

Reflection on harvest from Dean Sarah Brown

Hoorah!! It is harvest time again!! There you are, hurtling through the lanes in your car on some mission of huge national importance, muttering venomously at cyclists in helmets shaped like wasps' bottoms, inconsiderate enough to want a bit of your road (and hoping they can't lip-read), rounding a bend and coming up behind the ponderous majesty of a tractor and trailer. On closer inspection over the next ten minutes, you conclude that it is actually a convoy of three tractors and two trailers, and the glory of the aforementioned ponderous majesty begins to wear a bit thin!

Hoorah. It is harvest time again. And I would wager a considerable sum that most of you do not at this point start singing songs of everlasting thanks and praise to our great God for his generous provision, or blessing the farmers for the work they do to put food on our plates! So here is your challenge for harvest and beyond. I've learned to do it and if I can manage it anyone can. If you get stuck on your travels behind a tractor or a combine or a plough or any other mysteriously shaped implement of the sod, (by which I mean, of course, the soil!) take it as an opportunity for reflection, for thanksgiving and for praise. Why should you bother?

Firstly because praising God for what he gives us should become a matter of habit in all of us, and secondly because as a nation we owe a huge debt of gratitude to the farmers. They are taken totally for granted by most of us who have become emotionally and practically detached from the source of our food. We cannot and must not take national food security as a given. Climate change and population growth mean that it is more difficult to produce enough grain for the world's needs. Global markets will sell to the highest bidder regardless of need. Political mismanagement and the power of global enterprise in the inherently local business of food production are putting countless family farms out of business.

So when you get stuck behind that tractor take a deep breath, smile and wave at the farmer and ask for God's blessing on his family and work. Reflect on our corporate relationship to food and the land as the God given source of all our well-being and praise God from whom all blessings flow. And if I rush in late to take your service on a Sunday morning you will understand why! Happy harvest to you all.

Public footpath OS Ref 489242 HR2 8QB Starting at Treago Farm going north-west to Priorswood


New residents in the village have been enquiring about local footpaths. Some people may remember that earlier this year a brave band of volunteers planted thousands of trees in Lady Wood, behind Treago Farm! As these are now growing up, many tucked up under the bracken, it would be most helpful to keep any munching deer at bay if walkers would use the public footpath through the wood.

To access it, go up through Treago Farmyard where you will probably meet Moss, the sheepdog who makes lots of noise but he is just defending his home. Having known him since he was a puppy, he still barks at me but he means no harm! Up through the yard you will see two gates. Take the *righthand gate* into the field and walk along the field edge with the fence close on your left. At the corner of the field, you walk diagonally across to the gate to the left-hand corner of the wood. Paul and Ron Evans have kindly made a path across the field.

Once in the wood, the formal footpath goes straight on to the next farm. We are endeavouring to keep the paths/rides in the wood open, so that people can walk round it and see the new trees as they emerge. We also have plans for a bench so that you can pause and enjoy the view over the village.

To everyone out there saying "Really? Barbie??" and wondering if Flicks has gone all girly and daft, the Flicks team says "think again..." because this film is the

cleverest, funniest, wittiest deconstruction of a cultural icon that you will hope to see. Who would have thought that a dressed up, big-haired plastic image of supposed female perfection could successfully skewer, with joyful satire, the patriarchal world? We begin in a Barbie universe where all females are perfect Barbies and "all problems of feminism and equal rights have been resolved". The Barbies believe they have helped solve all the inequalities of the real world – until a kind of worm-hole opens between the candy pink haven and reality. Even uber-Barbie, played wonderfully by Margot Robbie, starts getting feelings of despair and develops flat feet and, worse than anything, cellulite. Barbie, accompanied by bland-blond Ken, take a trip to the real world where they discover how things are actually working in the patriarchy. Deliciously subversive and laugh out loud funny, this film is a riot. And it gives us a chance to go wildly pink for the evening with cakes, wine and all the usual pre-film and interval refreshments. Naturally, children will be welcome on the understanding that they will be accompanied by an adult who will be responsible for their wellbeing--- if they get bored, please take them out!



Humankind: A Hopeful History by Rutger Bremen

This was ultimately a reassuring book which looks at some cherry-picked historical events and shows them through a more positive context that we may not have considered before - eg. when a war was analysed, few people could actually kill anyone in face-to-face combat, the majority of fatalities were caused by remote operators who had no personal connection with the person being killed.

It shows that actually, most of us are decent, kind people but we are led to believe we are all greedy and out for ourselves.

Our favourite examples were: the boys castaway on an island near to Tonga in the 1960s, who contrary to the *Lord of the Flies* legend actually worked together, collaborated and survived for 15 months, the Norwegian prison that treats its inmates

with compassion and respect and has lower reoffending rates as a result and towns which have adopted participatory budgeting, giving everyone a say in how the money is so that they feel engaged and enabled.

It is an easy read but sometimes it is a bit ideological and the handpicked examples illustrate what we pretty much already know, it's a little preaching to the converted.

The Festival Service will be the following day at the earlier time of 5.00pm in order that families with younger children can join us.

