The Bishop's Letter

Most years when I was a parish priest in Sussex a group of us used to go carol singing. We'd visit homes and the local pubs. Rather than asking for money for a charity or church funds we would finish by giving out mince pies. This always threw people. They wanted to pay for them. They couldn't believe there wasn't some sort of catch. I'm sure it would be even worse were I to do it today. We've got so wary of scam calls, texts and emails, we are immediately suspicious of anything that seems too good to be true.

We often refer to Christ's coming at Christmas in terms of gifts. The word became flesh and dwelt among us. Unbidden and unsought, Christ comes to earth to reveal what God is like in a way that eludes human reason. The Christian story is something no one could have made up as a recipe for a restored relationship with God. But gift and the allied term grace are what it is all about.

As the new year begins, we are acutely aware of life's intractable problems. How on earth are we to solve the climate crisis, the economic crisis, the international relations crisis brought on by the war in Ukraine? All these problems seem unsolvable given normal patterns of human behaviour. How can a baby born in the backwater of an ancient empire 2000 years ago have anything to say about any of them? But the gift of Jesus is simple without being simplistic. The heart of most problems is the problem of the human heart. Jesus offers us the gift that meets the needs we seek to fill with rapacious consumption. He offers the security that frees us to love. He offers us the peace that in trust releases generosity. He offers the forgiveness that releases us from defensiveness and self-justification. The Gospel is good news because it meets the deepest needs of the human heart. This is where the real transformation of individuals and society is to be found.

TRETIRE WITH MICHAELCHURCH AND PENCOYD

Sunday November 27th was the start of the Church's year as Advent Sunday and we celebrated it at Pencoyd Church with Evensong led by Elizabeth. We began the service by lighting the first candle on the Advent Ring. Originally this was a pagan custom with people lighting candles around a wreath through the dark winter months. At some time during the Middle Ages, the wreath was embraced by Christians and a tradition evolved into the now-familiar Advent ring which is full of symbolism. Traditionally, the Advent Ring is a circle of greenery, which represents that the creator God is eternal. In it are placed four candles and one is lit on each Sunday in Advent.

At Pencoyd this Advent service, we followed the tradition that the first candle represents the Patriarchs, such as Abraham, Isaac, and Jacob; the second candle represents the Old Testament Prophets, the third Candle represents John the Baptist, and the fourth candle represents Mary the Mother of Jesus. On Christmas Day, we light the fifth candle in the centre of the ring which is the Jesus candle, lit on his birthday, representing the light of the world. So, if you come to the service at Tretire at 9.15 am on Christmas Day, you will see the lighting of the Jesus candle.



The other custom which Elizabeth has invited us all to follow this year during Advent, is one we followed several years ago now, called The Reverse Advent Calendar. Reverse in several ways. Instead of opening a door and finding a piece of chocolate, (or in our children's day, just a picture!) we start with an empty box. Starting on 1st of December, we buy an item of food, or other necessity like toiletries, and put it in the box, and repeat every day till Christmas Day. We take our full box of items to Tretire Church, and all of them will be taken during early January to the food bank in Ross.

Hopefully, many of you read about this suggestion on a slip put into your December magazine. But if you didn't get to see it, or just didn't get around to it, but read about it now, it isn't too late to participate. So, do bring any donations to Tretire church and put them into the containers provided, and your gift will be taken to the food bank. There will undoubtedly be many needy families in and around Ross who will have a real struggle this Christmas, and it would be so good if our community could show them that spirit of generosity that the season of Christmas symbolises. So, do please join in with as little or as much as you can manage, a late Christmas present for a needy stranger.

Wildlife in our Garden

The first half of November was unusually warm. Even so, most of the insect life has gone to sleep for the winter. Just a few species remained on standby and reappeared when the sun broke through, the odd bumble bee and red admiral for example. Twice on warm days a queen wasp which had begun to lie up in the house, woke and started to buzz around. I rather unkindly put it outside, hoping it would find the shelter of a shed or tree good enough for its needs. I don't mind wasps in the garden; after all, they do a good job clearing up all kinds of rubbish, but I don't like the idea of someone accidentally putting their hand on a sleepy wasp in the fold of a curtain and paying the price!

About ten days ago the weather turned cold, and as it did so the bird life around our feeding station suddenly got a lot busier. There were more of the usual, chaffinches, dunnocks, robins and tits, but also some which had been busy elsewhere all summer and autumn,

blackbirds (two pairs), collar doves (three pairs), a male woodpecker, which now visits every day, usually quite late in the morning, and just once, on 25th, a lone fieldfare.

