A CANDLEMAS LETTER

Hello fellow churchgoers!

I hope this magazine finds you well and that you had a wonderful Christmas season. Can you believe it's already February and Candlemas is upon us? Time sure does fly, doesn't it?



It's all right: don't have a heart attack! That wasn't really me speaking but an Artificial Intelligence program following my instructions to write a chatty magazine article for Candlemas... It's scary how much these programs can do now. An average student essay is within their grasp for instance. But the truth is, they often don't pass the "sniff test". They just aren't really human, however clever they are at feeding the internet back to us.

Which takes me back to Candlemas, because Candlemas – the Feasts of the Presentation of Jesus Christ in the Temple and the Purification of the Blessed Virgin Mary – is our yearly celebration of a very real baby and a very real mother going to a very real Temple to perform the rituals their religion required: presenting sacrifices to God and praying for purification for Mary (as recorded in Luke chapter 2), 33 days after the equally physical circumcision and 40 days after the birth.

This is no escapist world of twinkling candles and chatty platitudes, but the real world full of joys and sorrows that we know today. And it celebrates, as you well know, not a mythical God but a God who has become fully one with us, blood and gore included. God with us in both our joys and sorrows. God with us a New Year unfolds.

Ritual sacrifices and cleansings are no longer part of our religion. Nor do we bring our stock of candles to church for blessing (made from the tallow of the slaughtered pigs ...). What the Feast does offer is the opportunity to take a deep breath of God's Spirit and turn bravely from the cosiness of Christmas to face the more challenging days of Good Friday and Easter and all they represent, taking with us not a just a candle in our hands but the light of Christ in our hearts. That's what we'll be doing at Tretire on Sunday 5th February at 10am if you're free to join us.

HIT THE ROAD (PG)

Hit the Road is a gem of a road-trip movie from Iranian film-maker, Panah Panahi, whose famous father, Jafar, is currently in prison in Iran, serving a six-year sentence for enquiring after the fate of other imprisoned Iranian directors. You may remember his wonderful film, *Taxi*, which we showed a few years ago. For his son to make this film is, in itself, an act of artistic bravery. It's easy to love the film's family of four who have borrowed an SUV to make a long trip across Iran. They are journeying for a reason that only becomes clear in due course. The car's being driven by the adult son, who clearly wants to be anywhere other than in a car with mum, dad, six-year-old minx of a brother, and the family's rather sick dog. In the course of the journey, stories and reminiscences are shared while the younger son displays his childish wonder at the mysteries of the world and offers his own idiosyncratic interpretation of them. It's a film that constantly touches the sweet spot between laughter and tears and is also beautiful to look at as the travellers move from parched brown scenery to a lusher greener landscape which seems to signify an optimistic outcome for their trip, despite more sinister harbingers which pop up and keep us guessing about what exactly is happening to this family.

BROAD OAK NEIGHBOURS' EMAIL GROUP

Broad Oak now has a new email group which was set up to communicate with as many villagers as possible to enable us all to 'keep in touch' about very local matters. All the houses within the village centre received a note through their letter boxes inviting them to join the group. The idea to communicate locally originated when I felt that our phone box could do with a rather large refurbishment and felt it was a good idea to find out what other people thought too.

A note to the Parish Council revealed that others had also requested some improvements to the box. It was also established that the Community Heartbeat Trust had adopted the box, in case at any time in the future, locals might wish to install a defibrillator inside.



A meeting with some of the email group identified a number of other local issues and ideas for improvement resulting in an action plan being created. A bulb planting session took place, with around 500 native bulbs planted on the common areas and next a clear up took place to tidy up a small portion of overgrowth on the common land - coffee, tea and cakes were shared and some special community spirit was created.

A further meeting took place with a member of the Broad Oak and Garway Commoners' Association to identify as clearly as possible our Common's boundaries and also the areas of land that aren't registered as common but are Parish Council owned.

The Parish Council have given the go ahead to begin repairing, redecorating and installing a defibrillator in the old phone box and they also promised a sum of money towards this - along with other projects for the village, which are likely to include; an oak bench; a plaque or notice about the millennium Oak tree and the buried capsule; a vegetable swap area; and a notice board. A further idea is to have an oak sign with 'Broad Oak' carved upon it (we have a large oak plank available but do not know of any wood carvers).

