Vicar's Letter

Dear Readers

This is the time of year when our churches usually collect for Christian Aid, the charity which supports all sorts of projects of development in many places around the world, for people of any faith or none.

This year the charity is focussing on the droughts in Zimbabwe and the Horn of Africa, which are causing rising food prices and starvation in many villages. These are really worthwhile causes, and as climate change starts to bite, and many poorer countries are feeling the effect of drought or catastrophic flooding, Christian Aid is a charity which really deserves our support.

But of course, there are many other good causes nearer home which equally deserve our support.

Daily we read in the news about the rapidly rising cost of living, and you only need to go to fill your car up with petrol to realise the impact it is having on all sorts of businesses and services. It doesn't take much imagination to realise what an effect it must have on households which were only just making ends meet before.

At the same time, we read in the news that a million people in the UK will be losing their personal allowance before tax. This is because so many people are enjoying a rapid salary increase, such that they are now earning in excess of £100,000 a year. The gap between the rich and the poor in the UK is widening day by day: the rich get richer, and the poor get poorer.

TRETIRE WITH MICHAELCHURCH AND PENCOYD

As usual now, the first service of the month was our Benefice service on Zoom when we meet members from across the Benefice as Frances leads us in a service of Holy Communion. If you have yet to experience this, I do recommend it as a good experience of sharing worship with a number of probably familiar faces and a number of new ones. We prepare beforehand some bread and some wine which we then eat and drink at the appropriate time in the service. Hymns are accompanied by different musicians from across the Benefice, and quite often include Peter Everall on his clarinet, with Liz singing, all the way from Brixton Deverill in Wiltshire!

On the second Sunday, it was Pencoyd's turn to host the communion service for the Benefice, led for us by Frances Phillips, and Evensong the following week was at Tretire, taken for us once again by Rev. Tiffany Jackson. So our parish has been fortunate to have two services in the month, both led for us by ordained priests.

Our Jubilee celebrations in the Benefice started early, with a scratch choir assembled in St Weonards church under the baton of Sir Richard Mynors, to rehearse for an afternoon, and then perform after a magnificent tea, three anthems:- Handel's. *Zadok the priest*; Parry's *I was glad when they said unto me*; and a new anthem composed especially for the Queen's Platinum Jubilee. The first two were both sung at Queen Elizabeth's coronation, and were sung lustily by our scratch choir; the third piece was a little more contemplative and reflected more the values that our monarch has aspired to throughout her long reign, and the importance of her Christian faith.

It was a very enjoyable and good occasion in which John and I were pleased to have played a part.

The following weekend the Pursey family and Elizabeth Malcolm had worked very hard preparing an area of Andy's Lake, which had been kindly made available for the people of Pencoyd and Tretire to gather on the Sunday 5th June for a Bring your Own picnic, and shared fun and games. It was not the most auspicious day, weatherwise, and we were very grateful for the various shelters erected for us, which had been decorated with colourful Jubilee bunting!



But it was a very happy occasion, and good to meet people from the villages that we didn't know, as well as plenty of familiar faces. Wildlife in our Garden

I have just looked back to what I wrote this time last year; it was interesting to find out how different this May has been. For reasons I cannot begin to fathom, we have seen hardly any fledgling birds about on or near our feeding station. Much the same variety of adult birds are to be seen though. Last year robins were dominant and one fearless one couldn't wait for me to finish putting out seeds on the wall before swooping down. This year it is chaffinches, and again, one is particularly bold and demanding as I put out the seeds. We think that Scruff, the male chaffinch with untidy feathers, eventually grew smart ones, but it is hard to be sure we are seeing the same bird.

Birdsong has continued loudly throughout May and into early June, with song thrushes and blackcaps outdoing the others. If, as with thrushes, it is only the males who sing, then we must have two pairs of both thrushes and blackcaps nesting in our garden. I have heard a cuckoo twice this year, not in our garden of course, but heard here from across the fields, once much earlier in spring and again over a couple of dull, damp days at the end of May.



Amongst the insects, I have seen damsel flies but as yet no dragon flies. Tortoiseshell and peacock butterflies are now around. Small, black ants are very busy, undermining the roots of some young plants in the beds, making little hills in the lawns and, perhaps more usefully for us, farming the aphids on the roses and broad beans. It needs ladybirds to actually eat the aphids though. The other day I found an asparagus beetle on some asparagus, which I confess I destroyed, but not before quite a lot of eggs had been laid on shoots. I assume it is larvae which actually eat the asparagus, but I have never seen one.

Slugs have been rather troublesome this year, eating young brassicas, beans, marrows and courgettes. We think there are more slugs about now because our toad population has declined gradually over the years. Margaret has made some slug traps with beer in yoghurt pots and caught a good number.



