Vicar's Letter

If Candlemas Day be fair and bright,

Winter will have another flight;

But if it be dark with clouds and rain,

Winter is gone, and will not come again.

Candlemas falls on 2nd February, an ancient festival that marks the midpoint of winter, halfway between the shortest day and the spring equinox. In pre-Christian times, this day was known as 'Feast of Lights' and celebrated the increase in strength of the life-giving sun as winter turned to spring.

There are many Candlemas traditions around the world. In some churches, candles are blessed. In Mexico, they have a national holiday with processions and dancing and delicious treats called tamales. In France, they eat flip and eat crepes while holding coins. And of course, as our rhyme above demonstrates, international folklore has it that future weather patterns can be predicted by what happens on Candlemas, in some places with different meteorologically-adept animals involved, including badgers in Germany, hedgehogs in Ireland, bears in Hungary, and the world's most famous groundhog, Punxsutawney Phil, in the USA.

In church culture, Candlemas is the feast day of The Presentation of Jesus at the Temple. According to the Gospel of Luke, Joseph and Mary took baby Jesus to the temple in Jerusalem forty days after his birth, a typical custom of the time. There they met a chap called Simeon who predicted that Jesus would become the light of the whole world.

It seems that, whichever way you view it, there is an invitation to look for warmth and light, to look for hope. For me, Candlemas warms my heart with the reminder that God's love is for everyone, not just a select few. It challenges me to find hope in what can feel like a miserable time of year. And it encourages me to find ways to live as a source of warmth and light within and for my community.

I wonder what reminders, challenges and encouragements you will encounter this month. Whatever may be, my prayer for you is that you find yourself blessed with hope, warmth and light.

You're never too old to get the starring role in a Hollywood action movie – that's what 94-year-old actress June Squibb proves in Thelma, a laugh-aloud comedy which is like Mission Impossible done on a mobility scooter. Thelma lives alone in her flat, and is negotiating recent widowhood, computer technology and getting upstairs with typical stubborn panache. When she is scammed out of \$10,000 she decides that victimhood is not her forte and, with the help of her grandson (perhaps the only one of her relatives who sees her as a person, not as a geriatric), decides to get her own back on the perpetrators. She recruits her friend Ben, who lives in a nursing home and has a highly covetable two-seater mobility scooter, to come along for the crime-busting ride.

It's a well-judged film which never descends into patronising mawkishness and doesn't underplay the obstacles everyday life throws up for those whose bodies are getting on a bit. The character of Thelma was inspired by director Josh Margolin's own 103 year-old grandmother who appears at the end of the film voicing a series of authentic Thelmarisms. The annual Borderlines Film Festival will be coming to Garway Hall again this year. One of the very best rural film festivals in the U.K., Borderlines gives audiences a chance to see films which don't all do the normal round of our multiplexes. Garway's two films for 2025 are:

FRIDAY 28th **February – MY FAVOURITE CAKE.** This is a quietly magnificent film from Iran where its depiction of women who don't wear the hijab and who show their hair led to the film directors' offices being raided and their hard drives containing the film being confiscated. Fortunately, they had a hard copy which has made it out to the world. MY FAVOURITE CAKE tells the story of Mahin, an elderly woman who decides that she want to find romance again and so changes her routine in order to seek out a companionable man. She finds Faramarz who himself has got into trouble with the regime by playing a musical instrument in a wedding band. Mahin offers to bake him her favourite cake and this intimate moment provokes a profound outpouring of everything they feel and have in common. A wonderful, brave film that it's a privilege to show.

FOR YOUR DIARIES, TUESDAY March 4th – **HOW TO MAKE MILLIONS BEFORE GRANDMA DIES**. This film from Thailand broke box-office records in several countries across Asia in 2024. A man, driven by his desire for a multi-million dollar inheritance, begins to care for his terminally ill grandmother. However, winning her favour will not be an easy task and he is not the only one with an eye on the money. More details to come in next month's magazine.

Green Garway Book Club

Because of the copy deadline of the magazine I often have to write the review of the book we're reading in advance and assume everyone will have the same opinion as me! So this issue I'm going to summarise our reads of last year and take a quick look ahead at what we're going to read this year. That way I can get back to writing the review AFTER we've read the book!

At our last meeting we discussed our favourite fiction and non-fiction reads of 2024 and although Donna Tartt's *The Goldfinch* came a close second, the winner of best fiction was *Little Wing* by Freya North. It is a novel about resilience, forgiveness and the true meaning of family, about finding one's place in the world

and discovering how we all belong somewhere and to someone, with the most beautiful descriptions of the Isle of Harris in the Outer Hebrides. We rated it 4.5/5.

Our number one non-fiction read last year was our February read - *Ravenous* by Henry Dimbleby. In 2019 Henry Dimbleby was commissioned by the government to write a national food strategy for the UK and this book is based on that report and is really informative and accessible. It deals with the whole of our food system from field to fork and makes valid and sensible recommendations about what changes are essential to ensure our food security for the future. We rated it 4/5.