The following weekend we will gather again at Much Birch Community Hall for our Harvest Supper where you can enjoy a hot supper of chicken casserole followed by a choice of fruit crumbles. 


hArt at St. Catherine's

Wildlife in our Garden

Writing at the beginning of September, summer seems to have come at last! August, as so often for the school holidays has been generally cool, overclouded and inclined to be wet. The wildlife in our garden has been having a bit of a holiday too, partly because we have not put any food out and partly because we have not been doing much observing. Consequently, birds and some mammals have had to go off into the countryside to find their own food and they have not had to be concerned about us watching them.

However, we have seen one squirrel, then two, coming to the hazel tree right outside our kitchen window where we can see them foraging for nuts as they ripen. I never did put up the night vision camera to look for voles, but the blueberries stopped disappearing anyway, so we lost interest in the voles. Moles have made hills now and then, especially after rain, but in general they have not been much trouble. Of more concern are many mice who have been coming into the utility room, for stored bird feed we think, and which we have regretfully decided to kill by trapping, 13 of them so far.

There are fewer butterflies now. The buddleia is going over and has only an occasional red admiral and small white on it, in spite of warm sunshine. The Verbena bonariensis has a pair of small whites dancing over it, and there was another dark butterfly flitting about the apples but I was too lazy to get up and identify it. The bees are still busy and an occasional dragonfly comes to inspect the bit of garden where we sit.



Nature programmes on TV, and common sense, tell me that I only see a minute fraction of the wildlife that is going about its own business in the wider world, in this country and indeed in this garden. I sometimes wonder whether we should be more pro-active and go to greater lengths to find out more of what is under our noses or flying over our heads, instead of being such armchair observers. As winter approaches, we will put out bird feeders again and seeds and various morsels on the low wall outside our French windows. No doubt these will attract the usual birds and other animals that find it worth their while and more convenient, or even life-saving in cold weather, to risk closer contact with humans than to stay away. The RSPB calls it giving them "a helping hand". In a way though, this makes them less wild, doesn't it? Does that matter?

Book Review

The Midwife by Tricia Cresswell



If you are interested in 19th century history and in women's lives, then this is the book for you. There is a dual narrative, split between Northumberland and London and it has as its themes the deprivation and squalor of the lives of the poor, and the absence of care for pregnant women, whose lives were in jeopardy from the moment they conceived.

In 1830 a naked woman is found on a Northumberland moor after a violent storm – she has no memory of who she is, nor how she arrived there. All that becomes clear is that she can speak French and has an encyclopaedic knowledge of medical matters and midwifery. If this sounds suspiciously like an old trope of an opening, fear not – there is more to this novel.

In London, at a slightly later date, a Dr Borthwick practices as an accoucheur, aided by midwife Mrs. Bates. He is a philanthropist at heart and takes on the care of many poor women in the slums.

"Joanna" in Northumberland succeeds in extricating herself from the violent life of the farm where she was taken after her discovery on the moor and becomes sidekick to a Dr Soames, also a philanthropic individual. Respected by the community and sheltered from financial privation by Dr Soames, she is thrown into chaos after his death. It is here that we begin to understand the link between the Northumberland and the London narratives; where we become aware of her unusual and imaginative solution to her troubles.

There are many layers to this narrative – it has mystery and suspense, whilst also engaging the reader with the harsh realities of the era, where women were uneducated, disenfranchised and forbidden to practice medicine, and ran a high risk of dying in childbirth. The medical details are authentic and raw and bring into focus the sorry situation of women at that time.

It is a highly successful blend of fact and fiction; of fluent story-telling and characterisation alongside fascinating historical detail.

Garden Notes

Why is it that on returning from just a week away, the garden suddenly looks overgrown and unkempt? It can't have changed much, but after a few days elsewhere, I am seeing it with new eyes and want to start making changes. It is the same with the house, which always feels far too full, mostly of books, and at this time of year, bowls of overripe apples and tomatoes. We have been staying in a brand-new lodge house on a farm and have had the luxury of spacious light-filled rooms and a lawned garden where the dogs could charge around without doing any damage.

The upshot of our holiday is that I want to get more light into our book-lined dining room, which is dingy on all but the brightest of days. To achieve this, the ailing lilac tree outside the window must go. It has been slowly dying over the past few years and it is time to remove it completely. That will enable me to dig over the area properly and remove the brambles that have taken up residence amongst its roots and the rose which clambers amongst its branches. I have no idea what variety of rose it is, but it sends up annoying and very prickly shoots throughout the border. It produces beautiful pale pink flowers like crumpled tissues, which then die in the most hideous way possible – great soggy brown clumps of rotten petals that cling and refuse



to fall. The rest of the border is carpeted with *Geranium macrorrhizum*, a useful ground cover plant especially in shade, but here, in front of the window undeniably dull. In amongst it all are a handful of spring bulbs: bluebells, narcissi and aconites. I have no idea how I will replant it yet but certainly nothing above knee-height, perhaps simply more bluebells and aconites for spring and annuals for summer and autumn.

Each summer, I always grow a few annuals that I haven't tried before, some more successfully than others. This year's success has been the annual grass, *Panicum* 'Frosted Explosion', which has beautiful airy flowers just like fibre optic lamps – gorgeous in the border and lovely in a flower

arrangement too. I grew mine as plug plants and then planted them out – far easier than trying to distinguish the seedlings from other grasses if sown directly in the border.
