

Letter from Caring for God's Acre

Looking at Lichens

November can be a quiet month for wildlife spotting apart from fungi, but have you ever taken a closer look at the lichens growing on the monuments within your churchyard? Forming a mosaic of colour these vary from simple, powdery scatterings and crusts to more elaborate leafy or even bushy structures. They are particularly rich and varied in unpolluted sites with clean air.

Lichens consist of two or more organisms living together as one. This is usually a fungus which forms the visible part of the lichen and within, protected by the fungal threads, are algal cells which can photosynthesise and provide food for the whole lichen. So, the fungus gets food and the algae gets shelter!

Churchyards are outstanding for lichens; there are approximately 2,000 lichen species in the UK, over 700 of these have been found in churchyards with half of them rarely if ever found elsewhere. Churchyard monuments provide a range of rock types with nooks and crannies caused by the monument shape and the carving of words and symbols. All of these nooks and crannies may have slightly different conditions of substrate, light, moisture and temperature which may suit different lichen species.

Lichens start to colonise as soon as something is set still, be it stone, wood or even rubber dustbin lids! Take a look at your older monuments and think how long the lichens may have been slowly growing there. The British Lichen Society has surveyed most churchyards so visit our atlas of biological records (burialgrounds.nbnatlas.org) and see how many have been found in churchyards near you.

Lichens don't need us to look after them but do need unchanging conditions so please encourage people to resist scrubbing them off, which also scratches the stone and makes it erode quicker, try and prevent ivy from smothering them and if a monument needs moving, try and erect it in the same orientation so that the conditions of light and shade remain constant. Other than that, take a magnifying glass and slip into the amazing miniature world of lichens......




Garway stitching group meets once a fortnight on Wednesday mornings 10.30 – 12.30.

Unfortunately, this was not to be, and we have lost not only a real gentleman, but also a colourful character whose distinguished career was a fascinating link to the age of steam. Angus was always ready to relate tales from his years on the footplate and he will be sorely missed. We extend condolences to Regina and all his family and friends.

The benefice service at Orcop on 2nd October was taken by Bishop Michael Westall, to whom we send our thanks. It was well attended and much appreciated by the congregation.

The annual British Legion act of remembrance will take place as usual at the cross-roads war memorial on Sunday 13th November. This is an important event in the Orcop calendar, perhaps especially so in a year when war is again being waged in Europe and we have lost our Queen.

Another important date for your diaries is Thursday 22nd December, when at 3pm, Orcop's "play for Christmas" will be performed in the church.

Lasting about fifty minutes, it includes processional singing, a moving re-enactment of the Christmas story and a good dose of shepherds' knockabout humour. The play is medieval in origin. 

Hard to Swallow

Tales of Birds and Fungi

We have had fewer swallows in recent years. This year only three pairs arrived and nested, as usual, in the wood barn. At the end of September, we counted 25 perched on the wires preparing to migrate. It appears they did rather well. One pair appeared to have reared three broods, the last three chicks being in the nest until mid-September, so we became concerned as to whether they would be ready to migrate. According to the Rev C A Johns "British Birds in their Haunts" (originally published in 1861), the migratory instinct can overcome parental affection and some late broods are left behind. He also believes that a few adult individuals



stay behind, for one reason or another, taking shelter in some sheltered nook and coming out only on warm days to feed on gnats. Anyway, from about 20th September, the three youngsters in question left the nest and could be seen lined up on a power cable beneath it. After a few days, they started flying during the day, returning at about 5pm to line up on the wire. As we were stacking firewood in the barn, we had to adjust our working hours to the daily departure and arrival of our little guests. They did not return yesterday (3rd October) so we assume they

are heading for Africa with their parents and the rest of the flock. We hope they will make it, having left the nest only a couple of weeks ago!

It has been a good year also for fungi, especially when rain finally arrived after the long hot dry spell. We have not had many field mushrooms, but lots of horse mushrooms and parasols. There are two kinds of

parasol mushrooms, the "standard" kind (*Macrolepiota procera*) and the shaggy parasol (*Macrolepiota rhacodes*). The two are easily distinguished, because the shaggy parasol turns orange, then red or brown very quickly if it is cut or bruised. It turned out that ours were shaggy parasols, which are regarded as edible, but are mildly poisonous to about one person in 25. It is recommended that only a small portion is tried initially to establish whether or not you are one of the unlucky 4%. I did so and suffered no ill-effects. However, they do not have much flavour (unlike the horse mushrooms) so I have not been tempted to eat any more.



