Dear Readers

As you will know, our vicar Elizabeth retired at the end of April, and we wish her and Sean well in their new home.

Our little group of parishes now enters a slightly uncertain time. Unlike previous times when a vicar has retired, it is unlikely that there will be a new person appointed just to our group. Probably the clergy who cover the rest of our Deanery—that large area which extends from south Hereford right down to Monmouth, and across to Weston-under Penyard-- will be spread a little more thinly, and work across boundaries more than they have done in the past.

But, surprisingly, Covid had given us a silver lining to that cloud, because in this last year, when we have not been able to meet together in our church buildings, we have all developed other ways of coming together, and we are well-prepared for being short-handed now. We have all got a lot better at making the most of the remarkable advances in technology, particularly using Zoom and YouTube to share a service, and it has been such a joy to see 40-plus people gathering from their sitting rooms, sometimes coffee cup still in hand! Someone said to me the other day—'it makes you realise that church is not the building—it is the people!' Covid Vaccine Update

74% of patients have now received their 1st dose and 52% patients have had both doses of the vaccine. All patients aged 50 and over who had their first dose Covid vaccine through the practice should have had their 2nd dose by the end of May. If any patients have not and they had their first dose either at the practice or the Larruperz centre in Ross on Wye, please contact the practice as soon as possible.

All further vaccines for under 50's should be booked through the National Booking Service online https://www.nhs.uk/conditions/coronavirus-covid-19/coronavirus-vaccination/book-coronavirus-

vaccination/ or by phoning 119.

Covid Vaccine 'Passports'

The practice is unable to provide evidence of Covid vaccine status. For patients wishing to demonstrate their Covid vaccination status, proof of vaccination is available on the NHS App. The NHSapp can be downloaded from the relevant App store for iphone or android devices. For patients who are unable to use the app, call the NHS helpline on 119 and ask for a letter to be posted to you. This must be at least 5 days after you've completed your course of the vaccine, the letter may to take up to 5 days to reach you.

Access to appointments

The practice has been open throughout the pandemic and we are now busier than ever. It may take longer to get an appointment than normal but if you have an urgent matter the GP will speak to you on the day you phone. Appointments are either telephone consultations, video or face to face. Many patients have found remote consultations have worked well throughout the pandemic. The GP or nurse is able to take a full history, arrange any preliminary tests, e.g. blood tests and follow up with the patient with the results. If the GP decides on speaking with the patient that it is necessary to see them in person, a face to face appointment will be arranged, often on the same day. Patients are also able to book face to face appointments in advance if they prefer however, for a routine face to face appointment there may be a wait of 2 to 3 weeks.

For those patients with internet access Online Consultations is another way to obtain advice. Follow the Online Consultation link from the practice website home page. Many conditions are covered and if further clinical advice is required the GP receives a request to respond.

If the GP has requested an appointment they will determine its urgency and inform the receptionists. If you require a medication review and it is not booked before your medication runs out, you will not go without. The GP will be happy to issue another prescription if they can see an appointment in the diary. Please rest assured that everyone is working extremely hard to maintain services and prioritise access to GP's and nurses. We appreciate your continued support and understanding.

The next service will be at 11am on Sunday 13th June and will be taken by the Rev Brian Phillips. An old friend of Orcop, Brian can be relied upon to come up with new, stimulating and often amusing interpretations of traditional themes and stories.

Arrangements are progressing for ORCOP PLC (Post Lockdown Concert) and a date has now been fixed, Saturday 11th September, subject of course to restrictions being lifted as anticipated. Peter Morris

It is with deep sadness that I write that our dear Dad (Peter Morris of Belle Vue, Garway Hill) passed away suddenly at QE Hospital on 9th April. He was laid to rest on 30th April at Orcop Church, reunited with our dear Mum. The following is the eulogy that was read by Reverend Mark Johnson at the service.

I only had a few chances to meet with Peter, but in talking with his daughters, Hayley and Joanne, I have a picture of a man who had farming blood running through his veins, was kind, caring, wise and rooted to the Herefordshire soil. He, as you may well remember, suffered with Jo and Hayley, the loss of Hazel in 1995.

