#### Vicars' Letters

Hello Everyone, And goodbye everyone.

By the time you are reading this magazine I will be almost retired and on my way to live, with Sean, in Hereford. This has been a strange few months for me. The decision to retire was about being able to offer more care and support to my elderly, and increasingly frail, mother. It was completely devastating for myself and my family when my mother sustained serious head injuries during a fall at home. She was too frail to undergo the brain surgery which may have alleviated her symptoms, and after a couple of weeks it became clear that she was drawing towards then end of her life. And so my retirement will take a rather different pattern to the one I had anticipated.

It's been a pleasure to be here amongst you all over the past five and a half years – to get to know the oddities and quirkiness of the individual churches and their people, to share your traditions and customs, to see the flourishing of occasions such as the All-age service. The past year of lockdown has been testing and wearing for everyone, but out of it community projects have sprung up enabling us all to offer more care and support where it's most needed within our communities. As lockdown draws to its close – with perhaps some toing and froing before we finally reach the end of this dark tunnel – it will be good to see the churches opening up again, with services happening in our buildings and community events taking place.

The end of lockdown will present a new challenge to the churches as you all work together to look at what was good about Zoom & YouTube & recorded services, so that the values gained and lessons learned can be woven together with the more long-standing traditions of the Benefice. #### Letter from Archdeacon Derek Chedzey

Pentecost or more traditionally Whitsun is I think the Cinderella of Christian festivals, it has never really had the impact of Christmas and Easter. It doesn't have the same traditions or social events around it which make it stand out in the wider culture either. I think increasingly the church doesn't really know how to mark the occasion, and even the recent 'Thy Kingdom Come' prayer campaign which has actually taken off across the churches in recent years, doesn't really make much of Pentecost itself. Yet Pentecost is perhaps one of the most exciting of the church festivals for it marks the moment when God started the church! It is in effect the Church's birthday, the day that God sent the Holy Spirit to inspire and empower ordinary Christians to do extraordinary things for Him.

The Holy Spirit is given freely to all of us as a free gift from God. Jesus promised his disciples that we would receive this gift so that we might know his presence with us as we live out our faith on a daily basis.

"And I will ask the Father, and he will give you another comforter to help you and be with you forever— the Spirit of truth. The world cannot accept him, because it neither sees him nor knows him. But you know him, for he lives with you and will be in you..." - John 14:15-16

The problem is when most of us think of comfort we think of the luxuries of life, or being wrapped up in a warm blanket or duvet. We also think of comfort as something that consoles us when we are upset or in need. Whilst all these things are true, the word used in the New Testament has a completely different meaning to those we might expect. The word comfort is the same word that we find in relation to prodding, strengthening or stirring into action. The Bayeux Tapestry has a wonderful panel of Bishop Odo, forcing his men into battle, at the end of his battle club, with the abbreviated Latin words: which when translated means: *Here, Bishop Odo, comforts his troops.* As individuals we might not find such 'comfort' comforting, but the Holy Spirit is given to equip and spur us into action! In fact, the word comfort has traditionally also meant to give or add strength to someone or to encourage, urge or exhort. When we see the coming of the Holy Spirit in that way, it makes much more sense of both Jesus's words and what we see in the book of Acts as the early church begins to emerge.

The Holy Spirit also empowers us to be the people God created and knows us to be, in that sense the Holy Spirit fills us with God's wisdom and power for the tasks to which he has called us. On the day of Pentecost it is the Holy Spirit that takes the group of timid and bewildered disciples and equips them to declare the gospel message. Jesus before his Ascension had promised them that they would receive the Holy Spirit to equip them as His witnesses throughout the world.

