

Letter from Bishop Richard

I have just read the Rule of St. Benedict, to my shame for the first time. It is a monastic rule from the 6th century that sets out the disciplines and structures for the effective running of a monastery. The rules of poverty, chastity and obedience are highly restrictive; the punishments for violations severe; the lifestyle highly demanding. Praying at set offices eight times a day (including at two o'clock in the morning) meant that the monk would rarely get more than few hours of unbroken sleep. Central heating was for wimps and the diet uninspiring. Although eased in later centuries, it has been the basis for the monastic tradition in Western Europe ever since. It's not the sort of discipline that works in everyday life, but that doesn't mean it has no value. It is designed to foster Christian virtues of humility, and obedience (albeit expressed through submission to the Abbot), and a growing Christlikeness.

Most of March will be the season of Lent, when we Christians have traditionally given up things that give us pleasure to focus on our spiritual journey. As our world has changed, it seems increasingly anachronistic. Our culture screams at us from the lifestyle sections that the way to real fulfilment is getting what you really desire. The idea that giving something up might be good for you, other than as a grudging acknowledgement of post-Christmas weight gain, is anathema. Consumerism works by creating desire and then offering to fulfil it. But our strongest desires are not necessarily our deepest ones. Giving things up or fasting can get us in touch with these deeper desires that only God can satisfy. There is evidence that restricting calories by intermittent fasting or turning our mobiles off is actually good for us physically and psychologically. A good Lent can be like leaving the Christmas presents unopened under the tree until Christmas day. There is a joy in the opening that is enhanced by the waiting. So, as well as helping us grow closer to God, our Lenten restraint can amplify the joy of Christ risen when we get to that glorious Easter celebration. I once gave up tea and coffee for Lent and had my first large cup on Easter morning. Before I knew it, I'd done three services and built a compost heap! Lent can be spiritual dynamite.

Hot air ballooning

People often ask me how I got into the hobby of hot air ballooning. It was over 50 years ago when I saw a balloon flying in the skies of Nottingham in 1969. I had just passed my driving test so set off to follow it. I met the pilot Wing Commander Gerry Turnbull and from that time spent virtually every weekend, travelling over the country to crew for him both in gas and hot air ballooning. I was totally smitten, but it took two years of crewing before I managed to get a flight. I flew with Don Cameron, but it wasn't the best because it was a murky, grey day in Newcastle. Some of you may have heard of Don as he is a well-known balloon manufacturer in Bristol.

Hot air ballooning wasn't quite so sophisticated as it is now. We didn't have fans to blow cold air into the envelope; we had to flap – quite hard work! The burners weren't powerful either, and so someone had to go into the envelope holding up the fabric often with the help of a brush. The hapless individual was called *Cremation Charlie*, and it wasn't unusual for them to lose their eyebrows. We didn't have mobile phones so we needed a link at home so the pilot could phone in to give their landing site to help the chase crew locate them.

Many years later, we have fans to inflate the envelope, powerful burners, mobile phones and iPads for our maps. Much more sophisticated, but the end result is still the most beautiful experience.

It's an amazing sport and I am privileged to have flown over the Alps from Switzerland into Italy at 22,000 ft – it was incredible. I have also flown in Europe, Dubai, Oman and Chile – my favourite though is Italy where I go to a festival every year. You may see me more locally though - look out for a yellow, green and blue hot air balloon called Borne Again.



As I write, we are preparing for the season of Lent. Our Palm Sunday walk on Sunday 24th March starts at Pencoyd Church at 10.00am with the blessing of palms. We then walk to Llanwarne Church for a service. Do get in touch if you would like a lift one way. It is not a long walk, and it gives us a chance to share time with others across the benefice, reminding us of Jesus's entrance into Jerusalem.

We are delighted that Canon Julian Reindorp, a retired priest from Richmond London is coming to lead our Last Hour Service of prayer and reflection on Good Friday at 2.00pm. He is also taking our Easter Communion at 10.00am on Easter Day. Do join us to celebrate.

We are holding a simple soup and cheese Lent Lunch at the Dower House, Treago on Wednesday 28th February from 12.00 to 2.00pm. HR2 8QB. Do come and enjoy some company and make a cash or cheque donation to the Hereford Food Bank.

