



The Goldfinch by Donna Tartt

Yes, yes the 'green' link is tenuous but this was suggested as our August read by one of our members. This is a review in advance of our meeting so these are just my thoughts three quarters of the way through - it is a mighty tome at over 800 pages but it has been a very enjoyable read and I'm glad to have finally (nearly) read it.

It follows the story of young Theo, who devastatingly lost his beloved mother in a bomb blast at a museum they were visiting and how life pans out for him having decided to pocket a famous painting that was on display there at the time.

He is rescued by various inappropriate adults and his life certainly goes off the rails for periods until he finds relative sanctuary with an antique furniture restorer.

It has echoes of *Demon Copperhead* about it and has some great descriptions of the characters in his life.

I'm giving it 3.5/5 so far.

Wildlife in our Garden

This month I have more to say about birds than other animals. Firstly, although earlier in the year tits, sparrows and chaffinches were seen every day, the tits and chaffinches are now mostly heard, not seen. This is no doubt because we have stopped putting out food for them either on the wall or in feeders. They have been replaced by the blackbirds and robins who seem to find plenty to eat on the lawn or in the trees right by our house where we can watch them. The blackcaps and chiff-chaffs which we heard frequently earlier in the year are now silent, and even the song thrushes who were very audible in early July, are now, at the beginning of August, also silent.

Now I must confess to a most unfortunate episode. There is an extractor fan in the kitchen which has a duct to the outside. The expelled air exits through a plastic vent with two flaps which lift up as the air comes out. One of the flaps had broken off some months ago. When the other also broke off, I decided the vent should be replaced with a new one. When I started to remove the old one, I notice a lot of moss and sticks and bits of grass in the duct which I assumed had been blown in by the wind. As I started to remove these, I found more and more further in, until suddenly I realised I was removing a bird's nest, old I thought and hoped. Just as it seemed to be about clear, to my horror I found a small bird, apparently not far off fledging. I did my best to put it and the nest back, but made rather a mess of it. Then I noticed a female sparrow watching from a nearby bush. When I removed myself and the steps I'd been using, the mother flew to the vent, looked puzzled but didn't go inside. I decided that further intervention would only make matters worse and the only thing to do was to leave the birds to themselves while we went off on a week's holiday.

A few days after we got back, I watched the vent for a good 15 minutes from a discreet distance. No bird came or went, so I concluded that the nest had been abandoned and the fledgeling flown or dead. I then made a further attempt to clear the duct which seemed to be going well. Just as I thought I had finished and it was about clear, a small bird suddenly flew out over my shoulder, giving me a start. Then I found I had tipped out 3 or 4 grey speckled eggs, which had smashed onto the floor. Shaken, I cleared up the mess, and finally installed the new vent.

I really feel very bad about this act of destruction, however unintentional. I can only try to excuse myself by recognising my lack of knowledge and experience. I am surprised and amazed by the little bird's perseverance in going on to try and produce another brood when its first nest had been virtually destroyed. I wonder whether it will try yet again in another place. I try to comfort myself with the thought that house sparrows seem to be numerous around these parts, even if they're not doing so well in other parts of the country.



Oh, by the way, the harmless little bunny rabbits I mentioned last time have now discovered that our vegetables are very tasty after all and are working their way through them. Perhaps I should consider it nature's pay back!

Book Review

The Boy in Striped Pyjamas, by John Boyne

Bruno is a 9-year-old boy living in comfortable circumstances in Berlin with his parents and 12 year old sister Gretel at the time of the Second World War. His father is posted to Auschwitz to become commandant and the whole family decamps there, much to the disappointment of the children who have to leave their friends, their grandparents and their easy life. Bruno is lonely and bored, devoid of playmates and places to visit, and wanders off to the wire fence, beyond which he knows that there are people identically dressed in striped outfits – he has seen this from his bedroom window.

It is necessary to suspend belief somewhat as it seems Bruno has no idea what Auschwitz is, who the people on the other side of the wire fence are and what is happening there; and he is able to meet up with a Jewish boy Shmuel and strike up a friendship from the other side of the wire. He mistakes the word Führer for Fury and believes the place they are living to be called Outwith, both carefully selected and apt misapprehensions. Boyne argues that most people the world over had no idea what was happening there. He sees it as credible that Bruno and ordinary German citizens would have been equally ignorant. Juxtaposing an "extreme of evil", in the form of the Holocaust with an "extreme of innocence" in the person of Bruno is central to the book.

The novel has come in for much praise and much angry criticism. Boyne describes his story as a "fable" and is adamant that it is not intended as a historical document nor a simple work of fiction. Critics point out the very obvious factual flaws: the idea that Shmuel might have been able to get away to engage in conversations with Bruno makes no sense; and crawling under the electrified fence has no credibility. They argue that the Holocaust should not be the stuff of fable and that Boyne's book does a disservice to Holocaust education. But the inconsistencies are so transparent that we are invited to look beyond them and see them as a vehicle for an emotionally-charged message.

The ending of the book is profoundly sad.

Who is the book aimed at? It is certainly not an adult book – the narrative is moving, but the messages are too obvious to satisfy an adult reader. But it is certainly not a children's book – it is necessary to be "in the know" in order for the narrative to have any meaning, and do we really want our children to be confronted with such a prime example of inhumanity? So, maybe young adults; but the brightest of these will see the flaws and perhaps be tempted to dismiss the message, what Boyne calls the "moral centre of the book."

"And who decided which people wore striped pyjamas and which people wore the uniforms?"