"But you will receive power when the Holy Spirit comes on you; and you will be my witnesses in Jerusalem, and in all Judea and Samaria, and to the ends of the earth." - Acts 1:8

This power that comes with the Holy Spirit is very real and is available to us just as it was to the first disciples. It is power to live our lives as God intended, power to encourage us and to strengthen us for acts of service. It is not to make us feel better, or for our own benefit, but it is the power to build one another up and to inspire the Church. So as Pentecost approaches perhaps we need to re-evaluate this slightly misunderstood Christian Festival and celebrate the birthday of the church with a bit more style and flair! Our prayer certainly needs to be 'Come Holy Spirit!'

May the Spirit, who set the Church on fire upon the Day of Pentecost, bring the world alive with the love of the risen Christ. Amen.

It is with great sorrow that we write of the death of Eric Morris, just 15 days after the passing of his beloved wife, Vera. Eric was born at Little Camdore Farm, Orcop on the 1<sup>st</sup> of May1924, one of 12 children born to Frederick and Amy Morris. When Eric was a small child, the family emigrated to Australia, but after only a few years they returned to farm again in Orcop. Along with his siblings, Eric attended Orcop Church and Orcop School. On leaving school, Eric worked on various farms in Dinedor, Cross Ash and Allensmore. Often he would have to cycle to and from work, unless he could get a lift on the back of his brother's motorbike.

Eric and Vera were married at Orcop Church in January 1946 and lived in the village. At this time he was working at Green Farm, Orcop. In 1948 Eric and Vera bought his old home, Little Camdore Farm, and their own farming life began. In 1960 they moved to Moat Farm and later to the bungalow, Moat Villa, in 1980. Eric was a true country person; he enjoyed his weekly trips to market, a Sunday morning pint in the pub and always made new people to the village very welcome.

Eric's motto in life was "You never put off until tomorrow what can be done today". He always said that he was happy with what he had achieved and "If I had my time over again I wouldn't change a thing".

The funeral took place at Orcop Church on Monday 22<sup>nd</sup> March after he took his final journey around Orcop. The family would like to thank all family, friends and neighbours for their kind messages of sympathy, condolence cards and generous donations in memory of Eric.

#### OWL does a Drug Run in Lockdown

When the lockdown was announced in March 2020 and a request was made for volunteers to assist the local surgery at Much Birch to deliver prescription medications, Owl Good Neighbours immediately volunteered their services. The surgery was looking for people under 70 and with a D.B.S. (police check). Unfortunately, many of the Owl volunteers were not under 70, but those who were, were quickly pressed into service. It was agreed with the surgery that we would do a weekly delivery and emergency deliveries as and when the need arose. Being under 70, at that time, I joined in.

I immediately had a vision of happily skipping up to the ideal country cottage surrounded by apple orchards, nice garden and flowers, making friends with the family dog or cat and handing over a package to a grateful

recipient. Another version saw me bravely battling through wind and rain to hand over life-saving drugs just in time.

Reality seldom if ever matches the vision.

We reported to the surgery at the appointed time, and were handed a collection of packages. The label on the package gives the name of the patient and address including the postcode. Never have I valued postcodes as much as I do now. Put the postcode in your satnav and off you go. On arrival at the postcode all you have to do is find the house. This is the theory.

On my first trip I was alone in the car and would like to apologise to anyone who saw me driving along hanging out of the window looking for house names. I soon learned that the satnav version of a destination was very approximate and you have to start looking for the house well before it says, *you have arrived at your destination*, to avoid driving up and down the same stretch of road. Postcodes cover between 1 and 100 houses and in the case of Herefordshire it seems to me several fields.

The next week I made sure to recruit a "spotter" to look for house names. When we first started it was very hot weather and there were lots of people in gardens to ask directions and very few vehicles on the road.

Those were the easy days. You have to be eagle-eyed to spot house names as they can be any here: on the house, the garage, a fence, a separate post, the door, garden wall, roof, and often on a tree. This week I saw a house name on a bicycle permanently parked outside the house. Even when there is a large name plate well placed in a prominent position you can be fooled, for example when at one house the wheelie bin was obscuring the house name. We drove up and down the lane several times until fortunately the lady of the house came to retrieve the bin and return it to its usual spot in the back garden. And there was the house we had been looking for in front of us all the time!!.