In January, the Parochial Church Council met in church. The main item on the agenda was to discuss an exciting new project to update the Audio Video provision to support the church's future ministry. At the moment the AV equipment in church is not adequate for its efficient use. As many people know, we livestream our bi-monthly services and this has become really challenging. When we try to include any video material, the system can fail, and the loop for those with hearing difficulties is getting old and inefficient. Stephen Herbert has taken a great deal of trouble to investigate the best way forward with this project. Supported by Peter Hallewell and Richard Day, they met representatives of *Distributed Sound and Video Ltd*. This company specialises in working with churches and is used to dealing with the complications of appropriate permissions in The Church of England. One of the main aims for any system is that it should be really simple and useable by any competent person.

We hope to complete the audio work before our new vicar arrives in early July as we have the appropriate permission for that. However, the whole AV system is expensive, and we will need to undertake ambitious fund-raising for this. While these plans for the future are exciting, we shall not neglect the ongoing essential maintenance of our church. We are most grateful to all those who support the church financially on a regular basis so that we can plan for the future.

After many, many years of service on the PCC and on a number of occasions as churchwarden, Gillie Hallewell has decided to step down. We thank her for her huge commitment to the work of the church in our parish, and look forward to seeing her as usual in church.

More exciting news is that the *Life Link Chaplain* should be appointed soon in preparation for starting work with John Kyrle School and primary schools in the summer term. This is a new role, supported by the diocese, our parish and others across the deanery, to work with young people from primary to senior school.

Looking ahead, book the date of Sunday 2nd June will be the church fete and open garden at Treago. Jim Poyner and friends will be bringing his stationary engines again, and we hope to have some vintage cars on display.

The magical opera *The Magic Flute* will be performed on June 7th by the *Wild Arts* company who were such a success last year. Tickets are limited to 180 so book soon if you want to come through the *Wild Arts* website.


Garway Stitchers

TUESDAY MARCH 12TH 7.30pm GARWAY HALL £5.00 PAST LIVES

Definitely one of the best films of 2023 and a remarkable directing debut from Canadian/Korean film-maker, Celine Song. *Past Lives* is about what happens when two people re-connect after twenty years, having lived half a world apart. At twelve years old, Na-young and Hae-sung form a deep connection which is severed when Na-Young moves from Korea to Canada. Their lives diverge, Na-young becoming a budding author while Hae-sung battles through military service in Korea and studies to become an engineer.

In their twenties they connect again through social media and their bond comes vividly alive. Were they really always fated to be together? Had they made wrong choices? Or was this new awakening a romantic illusion? When Hae-sung comes to New York after a failed relationship, he finds his old love deeply embedded in a new culture and happily married to writer, Arthur.

But this film avoids cliché and romantic tropes. It says a lot with silence where the audience is left to experience the complicated emotions of all three protagonists. Ultimately, it's about paths not travelled, cultural divides and a bittersweet nostalgia for a deep relationship which could, perhaps, have been more. Brilliant performances and wonderful cinematography combine to make this a truly memorable film. Director Carol Morley's imagining of British artist Audrey Amiss tricking her frazzled social worker into making a wayward road trip with her to her native Sunderland. The real life Amiss studied at the Royal Academy in the 1950s but never finished her studies due to mental illness. However, she spent every day of her life making art – paintings, drawing, jottings, collages using junk mail and bits of magazine so that when she died in 2013 a vast, unknown eccentric oeuvre was found. Going through Amiss's work, Carol Morley found the artist's passport in which she declared her occupation to be Typist, Artist, Pirate, King. This is an affectionate, often riotous portrait of an artist who slipped notice during her lifetime and contains two wonderful performances by Monica Dolan and Kelly MacDonald.

Friday March 8th 7.30pm. Our second Borderlines film is **TOTEM**, from Mexican director, Lila Aviles. Sol is a seven-year-old girl picking up bits of conversation and behaviours in her family that tell her the world, as she knows it, is about to end. Her father is ill with cancer and there are preparations afoot to give him a final birthday party. The film is remarkable for the way it sees ongoing events through the partial understanding of a child. Never sentimental, it brilliantly juxtaposes the sadness of life with humour and hilarity: for example, a medium, brought to the house to cleanse it spiritually casually informs the family that she also sells Tupperware. Naturalistically shot, and brimming with a menagerie of animals, the film places one human family within the natural cycle of beauty, life and death. Green Garway Book Group

We are discussing *Ravenous* by Henry Dimbleby in February but at time of writing unfortunately we haven't yet met! Fear not, I have already read it so you can read my own opinion of this book instead!