Following the recent water supply issues, it may also be an idea to ask Welsh Water to provide water bottles at an agreed 'drop spot' on our 'layby' as many residents did not receive any deliveries of water.

It is planned to have our first session to work on the phone box very soon and to proceed with the arrangements for a defibrillator. We will send out a request for volunteers for each project, but nobody should feel obliged to help. We have also received a very generous anonymous donation towards these projects. Also we are hoping to hold some fund-raising events very soon to cover all the costs.

RAINFALL IN 2022 – Another dry year

As for the past ten years, this commentary is based on records from Whitehouse Farm (on the southern rim of the Orcop Basin at about 800ft elevation) and those kindly provided by John Oubridge for Tretire Smithy (Elevation about 100ft). The two sets of monthly totals are summarised on the bar chart below. I have records for Whitehouse Farm from 2009 to 2022. The average rainfall over this 14 year period is 928mm.

2019 and 2020 were very wet years and 2021 was relatively dry, with total rainfall about 10% below average. 2022 was drier still, at about 15% below average. The year started with an unusually dry January and the spring and summer were exceptionally dry, with only 34mm of rainfall on average over the months April to August. The most notable feature of the 2021 record was the reversal of seasonal expectations, in that the wettest month by far was May and the driest by far was November. In 2022, a more normal pattern emerged from the very dry January, with winter rainfall predominant. There was virtually no snow in 2022 until December, when a light covering (about 10mm as snow, equivalent to about 2mm of rain) persisted for some 10 days due to exceptionally low daytime temperatures.

As usual, comparing the Whitehouse Farm and Tretire records is interesting. In 2022 there was again good agreement between the two. They followed a similar pattern with the Tretire annual total about 80% of that recorded at Whitehouse Farm. The monthly totals for Tretire were consistently close to or significantly lower than those for Whitehouse Farm, except in November, when Tretire recorded a higher monthly total, probably influenced by heavy local showers.

TRETIRE WITH MICHAELCHURCH AND PENCOYD

Our stalwart team came together on Friday Dec 23rd to thoroughly clean St Mary's Tretire before filling it with festive decorations and candles ready for the service on Christmas Day. 35 people came to the service which was led for us by Rev Brian Phillips, some of whom were joining us from other churches in the benefice, as this was the only daytime service on Christmas Day. It was lovely to welcome some young families and to join in singing really familiar Christmas hymns together.

There has been a really good response to the "Reverse Advent Calendar" appeal, and in early January we were able to take a very good selection of foods and personal necessities such as toiletries to the Community Larder at St Mary's Parish Hall in Ross, and to the Ross Zero Waste Food Hub. I know many people regularly donate to the Community Larder, but I suspect that many people, like us, had not come across the Zero Waste food Hub. We visited it briefly early in the New Year and were very impressed with what we found there. It seems that it was originally started as the Haygrove Community Gardens Charity and aimed to "offer support to those who would benefit from the therapeutic nature of horticulture". A group of volunteers meets there to support those with learning disabilities, mental health issues, Dementia, and the long-term unemployed.

The Zero Waste Food Hub was launched there in November 2020, with the intention of saving the vast amount of food from supermarkets, which, on reaching its sell-by date still unsold, was being sent to landfill. A number of stalls were erected in the garden and the food was collected from the supermarkets and handed out to needy families and individuals from Ross. It has been in action ever since as food is distributed every weekday morning from 10.30 till 12.



By April 2022, 27 tonnes of food had been given away to over 8, 000 people in the Ross District. It is not a food bank, and no evidence of income is required. The two main objectives of the scheme are to stop the incredible waste of supermarket food and to address the food insecurity in the area with the rising cost of living. But anyone can turn up any day and share the donations of that day.

In March 2021, the volunteers initiated two new stalls: - a Home Cooking stall, where recipes for cooking vegetables and fruit and making meals out of leftovers are shared with customers, and some cooking equipment is donated.