Even when you find the house the task continues. We are asked by the surgery to hand over the medication to a responsible person, preferably the person it is intended for. It is not safe to leave it on the doorstep or push through the letter box. A number of houses have large containers outside for parcels, but we cannot leave our packages there. If no-one answers the door we have to shout or search for a live person. Which sometimes results in an interesting encounter. I had no idea so many ladies wore bikinis in the hot weather.

We have a "report form" to complete from the surgery to say if we left the package with a person or not, and if not handed to a person if a note was left and where package and note were left.

For the past year Owl Good Neighbours have delivered medications every week at least once and often more than once a week. We have taken emergency deliveries at short notice. Alongside this service Owl Good Neighbours has done shopping for those self-isolating and given telephone support to those living alone. It seems wrong to say I have enjoyed this most terrible time. However, I think I can say I feel that the Good Neighbour scheme has proved its worth and the members have felt that they are valued to the community. We are looking forward to restarting the monthly community lunches with perhaps a tea party as a first step. Look out for more news about that later in the year. *Jane Rigler* 

# HENTLAND

The restoration of John Pollard Seddon's chancel decoration at St Dubricius' is now done and very beautiful it looks. There will be a period for snags to be dealt with before the final 5% retention will be due, but the final look will be as it is now. If snags do crop up, they are likely to arise from the damp patches which occurred when the eaves were opened up to give access to the back of the decorated frieze, and the protection was dislodged in a gale in Spring last year.

Meanwhile the Walker organ is all but rebuilt and was played for the Pax service on Palm Sunday. Organ builders David and Kevin will be there this week to finish off and with some regulation and tuning to be done, it will be back to its original state of 1869, but for the addition of electric blowing. There will be a recital on Saturday 26<sup>th</sup> June by Anna Lapwood, the first female director of music at an Oxford or Cambridge college,

and frequent presenter on Radio 3. She will be joined by tenor Ruairi Bowen, who is well known to local audiences, though now based in London. More details of timing, tickets and programme will be in the June magazine. *Robin Symonds* 

#### **Book Review**

#### Olive Kitteridge and Olive Again by Elizabeth Strout

Author Elizabeth Strout richly deserves her Pulitzer Prize. *Olive Kitteridge* and *Olive Again* are unique in style and are compelling reading. Set in Maine, US, Olive Kitteridge is a 'character' –somewhat prickly and outspoken, and deeply puzzled by the outpourings of emotion from her fellow citizens-by their lack of self-restraint. So much of what she sees about her seems to her unnecessary and curious; and she does not hesitate to say so.

This is not simply a novel about Olive-it is a series of short stories about the lives of a host of characters, and she barely gets a mention in some chapters. But the ways that she has impinged on the lives of these others, sheds oblique light on who she is.

We first meet her in middle age when she is reaching the end of her career as a college maths teacher. Her kindly, long-suffering mild- mannered husband Henry runs the local pharmacy. Their one son Christopher, has retreated to the other side of the country, where he enters into two marriages in quick succession. His contact with his mother is intermittent and fraught with tension.

The books follow her into old age-Henry dies of a stroke and, to everyone's amazement, she marries Jack, a retired Harvard lecturer who indulges her quirks, but with a little more self-assertion. He ponders the odd behaviours of the human race, reflecting: '..it should never be taken lightly, the essential loneliness of people; that the choices they made to keep themselves from that gaping darkness were choices that require respect.

The theme of ageing underlies the books, and we are treated to Olive's acerbic reflections on that unwelcome process. 'Shrink? Of course you do. Your spine gets crunched up, your belly pops out-and down you go.'

As her life draws to a close, she is no nearer understanding life and herself, 'I do not have a clue who I have been. truthfully, I do not understand a thing.'