Why Our Appetite is Killing Us and the Planet, and What We Can Do About It.

In 2019 Henry Dimbleby, at the time lead non-exec director at DEFRA, was commissioned by the government to write a national food strategy for the UK. He presented his findings to the Environment, Food & Rural Affairs Committee in 2022 and this book is a version of that report that is informative and accessible for public consumption. It deals with the whole of our food system from field to fork, and makes valid and sensible recommendations about what changes are essential to ensure our food security for the future.

There are a few points that left me with an aftertaste of frustration and despair. Many of the recommendations made have yet to be implemented and because they contradict our current economic structures of profit over good, it is no wonder we are left confused as consumers as to what is best for us and the planet.

Our food system predominantly prioritises quantity over quality to maximise profit for the food manufacturers and supermarkets, encouraging us to buy more than we need. This leads directly to food waste that at the same time we are offering initiatives to combat.

Our unwitting temptation to the cheaper, unhealthier ultra-processed foods has also led to over 25% of adults and children in the UK considered obese (compared to under 15% in 1992). Instead of prevention and taking action on the production techniques that must have some causal link to this massive increase, we have a broken window fallacy of creating more drugs and costly NHS procedures to deal with the outcome.

The government can, and crucially needs to intervene. Some leaders of food companies have been asking for government intervention as they recognise the damage that they are causing with their products but in order to change for the better, regulation is needed to make it a level playing field.

Also urgent is much better education in our schools about food and eating healthily. When school may be the only place for learning about this for some children, we are letting them down as the provision of it currently is ineffective and more of an afterthought. The curriculum means that children need to choose food tech as a GCSE option rather than it being an essential skill. In my opinion, health should be given the same gravitas as the core subjects.

I thoroughly recommend this book to anyone interested in our beleaguered food system and wanting to understand more about its failings and what could and should be done to improve it.

FAST FIBRE BROADBAND OPPORTUNITY FOR ORCOP HILL

Many Orcop Hill residents will have received a letter from Openreach inviting them to sign-up for a scheme that could provide them with broadband speeds of up to 1Gbps (1000 Megabytes per second).

The scheme covers the area served by the Wormelow telephone exchange, mainly Little Birch, Much Birch and Much Dewchurch. However, it also includes the northern part of the parish of Orcop, including Orcop Hill. If you are eligible, you should already have received a letter from Openreach.

We suggest you read this letter carefully as it is an important one-off opportunity to access very fast broadband. It may not suit everyone. Some may not want internet access at all, and others may be happy with the connection they already have.

If you do wish to take advantage of this offer, please follow the instructions in the letter and do not delay as the deadline for receipt of pledges is 31st March 2024.

ANOTHER SKIRRID?

Amongst my Christmas presents was a wonderful map of Herefordshire. The packaging indicated it dated from 1760, but I believe it is much earlier, because it records various information and events dating from the 16th century, with no reference to later information. Amongst the events recorded is the rather alarming story, transcribed below, of what appears to be a major geological movement on a fault or fissure in 1576. Most readers will be familiar with the fissure that opened up in the Skirrid Mountain. Legend has it that this fissure opened on the birth, or crucifixion, of Jesus Christ, but its date seems uncertain. The event recorded below looks similar and perhaps both were triggered, more or less simultaneously, by a minor earthquake. The location of Marcley Hill appears to be between Putley and Woolhope.

If any readers can throw further light on this, I should be pleased to hear from them. (garratt_peter@hotmail.com)

"Marcley Hill in the year 1576, after shaking and roaring for the space of three days, to the great horror, fright and astonishment of the neighbouring inhabitants, began to move about 6 a clock on Sunday evening and continued moving or walking till 2 a clock on Monday morning. It then stood still and moved no more. It carried along with it the trees that grew upon it and the sheepfolds and flocks of sheep grazing on it. In the place from whence it removed, it left a gap of 400 foot wide and 320 foot long. The whole spot whereon the Hill stood contained about 20 acres. It overthrew Kinnaston Chapel, that stood in its way, removed an yew tree growing in the Chapel yard, from the West to East throwing down with violence and overturning the causeys, trees and houses that stood in the way of its progress."