Garden Notes

We might have complained bitterly about the weather this spring and summer but, generally, the plants in this garden have loved all that rain. The shrubs and ferns especially have put on the most phenomenal growth and our paths have become quite narrow due to the lush planting.

Ten years ago, I planted the pretty miniature rambling rose 'Open Arms', not against a wall but in a border so that its stems could arch up and over the other planting (it only grows six to ten feet high). At its base I planted *Clematis x triternata* 'Rubromarginata'. Every year I have had the delightful combination of clusters of peachy-pink roses mixed with the starry purple and white flowers of the clematis and very delightful they have been too. This year the clematis has gone berserk; somewhere underneath the huge mound of foliage and pretty scented flowers is my poor rose. It is not only the rose that has been smothered but also ferns, *Viola cornuta* and Welsh poppies, half the border really. It is partly my own fault because, being busy building the greenhouse, I forgot to prune back last year's growth in the spring. As this clematis flowers on growth made the same year, next spring I will cut it hard back to almost ground level.

Back in June I wrote about some unidentified seeds that I had sown. They turned out to be the lovely Nicotiana



langsdorffii which pleased me greatly as I love its dainty lime green tubular flowers. I grew so many plants that I was able to plant them all around the garden wherever there was a gap and, in doing so, inadvertently discovered the best plants to combine them with. They look fabulous with the vibrant pink flowers of annual lavatera, *Malva trimestris*. They look good with the dangling red tassels of *Amaranthus caudatus*. They are tall growers, up to four feet, but being 'see-through' they also look good mixed with the purplish-pink bottle-brush flowers of *Liatris spicata*. I will be saving seed from them again this year but this time I will remember to label the envelope! I will also be saving seed from my rusty foxglove, *Digitalis ferruginea*, which,

with its interesting orange-brown flowers, is one of my favourite foxgloves. They seem to have done even better than usual this year with many side shoots to prolong the flowering.

MORE ON SWIFTS

Thanks go to Regina Brymer for drawing attention to an article about swifts that appeared in the "Daily Mirror" on 28th July. Here is an edited extract from that article, which seems an ideal follow up to the article on swifts that appeared in the August issue:



In the Kent seaside town of Broadstairs, much wild screaming was heard on a recent balmy evening. This was not a riot or an all-night rave, but the sounds of hundreds of swifts, known as "screaming parties" swooping through the air to feed on insects.

This distinctive sound is a result of Kent's first artificial swift colony at Broadstairs College after it teamed up with Thanet's Wildlife Conservation and the RSPB to install 21 nest cavities at the top of the 15m-high building. Sleeping, eating, bathing and even mating on the wing (while flying), swifts rarely

touch the ground. They are also the fastest birds in level flight, with an impressive top speed of 69mph.

Every May they arrive from Africa – a migration of 3,400 miles which they undertake twice a year, stopping off to refuel in places like Portugal and France. They stop to raise their young, pairing with the same mate and return to the same site each year for nest renovation before laying and incubating their eggs.

They like to live in houses and churches, squeezing through tiny gaps to nest inside roofs. But while old buildings are demolished, swift nest sites are fast disappearing. And along with the decline of insects, habitat loss, and climate change – extreme weather affects breeding and migration – it is thought almost 60% of UK swifts have disappeared in the last 25 years.

The species was also added to the red list in the 2021 UK Conservation Status Report, the highest conservation priority, and swifts need help. Adding a swift box to an existing house or a swift brick in any kind of new build could give them a place to rest and raise a family. Ideally, swift boxes face north/northeast.

Dr Rob Stoneman, director of landscape recovery at Wildlife Trusts, said: "Swifts, swallows and martins are some of our most iconic breeding birds. Sadly, these birds are in decline. With a bit of diversity and structure, a garden can become a haven, providing nesting sites, shelter and food."

You can also record any nests near you at swiftmapper.org.uk and if there is a new development in your area, make sure plans include a ratio of one integrated universal brick per dwelling. More work is needed to ensure this species and its delightful sound doesn't disappear from our summer skies.

Diary of the Revd William Poole, The: Perpetual curate of the parish of Hentland & Hoarwithy

Introduced and edited by Frances Phillips.

Towards the end of 2021 a Victorian diary, quarter-bound and with marbled boards, was donated to a charity shop in York. Among the handwritten entries, the words 'Hentland and Hoarwithy' were noted, enquiries made and the diary returned to the minister of the Herefordshire parish of that name. Covering the years 1857–62, the diary was identified as belonging to the Reverend William Poole – the wealthy curate responsible for transforming Hoarwithy's chapel of ease from 'an ugly brick building' into one of the county's loveliest and most surprising churches.

Beautifully written, the entries range from the small-scale dramas of Poole's domestic life and parish work, to revealing insights into political, social and world events. With the privacy afforded by the diary, he writes with candour and feeling, often berating himself or railing against others for perceived failings. But if the diary appears to confirm the reputation of Poole as difficult and irascible, it also betrays the humanity and sensitivity of a complex man.

Featuring a brief biography of Reverend Poole alongside the transcribed and edited entries, this book offers a fascinating contemporary view of nineteenth-century life as a rural curate.

Revd Dr Frances Phillips, MBChB DA, FdA (ministry) is retired associate minister of the St Weonards Benefice, which includes the parish of Hentland and Hoarwithy.

Some people may remember Frances talking about this diary which she received when working in our parishes. She spent many hours editing the diary, and this attractive bound book with beautiful illustrations by our own local artist Tracy Somerville is now available to buy from Logaston Press for £10 or from Frances herself.
