Vicar's Letter

It's that time of year when I find myself inexplicably craving period costume dramas on the tele — all those awkward stilted conversations and heaving bosoms - and big bowls of hearty soup. We all go conkers bonkers and start to dig out our cosy knits. All, we hope and pray, is safely gathered in. Another month, another tender love letter from the natural world around us, generously abundant in beauty and enchantment as the seasons roll on.

Generosity has been on my mind of late. I recently attended the funeral of a very dear friend, Sheila. With her wife Sue, Sheila lived her whole life generously. She quietly and gloriously enriched the lives of her friends and her community, and wherever she went she made new and treasured friendships, all over the world. While fear can be useful in helping us to make good and wise choices, at its worst fear can also stunt our compassion. But if we can hold our fear alongside hope, gratitude, and love, it need not define us; we find ourselves with the freedom to live generously.

Maya Angelou said that when we give cheerfully and accept gratefully, everyone is blessed, and I am minded to agree. What might living generously look like for you today? What ways might you be a blessing? Maybe with your time, your patience, your financial resources, your hospitality, your talents, your prayers, your smile? If we know what it is to struggle or to be afraid, perhaps that understanding will encourage us to recognise and respond generously to struggle and fear in others, both friends and strangers.

Now, I'm going to cuddle up in a big cardigan, enjoy some Mr Darcy, and raise a glass to my wonderful friend Sheila.

The Parochial Church Council met and agreed to implement Phase 2 of the improvement to the church Audio Visual system. The new sound system works extremely well. I suspect that you have hardly noticed the new loudspeakers so carefully camouflaged on the pillars.

The next phase is to have a permanent screen available when needed, but hidden away when not in use behind the main arch, and a fixed projector discreetly mounted on a beam. At the moment we are seeking all the proper permissions to undertake this project. We will publish more details in coming months but do talk to me or members of the PCC if you want to know more about this exciting venture.

On Sunday 6th October St Weonards Church will host the monthly benefice communion. We are delighted that Elizabeth Phillips is being baptised at that service, and we look forward to welcoming her with her family.

Green Garway Book Group

Divide: The Relationship Crisis Between Town and Country by Anna Jones

Longlisted for the 2022 Wainwright Prize, this book looks at the disconnect between rural and urban living and how our differences need to be acknowledged and respected and that it is only by collaborating and not playing the polarising blame game that any good for the benefit of all can be achieved.

She covers politics, meat farming, community and other topics in a balanced and fair way from all perspectives. She talks about the dilemma in deciding whether oatgurt or yogurt would be best for the environment and the sad irony of the farmer facing hard times who could only afford to buy a £3 'supermarket' chicken despite knowing this was the very problem that created his own financial difficulties. The frankness of the lady she interviewed about hunting also makes for an interesting read.



Book Review

The Last Devil to Die by Richard Osman

There are two central conceits in this the most recent episode in the witty *Thursday Murder Club Mysteries* series – that a group of respectable pensioners in their retirement village could become sleuths, unfazed by mayhem, drug-dealing and murder – and that the dealers and killers are just everyday respectable folk, steeped in domesticity, moving to areas where there are good schools, proud to have a "son get into the Royal Ballet."

There is so much more to this novel than a whodunnit. The wry humour is present in every line, and the language is a delight. He is a master of "show don't tell", allowing the reader to glean the personalities of the protagonists obliquely – the list of Christmas presents that the group shared tells us all there is to know about both givers and receivers.

But what stands out in this book is Osman's touching, sensitive and perceptive approach to ageing, and to the sad descent into dementia of the highly intellectual husband of Elizabeth, the nominal group leader and former spy.

"But, however much life teaches you that nothing lasts, it is still a shock when it disappears. When the man you love with every fibre starts returning to the stars, an atom at a time."

I can do no better than append some quotes from this rich novel in the hope that these will tempt you to partake:

"Days of death are days when we weigh our relationship with love in our bare hands. Days when we remember what has gone, and fear what is to come. The joy love brings, and the price we pay. When we give thanks but also pray for mercy."

"Mankind finds futility very hard to stomach. People find all sorts of things to give their brief lives meaning. Religion, football, astrology, social media. Valiant efforts all, but everyone knows, deep, deep down, that life is both a random occurrence and a losing battle. None of us will be remembered. These days will all be covered, in time, by the sands."

"That's the thing about Coopers Chase. You'd imagine it was quiet and sedate, like a village pond on a summer's day. But in truth it never stops moving, it's always in motion. And that motion is ageing, and death, and love, and grief, and final snatched moments and opportunities grasped. The urgency of old age. There's nothing that makes you feel more alive than the certainty of death."

"There comes a point when you look at your photograph albums more often than you watch the news. When you opt out of time, and let it carry on doing its thing while you get on with yours. You simply stop dancing to the beat of the drum."

"There is only so much reading you can do, so many cups of tea you can make, before the loneliness crowds in around you. You breathe it in, you cry it out, and the clock ticks slowly, slowly"

Early in July we found a racing pigeon strutting confidently around our driveway. It wore a yellow ring on one leg and a red one on the other. We duly welcomed it with wild bird seed and fresh water and it became very friendly, watching the comings and goings from the top of the gatepost and retreating to the adjacent barn to roost at night. As it was clearly a racer, we named it "Lewis" after the Formula One champion.