Peter was born in January 1941, one of four children, but only three survived to adulthood. He was born at the family farm of Belle Vue, high on Garway Hill, a beautiful but sometimes unforgiving landscape that played a major part in his life. He went to the local school at Garway until his was about 15, when he left to work on various farms and eventually also to work for the Forestry Commission.

Peter met Hazel via Young Farmer dances. They were introduced by Hazel's sister Marion and her then boyfriend Douglas, who was also a cousin to Peter. They started courting in 1962 and were married at Tidenham Church in March 1966, near Chepstow, as that was where Hazel's family lived.

They lived at Old Hall in Orcop for a while and then moved to Dellburn at St Weonards where Hayley, the first of their two children was born. In 1970 the arrival of Jo completed the family and they moved back to Belle Vue and re-established the connection with Garway Hill.

There is no doubt that farming is hard work, but Peter applied himself with all the energy he could muster, and helped by Hazel, a growing Hayley and Jo, when she was not sitting in the field eating fresh cut swede, they would raise calves from the market, sheep and lambs, a bit of veg and, especially for Christmas, chickens, turkeys and geese.

Hayley and Jo followed in Dad's footsteps going to Garway Primary and then to Kingstone before heading out to work, and eventually finding other halves and having their own children.

Meanwhile, Peter and Hazel had the chance to manage a farm just by Kington Golf Course, so they let the land, converted Belle Vue into a holiday home and moved out to the farm there. It was a chance for Peter to flex his farming muscles and one he enjoyed. Unfortunately, after only a few years there, Hazel was killed in a car crash. It was something that shook the family to the core, as these things do, but they managed to find the strength to pull through, with the help of family and friends. Peter stayed at Kington until he retired at 65, moving back to Belle Vue in 2006.

While up at Kington, he met Mel a few years after Hazel's tragic death. Mel was from Liverpool and on holiday in a local cottage. They hit it off and started to accompany each other to events and on holidays, though Mel bought her own place in Kington. They enjoyed holidays in the UK, Cornwall, Devon, Wales, and loved going to National Trust places, and had a great fondness for Powys Castle.

Mel was diagnosed with cancer and Peter became her main carer, especially over the last 12 months. Mel died in 2018.

After Mel's death, Peter busied himself around the hill at Garway. He would go out pretty much every day to have a look around the common and meet up with farmers and locals, chat away and find out the latest gossip – or farming information as he would classify it.

He had a fall in March on the hill and had to be helped home. This set off a tragic train of events, with chances missed and the reason for the fall going undiagnosed that led to his sudden death. Although the family did have the chance to be with him in those last hours, it was not the way they wanted to say goodbye.

Peter will be remembered by all of us as a kind and gentle man. He never had a harsh word for anyone. He took the adage that if you have not anything good to say, do not say anything at all. He was a much loved Grampy to Sophie, Hazel, Paige and Yasmin. He loved to see his girls flourish, enjoying their success, and no doubt, worrying over them as any grandfather would. He had that wonderful ability to turn his hand to anything, from putting up fencing to fixing a plough, to restarting a tractor. Farmers become Jack of all trades and Peter was no exception.

He will be greatly missed for his knowledge and his love, for the care he extended to family and to friends, and our community will remember him for years to come.

TRETIRE WITH MICHAELCHURCH AND PENCOYD

Another month of lockdown has passed, and gradually some degree of normality in our lives is returning. I expect, like us, you have been pleased to welcome friends and family into your garden, and shared a socially distanced cup of tea or coffee with them, though our garden is not looking quite as inviting as it usually does at this time of year, because of the precautions we have had to take covering tender plants up from frost, or in some cases, unsightly victims we neglected to cover.