Some of you may remember that back in the winter I reported that a branch of an acer tree had been ringbarked, we think by deer. I wondered whether the branch would survive. So far it has not only survived, but budded, sprouted leaves and grown twigs! I want to know what is going on. I wish now I had paid more attention and asked more questions during biology lessons at school. I remember that water is transported up from roots to leaves in the xylem, which lies outside of the wood but inside the cambium or growth layer of a tree trunk and branches. That may have been left more or less intact by the deer's teeth, but the outer layers, the bark and phloem, have all gone from a length of several inches. The phloem, I remember, transports nutrients (including sugars made in the leaves by photosynthesis) down to other parts of the tree. So what is happening to that? Can it be that the branch, with no living connection to the rest of the tree except a water supply, is big enough to live a kind of semi-detached existence?

Book Review

The Heart's Invisible Furies, by John Boyne

Irish author John Byrne is best known for his books for young adults, including *The Boy in Striped Pyjamas*.

Here he takes us on a journey from the strict priest-dominated Ireland of the 1940s to Amsterdam and thence to New York and back to the Dublin of the present day through the eyes of Cyril Avery, the illegitimate child of a 16-year-old farm girl, who is publicly banished from the small parish where she lives by the local priest, who later turns out to have fathered two children. Cyril is adopted out by a *"hunch-backed Redemptionist nun"* to a well to-do but emotionally barren family. His adoptive mother is a soon-to-be famous chain-smoking novelist, and his father works in finance, with a sideline in tax evasion which lands him in prison on several occasions. Cyril is not so much parented as treated as a lodger, and constantly reminded that he is *"not a real Avery."* He and his best friend Julian *"…… were both denied love, and this deficiency would be scorched onto our future lives like an ill-considered tattoo inscribed on the buttocks after a drunken night out, leading each of us inevitably towards isolation and disaster."*

Julian is a key figure in Cyril's childhood and youth, someone he idolizes as having all the qualities he feels he lacks: charisma, courage, jauntiness and self-confidence. Here is Cyril's first love – a fantasy out of reach and unreciprocated. Dutch doctor Bastiaan is his second and more solid love, with whom he eventually shares a home and a meaningful relationship. This brief peaceful episode in his life follows on from many traumas, much violence and a determined fight to find a place in the judgmental and rigid society in which he struggles to make his way.

Cyril's life draws us into some of the sadder and seedier aspects of life: from violent pimps at work in Amsterdam to the grim reality of the AIDS era in New York, where Cyril volunteers as friend and counsellor to terminally ill victims.

Central to the book is the reader's awareness of a critical fact of which Cyril is in ignorance, but which is on the brink of surfacing on several occasions. And scattered throughout are drily amusing passages of dialogue, interspersed with a weight of sadness and gritty reality.

This is a book about acceptance and compassion; about the fight to be allowed to be oneself in the repressed environment of an Irish post-war upbringing, a struggle which takes Cyril a lifetime to resolve.

Garden Notes



One of the most delightful spots in this garden is an area of gravel into which numerous plants have seeded. In the centre of the gravel is a table, two chairs and a large tree stump which, for the last few summers, I have been disguising with a group of pots planted with summer flowers. I omitted to deadhead some of them so that they dropped their seed into the gravel. These are now so well established I no longer need to plant up any pots. Earlier in the year we had forgetme-nots and violets. Now we have daisies (Erigeron karvinskianus), white and lilac violas (Viola cornuta), harebells (Campanula rotundifolia), a delicate hardy geranium with veined lilac flowers, tall purple Linaria purpurea and the delicate pink Linaria 'Canon Went'. I was pleased and surprised to see the Geranium there – the plant from which the seed must have come is several feet away in one of the borders. I have not removed anything or added anything, and I couldn't have chosen a better combination. I am thrilled that without any effort we have such a pretty group of dainty plants in white, pink, blue and lilac. Of course, we can no longer use the table and chairs, but they

weren't very comfortable anyway and it was difficult to place a mug on the table without it tilting. Surrounded by plants, they look charming and quaint.

Similarly I have left self-seeded plants in the gravel where we park the cars. Here we have had to remove some of them to allow us to park but that still leaves a beautiful group. I am amazed by how healthy and strong the plants are as the gravel is so deep. We have a completely different combination of flowers here. There is a cheerful line of yellow Welsh poppies alongside my husband's car and next to my car we have foxgloves, snapdragons and vivid orange California poppies (*Eschscholzia californica*). The snapdragons are all bi- or tri-coloured in various shades of white, red/pink and lemon. When they were tiny seedlings it was tempting to rake them all out, but I am so pleased that we left them.

We have a newish area of gravel behind the house; if I can resist the temptation to weed out seedlings it will be interesting to see what appears. Looking at the adjacent borders, I am hoping it will be more California poppies, snapdragons, daisies and hardy geraniums but then again, it might just be chives! *Julie Davies*