We eventually caught it and read the number from the yellow ring. The Royal Racing Pigeon Association has a very efficient website and within an hour of sending them the number they came back with the owner's contact details. We phoned him and he advised that Lewis was in fact a lady, whereupon she was rechristened "Louise". She was a young lady, less than a year old, and she had gone astray on her first race. Having been released in Bath, she should have returned to her loft in Cirencester. Instead, she chose to visit us.

It turned out that the owner had recently had a major hip operation and could not drive. However, as it happened, we were about to have an item of garden machinery delivered from a company in Cirencester, located very close to Louise's loft. After a rather strange negotiation with the said company, they agreed that their driver would take Louise back to their yard and release her from there, in the hope that she would then find her way home. The big day arrived, with landing net, laundry basket wooden prop and string all prepared for capturing Louise. Please can I talk about babies?

We anticipate the arrival of a baby with such excitement and joy, but a baby who is uncomfortable, crying all the time, unable to feed with ease can turn the experience into a nightmare.

Since my early twenties, I have been involved with childbirth and babies. I accompanied many women through the birth of their babies and supported them in the early days of parenthood. I have worked as an antenatal teacher for the National Childbirth Trust, then as a tutor for new antenatal teachers.

When I trained as a craniosacral therapist, it was as though a new thread had been woven into my involvement with birth. I learned how to support babies as they resolve the strains and discomforts of their birth and unfold like little flowers into comfort and peace. My ambition is that every new mother knows about the wonderful resource of craniosacral therapy and cranial osteopathy to help their babies find comfort and relaxation after the adventure of being born.

Women talk a lot about the experience of birthing their babies, but the babies themselves have no words to tell their story, but, If their birth was uncomfortable, they can cry, curl up in discomfort, or turn away from the breast despite it being their lifeline. I have met so many women who tell me "I couldn't breastfeed my baby." Often, though, it is the baby, for whom the twists and turns of birth have been overwhelming, leaving them with inactive tongues, jaws that can't open widely enough or a misshaped palate that doesn't allow enough room in their mouth for the breast. Feeding from a bottle is also difficult for these babies. They take in too much air and then have sore tummies.

Lucy is three weeks old. She wakes every hour and seems reluctant to take the breast. When she does, she only has the nipple in her mouth and lets it go very easily. She will only sleep in the day if she is carried or in a sling. She is gaining weight, is strong and healthy, but not comfortable or happy.

With my hands very gently on her head, I invite Lucy to tell me her story. Her head and neck are feeling compressed, one shoulder is uncomfortable and the muscles under her tongue aren't able to move fully, making it difficult for her to suckle.

Gradually as we converse together through touch, her body starts to relax and open up. Her neck gets visibly longer, her fists unclench, her arms relax. She explores the possibility of using her tongue, sticking it out and moving it around. She does some yawns that seem bigger than she is. Before she leaves, she has a feed, sucking confidently and effectively at the breast. I will see her again next week, but I think life for Lucy and her family will be more comfortable now.

Wildlife in our Garden

Throughout August, we have seen very little activity in the garden. The only signs of nature are what various creatures have left behind them. The most obvious signs are the occasional little heaps of hedgehog stool on the lawn which I have to avoid treading in. It is nice to know hedgehogs are still about in our garden, even though we rarely see them; as a general rule they're only out at night.

Another sign is broken open nut shells. These are mostly hazel or cobb nuts, much beloved by squirrels. They seem to eat them when they're still quite green and often leave two halves of the shell lying about. Squirrels are also burying nuts at this time of year, but it is quite hard to see where they are buried. Sometimes even the squirrel can't find it again! Occasionally we will find a hazel nut shell with a hole in it. The holes are neat, round ones about 1 centimetre in diameter at the end of the shell. This sort of hole is made by either a vole or an ordinary mouse. Apparently, if you see one with a hole on the side of the shell with tooth marks running parallel to the edge, this indicates a dormouse. I have never seen one in this garden, but it is hardly surprising if there are no dormice here, seeing how we are so surrounded by farmland.

Then there are holes in the ground. We have a lot of these, often spoiling our lawn! The tiniest are made by insects, many of whom, including bees, spend much of the winter in underground nests. The most troublesome are the ants which not only burrow but heap up quantities of sandy soil in mounds all over the lawn. The mounds are not so big as those of moles, at any rate not for a year or so, but they are much harder to remove. I wish a hungry green woodpecker would come and eat some of the ants!

Next size up are vole holes. These are about one inch across and are much tidier; they don't make piles of earth outside the burrow. I wonder where the voles put the soil they excavate; it must go somewhere.

Then there are mole hills. I think everyone is familiar with these. I have reached a compromise with moles over the years. I just remove the soil and leave the hole undisturbed, on the grounds that if their burrow is intact, they are less likely to dig further. This is partly true, but sometimes they burrow such a lot, and raise up so many tunnels just under the surface, that in desperation I set a trap. It is amazing what a lot of burrows just one mole can make.

Finally there are rabbits. There are only two places where they seem to have living quarters, under the summer-house and in the wood-shed. Everywhere else they scratch shallow holes, about ten centimetres deep and ten in diameter, but generally rather untidy. They do not seem to be attempting to start a burrow, so why do they do it? Is it exercise, practice for burrowing, sharpening their claws, or is it just that they enjoy digging? *John Oubridge*, 6th September 2024