#### 37 THE BELL RINGERS

Our church only had two bells, which were hung in the open at the west end of the building. The official bell ringer was a Mr Lowe, who was always reliable and punctual. All he had to do was to pull two ropes alternately and the bells went "Ding Dong, Ding Dong" and then five minutes before the start of the service, just a series of "Dongs". The single "Dongs" were a message to late comers to hurry up as the service was about to start. Mr Lowe failed to arrive one Sunday evening and the Vicar recruited myself and another choir boy to carry out the easy task of calling his faithful flock to the evening service.

Did I say it was easy? Well, you have never heard such a row in all your life for instead of the customary and familiar "Ding Dong, Ding Dong" our peel was of several consecutive "Dings" followed by one "Dong" then a "Ding" and a few "Dongs".

This unusual bell ringing went on with numerous variations for a few minutes, after which came a pause by mutual consent, in order to get our act together and make a new start. After a few mutterings the peal again rang forth, the result being even worse than before as by now we were getting panic stricken. You see, this bell ringing was not carried out in the privacy of a bell tower, but at the west wall of the nave and those of the congregation who had arrived early were staring at us in fascination. To complete our discomfort some of the girls started to giggle.

We never did get the hang of this simple task.

Of course the choir boys thought that our performance was hilarious and one of them had the cheek to ask the vicar if we could ring the bells every Sunday. The vicar told him not to be unkind and that we had done our best, but we were never asked again to deputise for the absent bell ringer.

Only a small congregation attended that Sunday evening because of the fear that the bell ringer had gone mad.

#### Wildlife in our Garden

The squirrels have become very skittish – even more than usual if that's possible.

Maybe it's because it's mating time. Or maybe it's because they're so well fed on all the food we put out for the birds. They do seem to be in pairs now. They chase each other about, up and down trees at high speed. They've also taken to teasing the cock pheasant that comes into the garden nearly every day. He enjoys the seeds we put out on the low wall, for the small birds really, and is in competition with the squirrels. They tolerate each other up to a point, but occasionally a squirrel will lunge at the pheasant, turn tail and dash off before it can retaliate. The pheasant does not appear to be particularly bothered by this behaviour but just returns to feeding. (Those of you brought up on Beatrix Potter stories may be put in mind of Squirrel Nutkin and Old Brown.)

Talking of mating behaviour, one of our resident song thrushes has been singing its heart out the last three weeks. For a while it seemed to be performing all day from dawn to dusk so that it could not have had time to feed, no doubt making sure of its territory and showing off to any potential mate. Is it only the male who sings like this, or do females do it too?

The birds that come regularly to the feeders or onto the grass below have not changed much: tits (blue and great), sparrows, chaffinches and dunnocks every day, greater spotted woodpeckers most days. The jay returned briefly at the end of February and again at the end of March. In April so far we have had two goldfinches on the nyjer seeds on 4th but they've not returned and a greenfinch briefly on the mixed seeds on the 7th, the day I'm writing.

We were delighted and a bit surprised that a robin is building a new nest in our potting shed. Last year a pair of robins raised a family in the same shed in a different corner but the young were taken by a weasel before they could fledge. We wish them better luck this year, whether the same or a different pair.

In the warm weather just before Easter I thought I could hear a chiff-chaff singing in the wood that abuts the bottom of the garden. What made me unsure was that it only seemed to sing a repetitive chiff, chiff, chiff chiff.....but no chaff. This went on for too long to be a thrush. I don't know what else it could have been. Perhaps one of our readers could enlighten us?

We have one more question for any knowledgeable enough person: there are some bees (well they look like small bees) at this time of year (April) that for several years running appear to have emerged from the ground under a patch of lawn. They are about 15 mm long and of relatively slim build like a honey bee, not rounded like a bumble. They have hairs on their thorax. They have three white patches, one on each side of the thorax and one on the front of their heads. Otherwise they are, as far as I can see, quite black. They fly around about 5 cm above the ground but I cannot see them feeding on anything. Can anyone tell us what they are? *John Oubridge.* 

#### **Garden Notes**

I don't know whether it is because we have been leading such a quiet life for the past year, but this year I want the garden to be filled with colour, really strong colour. And when I say colour, I mean orange. Lots of it. I want to open the curtains in the morning and say 'Wow!'