Wildlife in the garden

Did you take part in RSPB's Big Garden Birdwatch this year? We did once again, but perhaps more as a duty for the benefit of science and wildlife than for our own reward, as it followed exactly the same format as previous years. Also our own birdlife does not seem to have changed much during the years I have been writing about it.



Along with the national findings and the rest of Herefordshire, house sparrows were our most numerous birds with 7. Although nationally, and in the county blue tits were next most numerous, on the day we did

our count, in our garden it was chaffinches which came second with 6. Blue tits only came in third equal with great tits and great spotted woodpeckers (2 of each). This is not what we had expected, because most days we see many more blue tits and could not be confident that the woodpeckers would show up at all.

We are always disappointed when some rarer birds which we may have seen occasionally during the winter do not appear on the day chosen for the survey and we are not able to include them in our results. We have to remind ourselves that the results are compiled by a computer which has no interest in individual gardens and certainly none at all in what has turned up in our particular patch, however fascinating it may be to us! We find it hard to remember that for science, large numbers are more significant than small ones. In this case, the larger the numbers of households taking part, the more useful are the results of the survey. What we find here on any one day is of very little significance, until it is put together with the findings of hundreds of other participants, when all the oddities and blips get evened out by the statistics.

I promised to keep reporting on the squirrels. The only thing we have noticed is that it is always the same two who visit us now and usually both together. We feel fairly sure that they are a breeding pair, or at least about to be.

Have you heard about the Archenfield Community Environment Group, based at Llangrove? I think they are a fairly new organisation, with an interest in all things to do with biodiversity, our changing climate and energy use. They hold a variety of events, usually in Llangrove Village Hall, including talks, discussions, wildlife walks, litter picking and a repair cafe. I am hoping to get to a talk about our local mammals on the 22nd February at 7 pm. Newcomers are always welcome and they are very friendly. Garden Notes

When I cut down the old lilac tree in November and dug up the roots, I unearthed various bulbs. I sorted them into piles for replanting – bluebells, narcissi, a few snowdrops. There were always a few winter aconites under the lilac tree, but I wasn't entirely sure what the bulbs looked like. I particularly wanted to rescue them as their bright yellow flowers are such a cheerful sight in January, flowering even before the snowdrops. I can recognise a bluebell bulb, tulips etc. but I wasn't sure what the others in the pile were. I potted them all up hoping some might be winter aconites. Four pots turned out to be aconites. As for the rest of them - oh, the disappointment - it seems that I have 17 pots of cuckoo pint... Needless to say I will



not be replanting those. Winter aconites are happiest where they get winter sun and summer shade and as I have several areas like this here, I have ordered a few more to cheer up January and February. Like snowdrops, they are happiest and suffer less stress if they are planted in the green - the bulbs are small and dry out too much if stored.

I was looking through some old photographs the other day and came across this picture of some flowers I grew some thirty years ago. They

were so dainty and pretty that I fancied growing them again, perhaps around the edge of my summer pots. They are tiny, in cream, yellow, orange and rose, all with a yellow eye at the centre. But could I remember their name? My friend identified them as *Leptosiphon androsaceus* (syn. *Linanthus androsaceus*) or False babystars. The seeds are very difficult to find but I have found someone on Ebay, of all places, who can supply them.



I have been browsing the seed catalogues looking for flowers for my summer pots. I am tempted to try *Ptilotus exaltatus* which grows 12-15" tall and has silvery-green foliage and 3-4" feathery bottle brush flowers. Variety 'Matilda' is a soft rosy-lilac; 'Joey' starts out silver and changes to neon pink at the tips.

