thank him for his splendid early morning cleaning effort and asked how he had removed the filthy black wax. "No problem" he replied, beaming. "I used hot water and lots of VIM!!" On close inspection, I found the car had an unusual finish, featuring rather attractive circular scratch marks all over.......


At that time Sue and I were not married and she was working as a social worker in Salisbury, about 300km from Lusaka. I would drive over for the weekend to see her about once a month. This was a very interesting drive because the road ran through the Zambezi valley. The area was teeming with game and the animals would congregate on the tarmac road at dusk because it retained the day's heat. Returning from one such visit on a Sunday evening at the end of the rainy season (when the roadside grass is dense and about 2m high) I came upon a pride of lions sitting in the road. I should mention at this point that the car windscreen had been shattered by a stone and I had knocked out a small hole through which I could just about see the road ahead. I stopped and waited. Eventually the lions sloped off into the bush and I set-off again. When I had accelerated to about 30mph a large lioness strode out from the roadside grass and I ran straight into her. The impact caused the entire windscreen to fall out and seriously damaged one wing of the car. Sadly, the poor lion was left limping and clearly injured. With nothing between myself and an injured lion, I thought it best to proceed. I reported the accident to the game guards based at the Rhodesian border post and they undertook to find the injured animal. Unfortunately they thought it would probably have to be shot. I took to the road again and it started raining, not English rain, but the African variety which fills a bucket with one raindrop. With torrential rain, no windscreen and only one headlight the remaining 50km or so Lusaka was a challenging drive.

A few weeks later, Sue and I were driving north to Kitwe, on the Zambian "Copperbelt". We had reached Kabwe (formerly "Broken Hill") when we encountered very heavy rain, whilst negotiating a gentle bend at about 60mph. The 1302S version of the Beetle has a 1600cc engine and consequently it is heavy at the back. The car aquaplaned, meaning that the front wheels were not on the road surface, but on a film of water. Consequently there was no steering and after two 360 degree spins we left the road and the car eventually came to rest on its side, having hit a large tree. Fortunately the impact was forward of the dashboard, so Sue and I were OK apart from a few cuts and bruises. The car, however was badly damaged and we made our exit through the rear window, which had fallen out. The wreckage was picked up and delivered to a breaker's yard in Lusaka.

Sadly, after only about six months and 13000miles, Scarabaeus Currus Germanicus erat mortuus.

HENTLAND CHANCEL

Latest news

A month has passed since I last wrote, and wonderful to report, we now have a new chancel roof. The north pitch is tiled with selected stones from the previous cover, so doesn't look really different from how it did before, which is rather sad, but the sparkling new tiles are all laid on the south side which are difficult to see, thanks to trees growing in the church wall bordering Pengethley Park. The scaffolding, which has now been there for over a year, is due to be taken down this week which will enable the French drain to be dug. This will not be easy, because it is a condition of the faculty that it will be dug by hand. Our man is Tim Hoverd of the county Archaeological Department, and he looks as if he would make light of the job, and is able to do the survey required when digging in a churchyard, where graves may be disturbed. Naturally, digging is part of an archaeologist's stock-in-trade, although when you see pictures of the excavations of Tutenkhamen's tomb in the Valley of the Kings in Egypt, Howard Carter who was the mastermind behind the project is immaculately dressed in a white suit topped with a solar topee, and clearly, never turned a sod. That was left to the Egyptians. I shall be interested to see if anything turns up although the drain is only 450mm deep. But there are several headstones close up to the chancel wall, so who knows? Any human remains will be treated with due respect and re-interred.

Inside, Christina has been picking out the florets on the south wall and very pretty it now looks. The Diocesan Advisory Committee are sending a delegation on Wednesday, where the final layout will be discussed and perhaps determined. With the choir stalls removed, the fine tiled floor has been fully revealed and it would be possible to have these professionally cleaned and left exposed by installing folding chairs to replace the choirstalls. Once we had a service of BCP communion after Christmas and it was clear that the stalls had been made to accommodate small trebles rather than modern well-fed adults.

The contractors have told me that they will be finished by the end of August, and with everything cleared away, rebuilding of the Walker organ can start. Fingers crossed, it will be playable for the carol service on the second Sunday in December.

Now that I am filling the garden with shrubs I find that it is more fun to grow annuals in the gaps in between and at the front of borders. By growing annuals I can change the look of the border every season.

Because the shrubs are providing a generally green annuals to provide a real punch of colour. This year I have that have given me plenty of colour and will definitely find a favourites. I have grown mallows before — the lovely pink 'Silver Cup' - but this year I grew *Malope trifida* 'Vulcan'. At only 6 inches tall they are great at the front of the border. The flowers are a stunning electric blue – the same blue as *Echium vulgare* which I have also grown again this year. They look lovely with strong pinks and lime green flowers.

'American Giant' achieved a magnificent ten feet against our sunny front wall and were the subject of much admiration from passers-by. The heads are now drooping but we are leaving them to develop seeds for the birds.

BOOK REVIEW

Brother of the More Famous Jack, by Barbara Trapido

This is the second time I have read this book, and I loved it every bit as much as the first.

Following her successful university interview, 18 year old suburban Katherine finds herself sucked into the large, intellectual, bohemian, socialist-leaning, Guardian-reading, faux-poor, chaotic family of Professor Jacob Goldman. There she encounters open discussions on subjects entirely taboo in her upbringing; natural talent casually accepted as part of their due; and an apparent warm acceptance which fills a gap in her life. But there

is the sense of a family with a deliberate eccentric pose to maintain, and the reader is sucked in along with Katherine:

"She [Jane Goldman] could surely rise to a dishwasher, but she prefers to use her children. She believes that a row of children chopping vegetables is a better thing than a machine."

Katherine is charmed by the erudite discussions that arise casually round the dinner table, and by the nitty-gritty of family life, where babies crawl about at will and pianists are virtuosic amongst the general mess. She is more charmed still by the elder son of the family, with whom she enters into a somewhat submissive relationship, accepting his put-downs and superior manner as her due.

Needless to say the relationship is doomed and she retreats to Rome for several unhappy years to teach English and lick her wounds.

On her eventual return she is welcomed back into the Goldman family fold with open arms. It is interesting to speculate what her role is there – what function she serves for this family; and tempting to think it is not wholly benign; that they enjoy moulding her; that there is an element of abuse of power.

But, in spite of some very sad events and a sense of innocence wilfully trampled, the book is very funny indeed. The humour is witty and slick and irresistible; the Shakespearian references ever present (I am sure I missed many); and the sense of being in the presence of a highly intelligent and accomplished writer with an original voice is all-pervasive.

The title refers to W B Yeats, whose brother Jack was, in their day, the more famous of the two as a painter and Olympic medallist. I can just about see how this relates to the story.

I can highly recommend this book, mainly because of the writing style, which repeatedly catches the reader unawares with its masterly wit.