Secondly, a Grow your Own Food stall, to support and encourage people to create areas in their gardens where they can grow their own vegetables and fruit, and give them helpful tips and advice on sowing seeds, and provide some second-hand garden tools when available. There are now 40 volunteers helping with the stalls and a monthly gardening club and cooking club attended by up to 50 children. 40 people regularly attend the Therapeutic Gardening Club. People coming to the stalls are given hot drinks, often soup and a roll.

On the evening of Christmas Eve, because of the long weekend of supermarkets closing, volunteers collected almost 2 tonnes of food from supermarkets in Ross, Monmouth, and Ledbury! 150 customers were served free food.

We really feel this is an initiative well worth supporting, so were keen to donate some of your gifts collected over Christmas there, as well as to the Community Larder.

A New Year's Resolution

Does anyone else get that uncomfortable feeling sometimes, that something you believe in now requires you to take a stand?

On Christmas Eve I woke up thinking "I'm going to have to go to the next Extinction Rebellion event in April. And what's more, I'm going to have to tell people I'm doing this - and not just on XR's Facebook site!" The thought wouldn't go away, so I've been trying to find the right words for a statement which is not intended as a rallying cry, or a political harangue. Whether these are the 'right' words or not, here are my thoughts.

You've probably heard of Extinction Rebellion, though probably not much lately, as other bad news has crowded into the headlines. You might be uncomfortably aware that in spite of the war in Ukraine, the costof-living crisis, the many strikes, the changes of government, that the Climate and Ecological Emergency, recognised by our government after the first Extinction Rebellion event in 2019, has not gone away. Like me, you might have pushed it to the back of your mind, as other 'emergencies' have appeared.

I'm not an expert. I'm not a natural rebel. I'm a very privileged, well-educated, comfortably-off person, who cares about the Earth, and its future, and the future of its inhabitants. I am baffled how to express that care effectively. I am baffled that so many of us are committed to doing our bit, in not flying, picking up litter, monitoring the state of rivers, feeding the birds - but that it's not enough.

I am baffled to read that fossil fuel lobbyists outnumbered representatives from any one nation at COP27 meetings. I am baffled to hear that the primary government response to XR is to introduce laws which will make it harder to protest. I am distraught to hear our young people deciding not to bring children into the world, because of the climate crisis.

I wonder what you think, or feel about this, and whether you would see yourselves putting thought into action, and how you would act.

In answer to that call that I felt on Christmas Eve, I will go to the April 21st Rebellion in London, to stand alongside others, to bear witness to our sense of emergency, to ask by our simple presence for change.

Wildlife in our Garden

Although the cold snap before Christmas only lasted a few days, and it's been a very mild January so far, the flurry of birdlife around our feeders and on our wall has continued. The species are much the same as last month but with some notable absences and one addition. The fieldfare has not been back. We have not seen a nuthatch, a female woodpecker, a coal tit nor the moor hen all this winter. A cock pheasant has started coming again.

There are never fewer than two collar doves. They are surprisingly argumentative and often chase one another off the wall. We don't know whether they are two males, two females or one of each. We could say the same about the blackbirds, but at least we do know they are mainly males that do the bossing about.



There have been visits from a sparrow hawk on several occasions, not on the feeders of course, but either dashing by them or sitting in wait nearby. We rarely see him or her catch anything, but we sometimes find dismembered corpses of birds in other parts of the garden. Pigeons are the most common victim. Are they too big a prey for a sparrow hawk? Or a kestrel? If so, what else would venture into our garden?

We have seen little else but birds. However, when the snow lay on the lawn in December there were many tracks to be seen. Unfortunately, our tracking skills are minimal, but we thought we saw those of rabbit (probably), fox (quite likely), and small deer (muntjac perhaps). We don't quite know what the rabbits or deer come for; so far we've seen surprisingly little damage to our plants.

Book Review

Lanterns Across the Snow by Susan Hill

What a gem of a book this is – it fills my heart with joy just to think about it. It has been on my bookshelf for many years and delights us all every Christmas.

Hill has a prize-winning repertoire of novels in several different genres and is also well known for her Simon Serraller detective series.