Footnote: The article above is not to be construed as gastronomical advice. Anyone intent on eating fungi should not do so unless they are absolutely confident as to the identity of the type they have in mind and that it is a non-poisonous species. **Peter Garratt**

Wildlife in our Garden

The small birds visiting our low wall with seeds on it seem to have got more numerous, in numbers if not in species. On October 1st therefore, I hung up a bird feeder with seeds in. Almost straight away, some of the



blue and great tits changed from visiting the wall to the feeder. I have not yet seen any other species use the feeder; sometimes some of the tits return to the wall.

One species that has taken to feeding on and around the wall in the last few days is a collar dove. These beautiful little doves with the most delicate soft grey plumage are relatively recent immigrants to this country. The first ones I ever saw were in the Seychelles in 1989. I later learned that they were native to the Indian sub-continent. A few years later I saw some in

France. A few years after that, round about the year 2000, they appeared in this country and are now one of our most common birds.

About four days ago I came across a pile of light grey feathers on the lawn. Clearly a medium sized bird, a collar dove I think, had been caught and eaten by a predator. We now wonder whether it is not just a coincidence that a lone collar dove has started feeding near the house. Perhaps they were a pair.

The moles are quite busy again. The squirrels and rabbits are making holes, though the reasons rabbits are digging shallow holes but not making warrens, is not apparent to me. I have talked of voles before. One day



in early autumn when Margaret was sitting outside on a bench facing the house, she was fascinated to watch a vole with a seed in its mouth, run down the low wall to some flower pots, emerge from between them, scurry across a gap till it reached another group of pots, across a path, then thread its way along the end of the house, behind two water buts, two wheely bins, a barbeque and over the doorstep till it reached a tiny hole in the plinth into which it disappeared. Seconds later it re-emerged, without a seed, and ran all the way back to collect another before repeating the same journey some 20 times. I later estimated the round trip there and back to be some 24 miles!

I have not seen much in the way of insect life this autumn. Usually, I am aware of some late dragon flies hunting in the autumn sunshine, and red admiral and comma butterflies enjoying the flowers on the tall verbena. Maybe numbers are down this year, or maybe I have just not been looking out for them. It makes me realise how unobservant I am, my attention so often taken up with many other matters. I really admire proper naturalists who spend hours or even days patiently waiting in hides for the wildlife to come to them!

On 4th September we had a brief visit from a tiny warbler shaped bird. It had no obvious distinguishing colours, and we could not identify it. It was flitting around some flowerpots and on a Rosemary bush for a few minutes and also pecking at the glass in the French windows, presumably to feed on the spiders that live there. I was interested to see that we had one of the same species, maybe even the same bird, on 9th August last year. *John Oubridge* 4th October 2022

Book Review

Prodigal Summer by Barbara Kingsolver

As always, Kingsolver writes with fluency and insightful charm, and returns once more to her concern for the conservation of nature, a theme which recurs in many of her novels.

Here we have a treatise on humankind's relationship with the natural world, wrapped up in the stories of 3 women and set in a small community in the Appalachian Mountains.

47-year-old divorced biologist Deanna Wolfe has lived for two years in isolation in a log cabin in the National Forest where she is employed to deter poachers and generally keep an eye on the welfare of the local wildlife. Totally unused to human company and absorbed in the animals and plants around her, the peace is disturbed by the arrival of hunter Eddie Bondo, 20 years her junior, with whom she begins a passionate but shaky affair, overshadowed as it is by their differing attitudes to wildlife. From being oblivious to others, Deanna finds herself slipping into thinking about how she looks and acts, as reflected by another human: "Damned thing

self-consciousness, like a pitiful stray dog tagging you down the road – so hard to shake off, so easy to get back."

