


#### **Garway School and Pre-school**

In the event, a congregation of about 15, mostly close relatives, attended what was an extremely moving farewell. The service was led by the Revd. Frances Phillips and included reflections on Peter's life from Stephen and Joseph Tame, Jess Taylor and others. Emma Tame read the poem *Deep Peace*. #### **Orcop Neighbourhood Development Plan - Update**

Please see the Parish Council website for the Housing Delivery Report and meeting Notes of 21 September, 2020.

A discussion took place on 5<sup>th</sup> November with the Steering Group, our Planning Consultant and Herefordshire Council NDP department. The Council had received the Housing Delivery Report and notes of our meeting in order to consider our preferred Option C for housing delivery.

We are grateful that the Council are very supportive as they understand our local difficulties in achieving the development targets laid down. We must thank our consultant for guiding us and presenting a realistic option which he considered could be approved by the council and residents. In all possibilities the Core Strategy and ramifications of any plan were taken into account.

We now await formal agreement to our proposals from the council as more than one department is involved. Another Steering Group meeting will take place with our consultant who will then start drafting the NDP document. A **six week** consultation period then commences which we hope will give all parishioners the opportunity to offer their comments, opinions and suggestions. The consultant will answer any questions which the Steering Group is not able to clarify.

Investigation or a survey regarding foul drainage will not be pursued at this time. It is deemed non- essential for the completion of the NDP and would be a costly process for the Parish Council budget.



#### Wildlife in our Garden

Last month we commented on how quiet the bird life of the garden was in August and September. This continued through October, a very mild month, only the Robin keeping a close watch on any of our activities which disturbed the soil. We also occasionally saw a Wren in the shrubbery close to the house, and a squirrel nosing about near the hedge. Since late in October there has been a Pied Wagtail regularly singing from the ridge of the roof.

The bird feeders went up on 29<sup>th</sup>, peanuts, mixed seed and nyjer seed. To begin with there was a rather unenthusiastic response. At the Orcop Village Market on 31<sup>st</sup>, other people we spoke to also remarked on how few birds they were seeing. But gradually, the usual visitors have been drifting back. On the 1<sup>st</sup> November the first was a Blue Tit on the nuts. Then a Robin tried the seeds. A Greater-spotted woodpecker, female, also came briefly to the nuts. The next day there were the Woodpecker, a Great Tit, a Blue Tit and a Gold Finch, with a male Chaffinch lurking in the hedge. It seems the Chaffinches really prefer to feed off the ground so wait around for other birds to drop seeds for them. The first frost was on the night of the 3<sup>rd</sup> November, and this was followed by a much more enthusiastic gathering: all those above, plus a second Blue Tit, a female Chaffinch, a male Woodpecker and two House Sparrows.

We've heard reports of winter visitors, such as Fieldfares, now arriving in the fields. We do wonder what prompts their migrations? Is it a drop in temperature where they've come from? Or is it shorter hours of sunlight? Or the height of the sun at midday? Or something else? Last month we told you the tale of the weasel and the robin's nest. Now we have another sad tale about a related predator that we have never encountered before. We have kept hens for about 30 years, but in the last few years have just had a couple. On October 28<sup>th</sup> I (M) went down to let them out of their run into the field; only one, Springbelle, emerged, so I imagined the other one, Devon, was on the nest, hopefully laying an egg. They had just finished their moult and were slowly coming back into lay. Unfortunately, Springbelle has developed a bad tendency to peck and eat the eggs, so I returned about half an hour later hoping to catch Devon's egg before Springbelle did. I lifted the lid of the nesting box and could see an egg, not in the nesting box but in the main house. I reached in for it, and as I picked it up the yolk and white poured out; Springbelle had beaten me to it!

But then I saw Devon lying on her side with what looked like a gash on her neck. I reached in for her and discovered she had had her head bitten off. I could only think that a fox had somehow got its head through the very small door of the hen house and just managed to snap off the head. I removed the dead hen and took it up to show John, leaving Springbelle safely (I thought) shut in the run. I went down an hour or so later to check on her and found her on the floor of the run with her head bitten off - so, clearly, not a fox.

I told our neighbours about our loss and they said they thought they knew the culprit, for another neighbour had recently had two fish taken out of his pond, with just their heads bitten off! It seems this is typical behaviour of mink, so when the fish-pond owners had put an electric fence round their pond, the mink had gone for a change of diet and come to our hen run.

We Googled "mink" and discovered that, like otter, they have partially webbed feet and share otter habitat. The stream running through our garden and alongside the hen run brought the mink right to the door of his next meal! John examined the chicken wire which totally encloses our hen run and found a hole in it, 3 inches in diameter, large enough for a mink to squeeze through. The other fact we read was that mink don't eat the chicken; they just bite through the head and drink the blood. So we put the carcases up at the far end of the field for a fox. Both were taken.

During late summer birds are seldom seen or heard in our gardens because this is the time of the moult. Adults shed the feathers which are worn out from the breeding season and grow new ones to see them through the winter months, while the current year's young are growing their first adult plumage. They hide away as it is a vulnerable time for them, especially when they have lost their flight feathers, but the process also takes a lot of energy. August is the best time for the moult, while the weather is still warm enough.

#### **More Nature Notes**

As long-time residents of Tretire we thought you may be interested in some of our observations of the wildlife in the area these past couple of years. We walk a lot, not with bright clothes on, or maps strapped around our neck, but quietly taking in all that is about us at any one time. The following events have been seen in our garden. Some wonderful sights have presented themselves. One in particular was one morning a huge flock of gold finches decided to stop off at our cottage for a rest. There were literally hundreds of them. They were not feeding, just resting in our shrubs, over our trees and along the wire fences. It was an amazing sight. We can only assume these beautiful birds had flocked so as to migrate to warmer climes for the winter. They will travel as far south as the Med. if conditions are right.