At last we have been able to have two evening services in Pencoyd church;

One on the evening before the Duke of Edinburgh's funeral, led by our church warden, Elizabeth Malcolm, with quiet respect, giving thanks for the life of Prince Phillip. Between them, they will be able to enlighten us on various aspects of the future of our benefice. So, if you are keen to know more about the future of our parish of Pencoyd and Tretire with Michaelchurch, I recommend you come to this meeting which is open to everyone in the benefice, and promises to be informative.

We have been delighted to remain in regular conversation by phone or Zoom with our friends, Peter and Liz Everall, as I know many of you are. Last week they were able to show us the beautiful oak corner cupboard they have bought for their dining room, on which they chose to spend the cheque to which many parishioners and others contributed. It's so lovely to think they have found something they are really pleased with, to remind them of all their friends back here in P, T and M.

I know many people miss them as do we, and especially at annual events like the next one coming up in June, the Midsummer service at Michaelchurch. In the last few years especially, Peter, with his Trio Giovedi provided the musical accompaniment for the hymns at that service, as of course there is no electricity in the church there. This year the service is to be held on Sunday June 20th at 6.00 pm, gathering outside afterwards (weather permitting) for a chat and a drink together.

The next event in our parish is on the very next evening, when we are breaking with T and P tradition and making a bid to shake off the Lockdown Blues, by holding a celebratory barbeque, kindly hosted by John

I had to find Elizabetta da Gambarini on Google; she was English, a mezzo soprano who composed for harpsichord and organ and died in London in 1765 at the age of 34. Another is African-American H T Burleigh (1866-1949) best known for his arrangements and popularisation of spirituals. Florence Price (1887-1953), also African-American was a versatile singer, teacher, organist and composer whose symphonies were performed by major orchestras. Anna will be joined by tenor Ruairi Bowen who will be singing some songs by English composers. It all sounds pretty exciting! *Robin Symonds*

Church Access



St. Catherine's Church in Hoarwithy is without doubt one of the most unusual churches in Herefordshire with its impressive Italianate Romanesque architecture and decor. It enjoys a commanding spot on the side of a steeply rising hill in the village, ensuring that not only is it visible from many vantage points, but

also providing magnificent views across the Wye valley from the cloisters on the side of this beautiful building.

The downside of its position is the access. A steep and long path up from the roadside, to the church entrance, is difficult to climb for all but the very fittest. The impact of this has been significant, not least of which is the inability of our villagers to be able to worship there, or for many other events to be held successfully. Without disabled access, the opportunity to be competitive in attracting national grants to fund desperately needed restoration work is all but impossible. There is no doubt that the long-term usability and therefore sustainability of the church is under threat if access to it is not improved. With lack of use comes lack of revenues and funds, lack of local and wider support for grants and funding, and ultimately the threat of its closure. Put simply - use it or lose it.

At the beginning of 2021 Cedar Rise, the wooden bungalow that sits below St. Catherine's church, was put up for sale. After much discussion within the PCC and Hereford Diocese, and wider consultation across the community it was agreed to put an offer in for its purchase. This would be to provide much needed disabled access to the church and some degree of parking. We are delighted that our offer was accepted and our excitement is being contained whilst we go going through the legal processes and surveys. We should know the results of these in the coming weeks, hopefully then leading to its purchase by the PCC.

There is no doubt this is an enormous step of faith by the church and the village as they look to make St. Catherine's more accessible, and leave a legacy for generations to come that helps secure the future of one of the most spectacular churches in our part of the country.

We will keep you updated as to the next steps in the coming months. You will be unsurprised to hear we will be asking for help with this project as we move forward! We are already hugely encouraged by the pledges and offers of help by the village, and would ask that you would pray for guidance and wisdom for the Hentland & Hoarwithy PCC as we prepare to take this project on.

Book Review

Cry the beloved country Alan Paton

What a book. It is not surprising that Paton credits it with having provided him with a lifelong income, so great was its popularity and justifiably so.

