Dear Readers

You will be reading this on or about the 1st of March, which is St David's Day, the patron saint of Wales. When my little Welsh nieces were at primary school, 20 years ago, they always had to be dressed up in traditional Welsh costume for the day, complete with tall black hat and apron. Back then, it was always in doubt as to whether the daffodils, national flower of Wales, would be in flower in time to be worn as part of the celebrations. In the first week of February this year, my family and I had a few days' holiday in South Wales and saw daffodils in all their sunshine glory at every turn. It was lovely to see them, and to feel that maybe the worst of the winter is over. But at the same time, it is worrying. Recently, a Cambridge research time reported that plants in the UK are coming into flower up to a month earlier than in past years. This is of concern in case a late frost kills blossom and prevents plants from setting fruit, for example, endangering farmers' livelihoods and our food sources. Even more importantly, it may create an 'ecological mismatch', where host plants, and the insect and bird life which they normally support, fall out of time with each other, so that there is nothing for the creatures to eat when they need it most. This could result in entire species being at risk if they are not able to adapt rapidly enough. Great efforts are being made by our government, and by the energy industry to limit the extent of global warming, but it is up to us to all do our best to help. Although we may individually feel powerless to make a difference, if we all turn the heating down, put on another jumper, economise on car journeys and air travel, we can make a difference. St David was famous for his asceticism, and living in a very simple manner. When he came to the end of his life, he is remembered for saying this: 'Be joyful, keep your faith, and do the little things you have seen me do.' Perhaps we can all do those little things, and it will help to make a difference to our world. Frances

Firstly, a big thank you to those subscribers who have already paid and a gentle reminder to those who have yet to do so.

Under the magazine constitution, 50% of the annual profit goes to the St. Weonards Benefice (£1000).

The monthly process of compilation, editing, word processing, printing, binding and distribution is fairly complex, but it runs smoothly (usually!) and it is appropriate to acknowledge the efforts of all involved and thank them for ensuring that your copy reaches you each month. The distributors deserve particular mention, as they receive no boot allowance (or any remuneration at all!) but are out each month, whatever the weather. Apart from subscriptions, the magazine relies for its profitability on advertising. 
Britain's biggest rural film festival comes to Garway Hall this March with two unmissable films.

ORCOP

On 9th February the Orcop Parochial Church Council (PCC) met for the first time since June 2021. The main item for discussion was the future of Orcop Church, in the absence of an incumbent vicar. We have been fortunate in recent months in being able to resume 11am communion services on the second Sunday of each month, thanks to Bishop Anthony Priddis and the Revd Crispin Pemberton kindly agreeing, on a temporary basis, to take these services. The regular congregation attending these services was in decline before the pandemic, which has hastened this process to the point where it is rare for the congregation to reach double figures. This is not a sustainable situation. The current arrangements will continue for the time being but will end in the coming months and we do not anticipate the appointment of a new vicar. The Diocese is undertaking a consultation process on reorganisation, but it will be some time before the outcome of their deliberations is known. Meanwhile, the PCC has an outline proposal as to how we might proceed, and the intention is to seek the views of all parishioners on this before putting it to the Diocese. A letter will be circulated in the coming weeks inviting your views on the future of your church.

We recently received, via the Parish Council, an enquiry from one Kurtis Gale, whose Great Grandfather's brother, George Benjamin Gale, was a school master at Orcop School. He was seeking any light we could throw on this item of family history. He died in 1923, aged only 33. Not only were we able to identify his grave in Orcop Churchyard, but we also have in the church a stone plaque that was erected in his memory by his grateful students. This was rescued from the school when it was converted for residential use and has been in the church since then. Photos of both the grave and the plaque were sent to Kurtis.

TRETIRE WITH MICHAELCHURCH AND PENCOYD

Services on the first Sunday of the month have continued to be held on Zoom by Frances Phillips and are always well attended. But cautiously, we are returning to holding other services in our churches, and on January 20th, Rev. Mark Johnson kindly agreed to lead a service of Evening Prayer at St Mary's Tretire. We did wear our face masks, and there was no singing, but Mark provided music on his phone at various points during the service. It was so good to share worship together in that familiar setting, with some small degree of normality. The church was looking beautifully clean after a small band of ladies had tackled it the previous day. The task has become considerably easier since the roof was repaired, and there are no longer falls of plaster every time a wind gets up!