Orange is a bit like Marmite – you either love it or hate it. I love it (I love Marmite too) but have generally avoided it because it can look dreadful next to pinks and pale lilacs. I have been removing many of my older perennials which are no longer performing very well and I have been planting shrubs. I now have an opportunity to fill the spaces in between with masses of summer colour.



The greenhouse is filling up with tiny seedlings which promise me orange in abundance. There are the *Rudbeckia hirta* 'Rustic Dwarfs' that I grow every year; there are orange snapdragons (*Antirrhinum* 'Overture Deep Orange') and red and orange snapdragons ('Maryland Flamingo'); there are Mexican sunflowers (*Tithoni rotundifolia* 'Fiesta del Sol') and California poppies and there are African marigolds ('Elevate Orange'). When I venture out to a garden centre again, I will be looking for *Helenium* 'Moerheim Beauty' or 'Sahin's Early Flowerer' – such good flowers for late summer.

As a contrast and to calm down all that flaming orange, I am growing *Salvia farinacea* 'Seascaped mixed' – a mixture of blue and white. There will be other blues - the pretty blue of hardy geraniums such as 'Rozanne' and a friend has offered me some delphiniums. I will be looking for other blue flowers to add to the show – other Salvias, perhaps *Salvia patens*. Agapanthus look wonderful with orange flowers too, especially the stronger blue ones, so perhaps one of those in a pot.

There will be white flowers too - last year I collected seed from *Echinacea purpurea* 'White Swan' and these have germinated well. This is such a good Echinacea with its pure white downswept petals and its beautiful spiky cone centre. In this garden it comes back reliably every year, its only fault being that it disappears completely in winter and I always worry about standing on the emerging shoots when I weed the border in spring.

Lime greens are wonderful with blue and orange and the obvious plant to provide that is good old *Alchemilla mollis* which I have plenty of here. Euphorbias are the other obvious choice, not a plant I am particularly fond of but I might just be tempted to plant one and see if I can grow to love it.



As we cautiously emerge from lockdown and start to lead more normal lives, I won't need to venture out and about in search of excitement – it will all be happening here in the garden. Hidden behind our huge front hedge will be a garden chock full of eye-popping colour. The flowers will be having their own party and I will be joining them...

An Unexpected Find

I was walking with a friend in the wood above our house, on the east-facing slope of Garway Hill. We had reached the topmost corner, just where the wood abuts onto the common. The ground was covered with the green of the bluebell leaves, yet to flower, with occasional clumps of lovely white wood sorrel flowers, and a lot of tree debris after the winter.

A flash of colour in the gloom caught my eye - an unexpected blue. Could it be the first bluebell, in the middle of April? Surely not!

We got down on hands and knees, to have a closer look. A tiny, dainty flower, sky-blue fading to white at its centre, with six petals and a reddish stem, supporting 2 long, pointed leaves, and with its face pointing upwards to the sky.

Definitely not a bluebell. I had never seen anything like this in the wood before.

At home, we got out the wildflower reference books, searched the internet, and consulted knowledgeable friends.

Is it? - could it be? - yes, it's a chionodoxa!

Having done a bit more searching, I now know how to pronounce it, but only with an American accent. Chionodoxa, I found, comes from the eastern Mediterranean area, particularly Crete, Cyprus and Turkey. The long name comes from the Greek, meaning 'Glory of the snow', which I think is lovely, and refers to its habit of growing high in the mountains and flowering just as the snow starts to melt in the spring.

So how, I wonder, did this little beauty find its way to the top of the wood, at least a quarter of a mile from the nearest garden, and quite different from cultivated varieties? It just goes to show how wonderful the natural world is, how strong the life force, and how rules, even in nature, are made to be broken!