Set in 1950s South Africa, the novel takes us on a journey with elderly village pastor Stephen Kulamo to the city of Johannesburg in search of his young sister Gertrude and her son, and of his own son, and only child, Absalom. Both had ventured into the city as an escape from village poverty, seeking the opportunities they dream will confront them upon arrival in the promised land. Nothing has been heard from either for several years. It is a journey that takes Kumalo into an alien world of crime, corruption temptation and fear, and challenges his strength and his faith.

We are deep into the era of apartheid and of simmering rebellion from the black population. As black Johannesburg priest Theophilus Msimangu says to Kumalo; 'I see only one hope for our country, and that is when white men and black men, desiring neither power nor money, but desiring only the good of their

country, come together to work for it'. He was grave and silent, and then said sombrely, 'I have one great fear in my heart, that one day when they are turned to loving, they will find we are turned to hating.'

Black and white tiptoe about one another, moved by both hatred and humanity and trust and fear. Neither community is free; both are locked in an unequal interdependence.

The realities that face Kimalo in his quest are painful indeed, but small glimmers of hope are to be found in a few white people who speak out and seek to do right, and in those black workers who struggle against the temptations on the city; who strive to resist the hatred that stirs them and the material rewards of a life of crime.

Central to the narrative is the killing of a young white husband and father, whose writings reveal his profound sense of injustice at the status quo and responsibility towards the black population. He hones in on the central moral dilemma of the whites: 'we believe in help for the underdog, but we want him to stay under. And we are therefore compelled, in order to preserve our belief that we are Christian to ascribe to Almighty God, creator of heaven and earth our own human intentions. The truth is that our own civilisation is not Christian; it is a tragic compound of great ideals and fearful practice of high assurance and desperate anxiety, of loving charity and fearful clutching of possessions.'

Such universal truths litter the pages of this book. It is a heartfelt cry for his 'Beloved Country' that has echoes in all countries and in all times. It is a profoundly moving book that holds human motivations up to scrutiny, but in a gentle and forgiving way. It is not just a story from the past; it is about us and our lives. *Hilary Smallwood.*

Childhood memories

TED'S TALE No. 25 Recollections of a Derbyshire Lad

Oakey-Pokey Nettle Day

According to the history books, sprigs of oak were worn to mark the restoration of Charles II on 29th May 1660. Since that year, 29th May became known as oak- apple day and many people wore oak apples or oak leaves to commemorate Charles II having hid in an oak tree in 1651 to escape the soldiers of Oliver Cromwell. This followed the Royalist defeat at the battle of Worcester. Although this old custom seems to have died out, many people still wore oak apples or leaves in the nineteen twenties, particularly school children.

I am not sure how nettles became part of the act. Probably it was a local variation of the old custom, but I do know that its observance provided the boys with a bit of fun in the days when entertainment was not "laid on ", as it is today. Self-appointed enforcement officers in the form of small boys armed with nettles patrolled the village and threatened to sting anyone not wearing oak apples or leaves. At least, that was the general idea. It did no always work out happily, as certain individuals failed to cooperate and seemed to object to being stung.

A few, who had little knowledge of history, cared little for old customs and possessed no sense of humour, were apt to get a bit "shirty" and threatened the public spirited officers with a clip round the ear. Consequently, truculent looking individuals were given a wide berth and sadly (but prudently) only grown-ups known to be of tolerant nature, smaller boys and some girls were persuaded to wear oak leaves or be stung. Gathering nettles and carrying them about inevitably resulted in the enforcement officers themselves getting stung. In fact, if there was nobody else to sting, they stung each other.

At the end of the day this loyal and gallant band arrived home with bumps all over their arms, legs and faces. A resolution not to take up this important duty in future was forgotten during the ensuing year and the next oak apple day was observed in the same way and with the same painful results.

The custom of stinging anyone not wearing the traditional commemorative emblem on Oakey-Pokey Nettle Day continued until the noble enforcement officers grew older and learned more sense, thus realising that less painful forms of entertainment were available.

Wildlife in our Garden

There have been two surprises for us this month: the appearance of some redpolls and finding an antler in the garden, down near the stream.