At our PCC meeting on Feb 1st, it was decided that we would continue to muster a team of cleaners for St Mary's before future services, as it made the task far less onerous than it has been for single person in the past. So, on the premise that "many hands make light work" and do cut down the cleaning time dramatically, if any of our villagers would like to offer help on a cleaning team in the future, do please contact Elizabeth Malcolm on 01989730201 or me on 01981580233. We would most appreciate your help. We will however, continue to keep the flower arranging rota as it is at Tretire. Even though our services are less frequent, I am assured by relatives visiting family graves in our churchyard that they do often slip into the church afterwards and really appreciate seeing fresh flowers in there.

At the PCC meeting it was also agreed that, as there would not be a Palm Sunday walk in the St Weonards Benefice this year, those who would like to may join parishioners from the Wormelow 100 Group on a walk on Palm Sunday from Pencoyd to Llanwarne, led by Rev Mark Johnson. The walk begins at Pencoyd church after a short service at 10.00, when palm crosses would be blessed and distributed. There would be a couple of stops on the route to Llanwarne where a hymn will be sung, and the expected arrival time at Llanwarne is 11.00 am. There will then be a service of Holy Communion at Llanwarne church. I understand that lunch will


be served at Llanwarne Church Hall after the service, but people will need to book for that. Details of that will be in the Wormelow 100 magazine.

Well behaved dogs will be welcome on the walk, and Rev Mark will welcome them in the church. It is hoped that a couple of Shetland ponies may accompany the walk in lieu of a donkey!

If you would like to take advantage of that, or would be able to offer transport yourself, please let Elizabeth know. If you have time to take a detour to Tretire church in the next week or so, the snowdrops are an absolute picture, and we will soon be moving into primrose time, again worth a detour. Before we know it, it will be time to start mowing again! We are so fortunate at Tretire to have a dedicated band of ladies who clean the inside, and a willing gang of mowers and strimmers for the churchyard. Wildlife in our Garden

In January we were favoured by visits from two more bird species. On 9th a family of long-tailed tits appeared fairly briefly on the low wall where we put out seeds each morning. I counted nine of them.



Long-tailed tits are not really closely related to other tits. They behave in quite distinctive ways. Their family life is especially remarkable as they seem to stay in extended family groups throughout their lives. They go about their feeding area together, staying only a few minutes in one place, then moving on. They remain close, both literally when they huddle up on the same branch at night and presumably help to keep each other warm, and also in the sense that they look after one another. For example, if a father bird dies its brother will step in

to help the mother look after her brood by helping her fetch food and keep them warm. Their nests are roughly spherical but elongated from top to bottom with a domed roof and a hole in one side, windproofed with leaves, moss, and lichen, stuck together with cobwebs and comfortably lined with feathers. From the January 18th till early February a marsh tit, which could have been a willow tit (they look the same to us amateurs) visited the low wall nearly every day.

We were rather pleased to be able to include it in our count when we took part in this year's Big Garden Birdwatch. I wonder how many of our readers also take part? If you are a member of the RSPB, you will certainly have heard about it. It is not very difficult. You just have to allocate one hour of your choice during the last weekend of January. The most difficult part we find, is keeping an eye on all the different species at once, so that we don't miss any. We find it helpful to make a list of the species we think we will see and divide it into half each, which halves the number either of us must watch. We were quite surprised, when we seriously tried to count the maximum number of any one species at any one time, to find that there weren't as many as we thought. For example, blue tits flutter about the nut feeder almost continuously, back and forth to the tree. If we're watching rather casually, there seem to be at least six or seven around. But a careful count, avoiding counting any twice, showed us there were really only two pairs! For the first part of the hour there were also two pairs of chaffinches, and one of them was Scruff, so we were delighted to believe he had a mate. But later on, another male joined them, making five. So now we're not so sure.



The squirrel with the damaged hind quarters and tail, Scratty, continues to come regularly to feed on seeds on the ground. He or she seems well enough in him or herself. We don't know whether squirrels are pairing up to mate yet, but when they do, I don't think Scratty stands much chance with the opposite sex.

Book Review

The Sweetness of Water by Nathan Harris

Long listed for the 2021 Booker Prize *The Sweetness of Water* is the debut novel of Nathan Harris, an American in his 20s. It instantly found favour with publishers and readers alike.

Harris takes on the much-chronicled post-American Civil War era but tackles it from an unusual angle. Unlike novels such as *Gone with the Wind*, which are written from the paternalistic perspective of comfortably off middle class Southern white families with their "loyal" slaves, this novel looks at what happened after the war – when the slaves were freed with nowhere to go, no way of making new lives, no education – left adrift to fend for themselves. As Harris says in an interview: "It came to my attention that no one else had grappled with what those precious moments, upon being freed, must have been like for those men and women who had spent their life in bondage.......having your every moment controlled by others, and suddenly waking up to the earth-shaking revelation that the government has given you a new identity, one of being free – while you are still occupying the same traumatized body, living with the same tortured history of your past...."