We have not been putting out nuts through the summer, just seeds. I thought we might try "kibbled" peanuts (recommended by RSPB) this winter, but were surprised how small the pieces were. We found that they just fell out of the squirrel-proof nut feeder, so we bought a squirrel-proof seed feeder instead. This does work but is not perfect; sometimes the nut pieces get stuck up in the barrel which has to be knocked to get them down to the holes for the birds to reach them. Nor are they universally popular. The blue tits like them, but the great tits still prefer the seeds, and the woodpecker either has not yet discovered them or has decided he prefers seed too!

One day, we watched the woodpecker take a drink from the bird bath, then appear to almost fall off. It hung on to the rim with one foot and, upside down, suspended by one leg, it stayed quite still for about 15 minutes before flying off. Perhaps this behaviour is normal for woodpeckers, but we've never seen it before. I suppose they're usually hidden from view up in the trees.



I am always surprised by how striking a fieldfare looks when seen at close range. Larger than its relatives, blackbirds and thrushes, it has dramatic markings: dark striations on the upper breast and fierce eyes accentuated by a strong pale stripe above. It bounces around on the grass, chasing off all the smaller birds, even though it shows no interest in feeding itself. Bossy, I call it! But out in the fields with the rest of its flock, they can be so well camouflaged, and it's so hard to judge scale, that I find them very difficult to identify. Little blobs of grey in the distance; well, they could be pigeons. And when they fly, it's the same problem. Could they be starlings? If anyone can tell me a reliable way of identifying fieldfares at a distance, I'd be very glad to hear of it.

However in early November we were surprised by one large, unexpected visitor- a heron. We have seen herons on the stream and in the fields round about, but not so near habitation.



Although there is a pond in the grounds of Treago, some distance from where we now live, the herons have had their fill of the goldfish, so we assumed there was little to interest them here! For about a week, the heron stalked proudly past our windows early each morning, up towards the wooded area behind our house. It stood for some time, doing nothing but seeming to watch us as we peered at it. If we made a false move it flapped off. Obviously, it lost interest in us as it stopped coming. We wonder if it will visit us next year. Let's hope so as it was amazing to see such a large bird so close.

Book Review

Diary of a Somebody by Brian Bilston

Bilston is known as the "Banksy of Poetry" and Twitter's unofficial Poet Laureate, with over 100.00 followers. After publishing his first volume of poetry *You Took the Last Bus Home*, he has moved on to this his first novel.

The protagonist is Bilston himself who decides to get a grip on his shambolic life and makes a New Year's resolution to write a poem a day. Newly separated and drifting through life and a dull job he is optimistic that this decision will change his fortunes. His time is taken up with buying books, tinkering at his office job (in his "officle"), attending seances at the insistence of his slightly batty elderly neighbour, going to a poetry club to gaze in rapture at Liz (the object of his desires), groaning over the sickening new partner his wife has found (a motivational speaker for goodness' sake), stroking his cat and receiving weekly visits from his teenage son, who, to Bilston's disgust, wants to revise for his exams rather than chill out. There is indeed a poem a day, all witty and amusing in varying degrees, with some small gems – the titles raise a smile, sometimes more so than the content of the poem: Not Drowning but Waving, Mansplaining at the Ghostbusters Training Academy for Women, Beer Mat's Last Theorem, Do not go, lentil, into that good pie,

And droll aphorisms: "Life is a parachute; it gets you down" – "Inside every opportunity is a disappointment waiting to happen" – "No matter how big the problem, it is never too late to run away."

Poetic and prose examples are essential here so you get the drift:

Of his neighbour who is notorious for failing in the essential task of getting his bin out on the pavement on the right day: "I tried to write a poem using a metaphor that might somehow

connect the contents of a bin bag to a more profound statement about the modern human condition, but I threw it away because it was rubbish." "Duvet, you are so groovet, I'd like to stay under you, all of Tuesdet."

And so it goes on. Confession here – I stopped chuckling about a third of the way through. His striving to be clever simply became tedious. To quote Bilston himself: *"The strength of enjoyment derived is inversely proportional to the quantity of words on the page."* The wit and whimsy come thick and fast in this book: clever but best consumed in measured doses, which rather defeats the object of a novel.