But Lanterns Across the Snow is in a genre of its own. It is not exactly a historical novel, but gently draws us into one Victorian Christmas in the life of Fanny, a nine year old parson's daughter living in a country vicarage, through her recollections as an old woman: *"Last night the snow fell. And then I began to remember. I remembered all the things that I had forgotten. Or so it had seemed. But not forgotten after all. They were all there, stored away like treasures."*

"Christmas Eve was the best of it all, the waiting and laughing, the sense of excitement through the house, like one of Nancy's pots kept simmering...... and she saw a gleam of brightness cast forward from the

blazing gold of Christmas Day,..... like a bright bright room, an Aladdin's cave of treasure; the tree with its candles and the banked-up fire all glowing, and the pile of shining presents, and the Christmas table, heavy with good things, the smells and the laughter and the love, and oh the bright brightness."

As well as being full of lyricism and beautiful descriptions of the snowy countryside, this book takes us into the profound mysteries of life and death – there is a death and a birth on Christmas Day, and Fanny's vicar father is involved with both, much to Fanny's chagrin. How dare they take away my father on Christmas Day!

But the next day, Fanny goes with her father, out into the deep snow, to visit the families and Fanny finds the strength to play her role in comforting the widow: ".... remembering Seth himself and how she had liked him, Fanny bent down and put her arms around Mary Locke, and hugged her as tight as she could, smelling the cupboard smell of the best black shiny dress." And she goes up the stairs with her father to say her farewell to Seth Locke. "I shall remember this. I shall always remember." thinks Fanny.

And then, carrying gifts of food and baby clothes, on they trudge to the Tumneys, where a new Christmas baby has arrived. Their many children come out to meet them, *"inquisitive, large-eyed, but silent."* Fanny takes in the poverty of the surroundings, *"a damp, dark little place, close to the pond and set against a high bank that dripped dank growth and creeper."* And for the first time Fanny grasps the social inequities around her: *"And Fanny felt suddenly angry, that Thomas Tumney could not work, and so they had to be poor and wait for other people to bring them food, and ashamed that she had so much, clothes that were warm and bright....and rooms that were full of space in which to be." "I shall remember this too she thought, remember the hot crowded room and the smell of so many children and the wet dog and the boiling bones…"*

That Christmas was a turning point in Fanny's life, with her new knowledge and understanding engraved on her mind: "And after that, it seemed, I left behind my childhood, that magic time, set within a circle and lit from within, so that the memory of it, coming to me down all the years, is golden as the light of a lantern falling across the snow."

My hardback copy of this small enchantingly lyrical book is blessed with the most beautiful black and white wood engravings. I cannot recommend it highly enough. A present for a loved-one next year maybe.

Courier Fraud Alert

West Mercia Police have seen a recent increase in reports of fraudsters operating in Herefordshire, claiming to be from various police services around the country. The crime, known as 'Courier Fraud' has seen the elderly and the vulnerable targeted in Ross on Wye. The police urge everyone to pass on the information about bogus callers to relatives, friends and neighbours who may be at risk to such scams. While these locations have been targeted it is likely other areas will be in the future, so please remain vigilant wherever you live.

The recent trend is for the criminal to telephone a home and say they are a police officer from a UK police force or from New Scotland Yard, for example, and that the victim's account has been compromised. The victim is then instructed to visit their bank and withdraw money cash and to deliver them to a courier using an agreed password. There are variations of this scam. The solution? "**Hang up the telephone**". The simple fact is that no police officer, legitimate bank/building society or business will ever phone you to ask you to give them your bank details, your PIN, or hand over your cash. The police will investigate. However, to help them, get in touch with friends and family to warn them of the risk and to know what to do. These scams can be extremely convincing and manipulative.

While it is difficult to tell how genuine these calls are, they are all, without exception, people pretending to be police officers. Don't trust anyone who calls you about your bank details. If you want to check they are legitimate, find their number via directory enquiries and call them back. If you think someone is trying to scam you, hang up and tell someone straight away. Don't be pressured. Give yourself time to stop and think. **"Please remember the police will never contact you asking for your bank card or cash. If someone does, it's a scam – provide no details and hand nothing over, hang up.** Report it immediately to Action Fraud at www.actionfraud.police.uk or 0300 123 2040 unless you are in immediate risk or feel threatened, in which case always call 999.