George Walker, a white farmer of limited means who is mourning the loss of his only son Caleb in the war, meets a pair of formerly enslaved brothers sheltering in the wood: Landry, who is virtually mute because of his mistreatment at the hands of his masters, and Prentiss, resourceful and fiercely loyal to his sibling. Unusually (and somewhat inexplicably given the prevailing attitudes of the times), George invites them to work his land in return for shelter in the barn and a fair wage. The inevitable outcome of this is that George and his wife Isabelle find themselves shunned by most of the townsfolk of nearby Little Ox.

This is not a story of human kindness overcoming prejudice. The book contains the expected inter-racial violence, triggered in this case by Landry witnessing a gay encounter between two white Confederate soldiers and the need for him to be silenced. And further violence, this time white on white, ensues as George's neighbours wreak vengeance on him for challenging the norms of the era.

Phlegmatic throughout, George appears to accept the resulting misery of his life and his failing body philosophically: "Many a thinker had devoted himself to questions of aging and death, yet the thinkers died at the same rate as the idiots, and so George had grown quite content with the idea of ignoring the process altogether."

This is a beautiful lyrical book that encourages the reader to approach American history in a new way. Major political themes run alongside the personal and private, and the simplistic concept of good and bad is unpicked and held up to scrutiny.

The book ends with Isabelle's musing: "She might hope for more but had long ago learned to live with whatever came to pass. Yet sometimes – just sometimes – hope was enough." **Hilary Smallwood**

Garden Notes

If you are only two and you are an energetic little dog suddenly presented with a four-month- old playmate, who better to charge around the garden with, and yippee, chase in manic circles on the only area of grass that could be graced with the term 'lawn'. Nine months later we have very little lawn, a lot of mud and numerous small holes. As neither of us enjoys mowing anyway, it seems that we have a new project for the spring. I am not entirely sure what that will be yet, but I do know that the once lovely circular lawn will be replaced by some other circular feature. We could replace the grass with gravel which would be cheap and utterly, utterly boring. Having just reroofed the house, paving it with something beautiful would be too much

of an extravagance. We could create the pond I have always wanted but that would not be easy due to our mains water supply (and our neighbour's) which run straight across the middle. A good-looking raised pond would be lovely but that too is overly extravagant. The best idea so far is to create a metal gazebo from two of the very cheapest self-assembly metal arches – a bit wobbly but we've used them elsewhere and they last a few years before rusting at ground level. These would be encircled by a gravel path - very easy, especially as the existing lawn already has a stone edging. I have visions of the whole structure being shrouded in a glorious mix of colourful clematis. I am not tempted to include roses as, having just pruned all the other roses, I have fallen out of love with anything with thorns.

To digress, I am not one of those gardeners that enjoys pruning roses. Despite pruning them every year and despite knowing all the theory and studying all the diagrams in the gardening books, faced with a rose, I never really know what to do. I just take the advice of Helen Dillon in her book 'On Gardening'. She says 'Have you pruned the roses? If not, why not? Roses are a bit like Rottweilers – they seem to know instinctively whether or not you are frightened of them. So, secateurs in hand, approach the rose in a business-like way, as if you actually know what you are doing.' So, I do just that and surprisingly, they survive my butchery. There is only one that I haven't tackled yet – 'Sally Holmes' obviously thinks that it is still mid-summer and is still hanging on to her very beautiful glossy green leaves – quite extraordinary.

Back to clematis - I love all the Viticella clematis so I will have to include a couple of those; perhaps the gorgeous purple 'Etoile Violette' planted together with 'Minuet' or 'Tango' – so pretty with their white-veined mauve-red flowers. The fabulous deep red 'Madame Julia Correvon' would be lovely too, flowering all summer until early autumn. Ideally, I would plant something for spring too and a large-flowered one to contrast with the smaller flowers of the Viticellas. In this year of the Queen's Platinum Jubilee, it is tempting to have a red, white and blue theme!

Yesterday I planted the very lovely *Clematis texensis* 'Princess Diana' elsewhere in the garden and I am looking forward to its dainty vibrant pink tulip-shaped flowers from August right through until October. Now that I am planting more and more shrubs in the borders, the clematis will add plenty of colour to all that greenery without adding too much to the workload.

Meanwhile, I have been cutting down the dead stems of last year's perennials and, nervous that the dogs will trample the young shoots of hostas, hardy geraniums and echinacea, I have been littering the borders with up-turned wire hanging baskets. The emerging plants are also protected from my own clumsy feet; there is nothing worse than that dreadful crunching sound of fresh new growth beneath a hefty boot.