The antler was just lying there, in a bit of long grass under a sumac tree (coincidentally, also known as the Stag's Horn Sumac). It seems quite large to us, actually 20 inches (50 cm) long with 4 main branches and a few little knobs on it. It is quite intact with no marks of any chewing by any predator. We assume it is from a roe or fallow stag. We would love to know how it got there. Again we assume a stag was passing through the garden when it just happened to drop off! Is that what happens, or do they have to rub it against a tree when the time comes to grow new ones? We found no sign of rubbing. It also raises the question of why we don't see them often when we're out on walks, just lying about? If some animal or person brought it in, why would they? Unless of course, someone brought it in as a hoax and are now reading this, chuckling at our expense!



The other surprise, the redpolls, three of them, appeared on the seed feeder on 20th April. They stayed around for a couple of hours, returning to the feeder frequently. We have not seen them since. Our books say they are resident, here and in Scandinavia, but they are not often seen on our garden feeders. Perhaps the cold north wind we have had for much of April has had something to do with it.

Earlier in the month a pied wagtail appeared for several days running, always walking about on the same bit of lawn, the bit where the bees I described last month were flying round. I never saw it catch one, but I can't help thinking it was drawn there by their movements. Also earlier in April the blackcaps were singing regularly around the garden, but they have gone quiet again since we've had the cold wind. We have got a pair of greenfinches and a pair of goldfinches feeding regularly from the mixed seeds now. The latter have so far completely ignored the nyjer feeder! The robin's eggs in the potting shed have hatched and a robin is going in regularly with food. So far, so good. On 4th May we spotted, for the first time this year, some swallows flying over the garden (but they're always later here than in other places near us) and a spotted flycatcher. Also on the same day blackcaps began to sing again; all these in spite of a continuing cold north wind.

As far as mammals are concerned, the moles have gone underground. We spotted a full sized hedgehog wandering about in broad daylight on 26th April, but it soon disappeared into the hedge. The squirrels continue to pester the cock peasant, one running up to it and giving it a sharp push on the chest. The

pheasant remains dignified at first, appearing to ignore the insult, but then haughtily struts off and finds a quieter place to feed. *John Oubridge, 3 May 2021*

Garden Notes

I am sure that we are no different from many couples; when it comes to practical DIY tasks in the garden, I am of the opinion that if a job is worth doing it is worth doing well, whereas my husband tends to feel that if something is performing its assigned role then it doesn't really matter too much what it looks like. Sound familiar?

With a new canine addition to the household I have become even more anxious that our precious little poppets remain safely in the garden and don't have any opportunity to escape to go off on an adventure together. They have easy access to the front and side gates and although couriers are generally very careful, just occasionally a gate is left open. There is that sudden heart-stopping moment when I notice and rush round trying to locate the dogs. The solution was to erect a low fence across the garden to separate the front garden from the side and back. We erected a temporary wibbly wobbly fence of chicken wire with a gate borrowed from the puppy pen. It is not beautiful, but it has given me peace of mind, so much so that we have decided to make it a permanent feature, replacing the chicken wire with something more attractive.

We investigated various fences, looking into both split chestnut paling and metal railings. The chestnut palings are beautiful if a little expensive but the main problem was the three-month waiting period. We have opted for metal railings instead. We have replaced the puppy pen gate with a simple black metal arch with double gates and flanked by plain metal trellis with gothic arched tops. Down at the local garden centre we bought panels of metal railings – very smart, easy to install and almost perfect. I say almost perfect because each panel, although otherwise plain, has the additional decoration of three fleur de lys. Just as we were about to install them, much to my husband's dismay, I had the collywobbles. "They are just not right. I know they will do the job, but I think I might grow to hate them." Groans from my lovely long-suffering husband.

We started our search again. Within a couple of minutes searching on-line I located railings in Lincolnshire that were the same make as our Gothic arched trellis panels and matched exactly. The fleur de lys panels are going back to Millbrook garden centre tomorrow (they are very obliging) and the replacement panels are due for delivery in the next day or two. That's better. Job done. *Julie Davies*