Back in November our dogs found a baby hedgehog wandering around the garden. We weighed him and found he was far too small to hibernate and survive the winter – only 270g. We created a des res for him in an old pet cage complete with a cosy bedroom and a supply of bedding materials. He has nightly meals of hedgehog kibble and kitten food (higher in protein than the cat food normally recommended) and he is thriving. We had his droppings

analysed and the vet gave him a wormer to deal with the inevitable worms that he had. We weigh him regularly and he has nearly doubled in size. We are looking forward to releasing him in the garden in late March/ early April when he should be a big bruiser of 700-800g. Julie Davies

Book Review

Heartbreak Hotel by Deborah Moggach

Moggach, who authored the novel that spawned the highly successful film *The Best Exotic Marigold Hotel*, returns in this novel to the hotel theme, a setting ripe for character cameos and relationship opportunities.

71-year-old much-married/divorced Buffy, a mediocre retired actor, is unexpectedly bequeathed a large run-down B&B in a small Welsh border town by a former lover. On his own, and jaded by his rackety London life, he decides to decamp there and try and make a go of it. Assorted offspring and step-offspring roll up to help him move in. The building is in a state of decay with mushrooms growing on the wainscoting, Bakelite light switches and an overgrown garden.

Myrtle House attracts a wide selection of slightly shop-soiled, down-at heel customers who roll up, unwittingly seduced by a website that promises courses for the newly single. In the main they are simply after a new partner, but feign interest in the lack-lustre, somewhat cobbled together "courses", some of which, like the gardening course, are designed by Buffy to get long overdue jobs done.

During his hilarious "How to talk to Women" course he finds himself seated at a café table with one of the female guests, where they sink knee-deep in an indulgent grumpy old man/woman conversation where they exchange dislikes in quickfire succession:

"People who drink tea with a bag hanging off the edge on a string, people who say five and twenty past 12 instead of 12.25, people who say 24/7, people who glug from water bottles in the streets, joggers, people who say "Love you" when they are finishing a mobile phone call, people having any sort of conversation on their b****y mobile, car stickers saying "Keep your distance – baby on board", dachshunds (their legs are too short)"

They fire particular venom at the elderly, in spite of being in that category themselves: *"elderly couples holding hands, striding along with ordnance survey maps, living forever hoovering up their children's inheritance, going on cycling holidays together, being each other's b****y best friend. I think they should*

be culled, they've had their fun, it's time for them to go – there should be trained marksmen stationed at National Trust properties ready to shoot...."

This is a thoroughly enjoyable book, steeped in casual wit, whilst also gently sympathetic to the minefield of human relationships and the sad process of ageing and becoming irrelevant. *"How did I get so old? It seems like only last week I was packing my school satchel."* But it is a fun read with lots of jokes from city dwellers about country life: Village Mobility Scooter Formation Trophy Team; Museum of Sheep Droppings.

Oh – and there are Herefordshire references which might interest local readers.

Saint of the Month

Editor's comment: Over the years various people send in articles of general interest. A Lay Reader from Sussex has sent me some information on well-known saints.



The saint most people associate with March is, of course, St Patrick, whose feast day is on 17th. He was born in Cumbria in Roman Britain. His father was a deacon from a Roman family of high social standing, and his mother was a close relative of Saint Martin of Tours.

When he was 16 years old, Patrick was captured by pirates who took him to Ireland, where he was sold into slavery. His job was to tend sheep for a high priest of Druidism, and Patrick came to view his enslavement as a test of his faith. During his six years of captivity, he became deeply devoted to Christianity through constant prayer, and in a vision, he saw the children of pagan Ireland reaching out their hands to him. He grew increasingly determined to convert the Irish to Christianity.

Around 408 AD, Patrick had a dream in which a voice promised him he would find his way home to Britain. He convinced some sailors to let him board their ship, and after three days of sailing he and the crew abandoned the vessel in France. After Patrick was reunited with his family, he studied at Auxerre in France, and was ordained a deacon. But he never lost sight of his vision, and when he was ordained a bishop, the Pope sent him to Ireland to spread the gospel to non-believers and to support the small community of Christians already living there.

Upon his arrival Patrick was met with resistance, but he managed to spread Christian teachings far and wide, through his preaching and writing, and by countless baptisms. He incorporated pagan rituals into church practices, and he created the Celtic cross (see above) by combining a native sun-worshipping symbol with the Christian cross. He died in about 461 AD.

Many legends have been associated with his life, including how he expelled all the snakes from Ireland and that he explained the Holy Trinity using a three-leaved shamrock. And every year, on March 17th, Irish people throughout the world remember the man they call '*the Apostle of Ireland*'.