NEW OWL SERVICE

While a number of other Good Neighbour schemes have not survived long term, the local scheme covering the same areas as this parish news has survived and is now adding a new service to its repertoire. The Owl scheme has delivered medications from Much Birch surgery every week, and at times as an emergency since March 2020. In addition they have provided a community lunch 11 months of the year since 2017. In the past, Owl Good Neighbours provided transport upon request, but since the pandemic this has fallen out of use. It has ceased due to a lack of both volunteer drivers and requests. In addition Owl has supported the warm space initiative on a Thursday mornings in Orcop parish hall. Now however Owl is pleased to announce a new service.

The Good Neighbour scheme in Ross has offered a free service to the Owl scheme, for two years initially. It will take the form of a helpline for non-urgent messages to be passed to the group. The help line which will be available 24/7 and have its own dedicated number and is in effect a virtual call centre. Anyone needing help or with a query can call and leave a message. They will be required to say "one "or press 1 to leave a message and if too shy to leave a message the system will record their number, and a volunteer will ring them back

All volunteers undertake an Enhanced D.B.S. every 3 years and have done safeguarding training.

TRETIRE AND PENCOYD

Our carol singing at Pencoyd this year was a rather different event from the other parishes, and indeed from those in our own parish in previous years. For a start, it was not on a Sunday, but a Monday afternoon. Unlike the last few years, it was under cover rather than outdoors, and I suspect that most of the congregation had probably not come prepared for what did happen! It was a pretty large congregation by Pencoyd's standards, and included parents, children and grandparents. This turned out to be exactly what was needed.

We sang well-known carols interspersed with interesting readings, beautifully read. One poem which was new to me was *Garbriel's Revelation* by Geoffrey Rust. It was quite long so it was helpful to hear half and then to sing a carol before hearing the rest.

Before out final carol we had an enactment of a little sketch which Peter and Liz Everall had introduced us to several years ago. Some people may remember it being performed in Tretire Church. It is called *This is the baby that God sent.* It requires a minimum of seven participants of a varied age range, which was no problem with such a large congregation. We ended up with no fewer than seven sheep and it could have been eight!

Our vicar, Angie agreed to take the leading role of Mary, the mother of the baby. All the other roles were filled with varying degrees of enthusiasm under the persuasion of our churchwarden, and director of the performance, Elizabeth. Each part had a few sentences to say, and there was plenty of scope for audience participation.

The play ended with a large pile of typical seasonal trappings, such as crackers, bauble, holly, cake, turkey and tinsel all completely smothering the baby Jesus, who disappeared under them all. Therein lay the moral of the sketch.........

The whole performance only took about 15 minutes and appeared to be enjoyed by both participants and audience! If you were unfortunate enough to miss it, I wouldn't be surprised if it re-appears by popular demand next Christmas!

Refreshments were served at the end in a lovely warm and happy atmosphere. A carol event with a difference, but the message of Christmas was clear!

On Christmas Morning, it was Tretire's turn to find the church filled with people from across the benefice, who appreciated a communion service in the daytime, rather than at midnight. Again we had well known Christmas hymns which people joined in enthusiastically. There were no refreshments after this service as people were eager to get home for their Christmas celebrations, and some, like us with a journey ahead of them to join with other family members further afield.

So our small parish was fortunate to have two opportunities to meet in each of our churches and celebrate the Christmas story and its significance together.



RAINFALL IN 2024

As for the past twelve years, this commentary is based on records from Whitehouse Farm (on the southern rim of the Orcop Basin at about 800ft elevation) and those kindly provided by John Oubridge for Tretire Smithy (Elevation about 100ft). The two sets of monthly totals are summarised on the bar chart below. I have records for Whitehouse Farm from 2009 to 2024. The average rainfall over this 16-year period is 946mm.

After a very unusual monthly pattern in 2023, 2024 exhibited a more normal rainfall distribution. February lived up to its reputation as a wet month, after only 4mm in February 2023. Otherwise, it is interesting to note that in five months out of the twelve, the totals for Whitehouse Farm and Tretire Smithy were virtually identical, despite the disparity in elevations. The annual total for Tretire was about 90% of that for Whitehouse, as tends to be the case in most years. Most will look back on 2024 as a very wet year and indeed it brought some serious flooding events. However, it is only the 5th wettest in the 16 years of record, with 2023 relegated to 6th wettest. I have been asked whether the records exhibit an increasing trend as a result of climate change. The answer is no, but the record is far too short to throw any light on long term trends.

Trends in Christmas cards 2024

When Meg (Margaret) and I opened our Christmas cards last month, we were struck by the number of brightly coloured cards depicting stylised views of Bethlehem. It seemed to us these were more numerous than in previous years, and that they had increased at the expense of what we call "fat robins". I decided to do a count. The total number of cards was 61, down 3 from last year, a smaller drop than I would have expected. The number of cards picturing robins, or containing robins, was only 7, tending to confirm our impression that Bethlehem is now more popular, at least amongst our friends.

Book Review

Reasons to Stay Alive by Matt Haig

Matt Haig is an English author and journalist who has written both fiction and non-fiction books for children and adults. *Reasons to Stay Alive* charts the course of the depression that he suffered for the first time at the age of 24 and does so with honesty and clarity. He lays bare the sheer hell of his illness whilst also outlining those strategies that helped him to begin to overcome this.