Down in the valley, in Deanna's hometown of Egg Fork, Lusa Landowski, a city-born entomologist, marries into the local Widener family, but rapidly finds herself widowed and faced with the task of keeping the family farm alive in the face of huge pressures from the in-laws to follow the traditions of tobacco farming and the liberal use of pesticides, which run counter to her principles.

Nearby elderly eccentric Nannie Rawley, who has firm views against farming chemicals and who enforces a no-spray zone around her property, tries to live peaceably alongside widowed Garnett Walker whose views clash fundamentally with hers and whose loneliness is palpable: "His body was no longer to be looked upon. If the thought caused him sadness – that he would never again know the comfort of human touch – he sensed it was merely a tributary to the lake of grief through which an old man must swim at the end of his days."

Woven into the story of the lives of these women are set piece passages of dialogue debating the morality of our relationship with the natural world. These are somewhat marred by an artificial gender divide between the protagonists, with men generally on the side of man's domination of the natural world and the women fighting to save it. Kingsolver's skilled prose just skims on the brink of tedium in these passages, with self-righteousness always looming in the background. She just about pulls it off – but only just.

It is an interesting idea to present this fundamental debate through the medium of a novel. Thankfully Kingsolver's prose and skilled characterizations help her to carry this off. *Hilary Smallwood*

Garden Notes

When we think about autumn colour, we imagine the glorious colours of acers, sumach, liquidamber and so on. This garden contains none of those and yet is looking very colourful right now at the beginning of October. Many of the shrubs are still green but the forsythia is a deep rich red, Prunus incisa 'Kojo-no-mai' too and the hostas have turned a lovely buttery yellow. There are large orange rosehips on the Rosa complicata, small red hips on the Rose glauca which contrast so well with its grey leaves, and larger red hips on Rosa rugosa whose leaves are turning the same yellow as the hostas. There are large red crab apples on Malus 'John Downie' which I would love to harvest to make crab apple jelly, but they look so lovely that I have left them on the tree. The flowers on all the Hydrangea paniculata are turning from white to pink.



The fuchsias are still flowering abundantly; there are the soft lilac flowers of asters, purple Erysimum 'Bowles' Mauve' and the white flowers of Echinacea 'White Swan'; even a few primroses. California poppies in various shades of pink and orange are struggling on but will soon be destined for the compost heap.

I have been harvesting walnuts, trying to gather them before the dogs get there first. Although the nuts are small, it's the first year we have had a good crop, so being greedy I want to collect every nut that falls. Today is wet and very blustery and the nuts are raining down in profusion. I foolishly forgot to wear gloves and now have what my

husband calls gardener's hands. My nails are black and my fingers have a strange dark hue crisscrossed with black lines. No amount of scrubbing will remove it. We need to remove one of the lower branches that are encroaching on a pear arch. October and November are the months to do this and definitely not in late winter or early spring. Walnuts bleed profusely at that time of year, as we found out rather scarily when we removed a small branch one spring. We thought it was never going to stop.

Ten or more years ago, I planted three Japanese anemones (Anemone x hybrida 'Andrea Atkinson) in a shady spot near a large hydrangea. They never thrived – well, they disappeared completely - and I was so disappointed as I had looked forward to their beautiful white flowers enlivening a dull corner of the garden. Imagine my surprise yesterday when I spotted that one of them had magically reappeared and had flowered for the first time ever. Now that I know that it is still there, I will dig it up in the winter and take root cuttings, which I will plant in a sunnier spot and hope that they will be happier there.

I have been planting Narcissus bulbs in the borders: the ones that I grew in a large pot last year ('Minnow' and 'Rip van Winkle') plus 'New Baby' which is another dwarf daffodil just 8 inches high, with up to four flowers on each stem. The outer petals are white with yellow margins on the lower half and a bowl-shaped yellow cup - very dainty.


Our two old apple trees badly need pruning, but it is the one job I am unwilling to tackle on my own anymore. When our favourite tree surgeon came to trim our huge front hedge, I asked if he also pruned apple trees. 'Yes, of course' was the willing reply. That was before he had a proper look at the trees. 'Aah yes. I'll get back to you on that'. It seems that even the professionals are daunted by them. Weirdly, that was strangely comforting. *Julie Davies*




A peek in the bookshop