Any other illness that caused over 720,000 deaths a year worldwide would not be treated with an exhortation to get over it or pull yourself together, and this book is a contribution to enhancing understanding and helping loved ones to find constructive responses.

As someone once similarly afflicted many years ago, I was deeply moved by his ability to describe the indescribable; to get to the nub of the mysterious and desperate internal pain and to recognize how very hard it is for anyone to truly grasp the nature of this illness. Sufferers themselves cannot begin to understand it, and yet they need those around them to try and do so. His book goes some way to bridging this gap and his eloquent descriptions of what depression felt like for him are enlightening.

"I wanted to be dead. No. That's not quite right. I didn't want to be dead, I just didn't want to be alive."

"If you have ever believed a depressive wants to be happy, you are wrong. They could not care less about the luxury of happiness. They just want to feel an absence of pain."

Fundamentally he busts the myth that depression has a clear cause:

"Unlike a book or a film depression doesn't have to be about something."

Bereavement or a break-up or long-term stress can make someone feel sad – often very sad – but depression descends from nowhere and paradoxically can exist in the presence of happiness; of loved ones, and beautiful views and kindness. And never forget that someone who has suffered this once will never shake the fear of its recurrence – it dropped from nowhere once and there is no way of being sure it might not do so again.

He looks at the reasons why depression is so widespread and why suicide is one of the major killers of young men. He asks why we now live in "a society which demands we be normal even as it drives us insane" and speculates that "we humans might have evolved too far. The price for being intelligent enough to be the first species to be fully aware of the cosmos might just be a capacity to feel a whole universe's worth of darkness" - and he postulates that the global economy - with its incessant in-your-face encouragement to consume, to buy the latest model, to embrace obsolescence, to be ahead of the game - is set up to encourage dissatisfaction from which flows the consumption that keeps the financial institutions in power:

"The world is increasingly designed to depress us. Happiness isn't very good for the economy. If we were happy with what we had, why would we need more? To be calm becomes a kind of revolutionary act. To be happy with your own non-upgraded existence. To be comfortable with our messy, human selves, would not be good for business."

One of his most important messages is that depression is not who someone is; it is something that is happening to them.

"However much in the foreground depression feels, you are separate to it. This is going to sound cheesy but I'd say: You are the sky. A cloud comes and dominates the sky. But the sky is still the sky. Depression tells you everything is going to get worse but that's a symptom. Don't give depression power – constantly discredit it."

Garden Notes

I am always full of good gardening intentions in autumn, planning to do all sorts over the winter. It never happens. I came out of hibernation briefly on 31st December to plant four packs of spring-flowering bulbs given to us for Christmas by a non-gardening relative. The bulbs were plump and healthy, so I hope they won't mind being planted this late. It felt cruel to plunge them into cold wet compost in the old, galvanised bath, but they stand more chance in soil than cocooned in their cardboard packets. It was, however, lovely to receive a mixture of bulbs that I probably wouldn't have bought for myself. I look forward to a colourful display of orange-red Triumph tulip 'Jimmy', the very unusual *Tulipa* 'Bull's Eye' – a fully double flower which starts as a ball of green petals and opens to reveal a red centre, showy blue hyacinths, deep violet-blue grape hyacinths (*Muscari* 'Night Eyes'), pretty blue *Anemone blanda* and dainty *Scilla*.

On a dingy wet day, I got much pleasure from doing a gardening crossword – even the cryptic clues which I normally avoid - and increased my gardening knowledge in the process. I was pleased that I was able to recall various Latin plant names without resorting to the plant encyclopaedia. I did have to resort to on-line searches for some of the answers though. I finally established that 'A named, deep-purple tulip – blended in sago' was 'Saigon' and I spent a good ten minutes drooling over gorgeous photographs as I scrolled through all the tempting purple tulips on the bulb suppliers websites. As, of course, they are all out of stock at this time of year, I was in no danger of filling my shopping basket with packs of bulbs.

I also learnt that a common name for Pulmonaria or lungwort is Adam and Eve. It is also the common name for several other plants, including lords and ladies or cuckoo pint, monkshood (*Aconitum napellus*) and a North American orchid (*Aplectrum hyemale*) and hence a good illustration of why we are encouraged to use the Latin names for plants to avoid any confusion.

The clue 'Repeat-flowering apricot-pink climbing rose – Arabian Nights hero collapsed' sent me to the internet again browsing through many beautiful rose photographs. Aha, here it is – 'Alibaba'. Pretty obvious when you know. And a 'Deep-pink cactus dahlia...caption changed' is of course 'Pontiac'. In hunting for that one, I discovered several dahlia suppliers I wasn't familiar with and yet again, was amazed at the extraordinary variety of colours and shapes of dahlias.

Enjoyable as the crossword was, the end result (apart from the satisfaction of completing it) was that I started having ideas. Now, where can I plant some dahlias this year? And wouldn't it be nice to have some more varieties of pulmonaria in the garden? And where can I grow a climbing rose?