Another sight that most of us take for granted is the arrival of the swifts. This year they were very late arriving as the wind was in the north for weeks when they should be in transit. We were in the garden one afternoon, again a strong north wind blowing, and we noticed a few swifts in the air. Being delighted to see them, we watched and to our surprise suddenly a continual stream of these magnificent birds passed overhead, mostly single birds following each other. This flypast continued for well over an hour. None of these birds stopped off at our local farms but just kept going into the wind. I wonder how far they went?

Each year a sight that to us denotes autumn/winter is the arrival of the field fares and red wings. This year it was the 28<sup>th</sup> of September, only a few, but gradually more and more. Normally it is only field fares then the redwings join them. Right now, in early November, they are busy feasting on our holly berries and in the orchards clearing up the fallen apples. Last year we had a lone, very bolshie one, picking up the apples we had put out for all to feed on, and it chased off all the other birds, greedy boy!

A beautiful sight greeted us one afternoon in mid June. It was about midday and for some reason I looked out of the front window, and under the weeping birch tree, where our bird feeders are, was a mother partridge with seven tiny little chicks. They had obviously just hatched and she was taking them off to feed on insects. She quickly fed herself on fallen bird food and off she went with the little ones in tow. Partridge are good mothers, unlike the pheasant. She would wait if one lagged behind, then off again. When they reached the oil seed rape crop we thought that would be the last we would see of them, But no, every day for five days she would appear in our garden with all seven chicks. They grow so quickly and were now really confident and avid feeders. After the fifth day we never saw them again. We looked for her old nest but never found it. I wonder what happened to them all?

The countryside is a wonderful place and nature is always full of surprises. An old gamekeeper once said to me, 'Wild life does not read books, so never be surprised at what you see.'

I hope there is something of interest for all to read. We have many tales if you're interested.

#### **BOOK REVIEW**

#### Love After Love by Ingrid Persaud

I was instantly drawn to reading this book as it takes its title from a Derek Walcott poem that someone sent me shortly after I was widowed. I reproduce it in full here, so that others might savour it.

The time will come
when, with elation
you will greet yourself arriving
at your own door, in your own mirror
and each will smile at the other's welcome.

and say, sit here. Eat.
You will love again the stranger who was your self.
Give wine. Give bread. Give back your heart
to itself, to the stranger who has loved you

all your life, whom you ignored for another, who knows you by heart. Take down the love letters from the bookshelf,

the photographs, the desperate notes, peel your own image from the mirror.

Sit. Feast on your life.

Set in Trinidad and written in rhythmic Trinidadian prose, Persaud's book looks at love in all its forms through the lives of widowed Betty, whose turbulent marriage ended when her husband fell down some steps, and of her young son Solo. Into their lives comes lodger Mr Chetan, a colleague of Betty's and a decent kindly man who takes on the role of father figure to Solo. He gradually slips the boundaries of lodger, sharing household chores and a deep companionship with Betty. And so an unconventional family is born. A family where love and care for each other are predominant and comforting to all. Or, as Betty says: "You should see Mr Chetan and Solo - happy as pappy and I'm like a Wednesday in the middle."

The platonic relationship between Betty and Mr Chetan is central to the household harmony; but, one day, Mr Chetan begins to wonder whether Betty needs him to be a husband to her, and his approaches lead to an evening of honest revelations from both sides over a bottle of rum – revelations that are overheard by Solo.

From that moment the dynamic of this unconventional but settled family is shattered, and Solo leaves home to join the struggles of the illegal immigrant community in America.

The bouncing prose and Trinidadian patois are seductive, once you have accustomed yourself to the absence of speech marks. This is a splendid book that encompasses the bounds of love in all its forms, and the destructive force of convention in our lives.

#### **Garden Notes**

I have spent a very satisfactory morning removing the lower branches from a rather boring conifer in the middle of the garden. The gardening term 'lifting the crown' gives no indication of what the technique involves; after all, the crown isn't actually going anywhere. It is the nearest most of us will ever get to being a sculptor. Just like the Michelangelo saying, when asked the secret of his genius, that he simply removed everything that wasn't David, I prefer to think of 'lifting the crown' as releasing the inner tree from all the growth that prevents it being as beautiful as it could be. (As an aside, there is another quotation attributed to Michelangelo that I love – 'I saw the angel in the marble and I carved until I set him free'. Isn't that lovely?)

Anyway back to gardening - this particular tree was beginning to collide with the adjacent shrubs and, more to the point, was providing a cosy hiding place for the neighbourhood rat. After watching our unwelcome visitor scoot into the depths of the tree yet again, I armed myself with loppers and saws and cut off all the branches to shoulder height. It turned out to be a very prickly job with both my helpful little dog and me acquiring dried needles in all sorts of bodily crevices. Just like a sculptor, it helped to stand back occasionally to view the overall effect and to check the consequences of removing the next branch. It is well worth taking care because it makes all the difference between wrecking a tree and turning a dull or messy tree or shrub into something rather lovely.

It amused me to discover that at each fork fallen needles had naturally accumulated to form a soft comfy bed. On top of each little bed – six in total – was a delicious collection of damsons (still remarkably plump and fresh) and walnuts. I did feel slightly guilty removing these hidden larders but I now have a tree which really adds something to the garden instead of causing me to curse and threaten to call in the tree surgeons. Another reason to keep it is because it is like a multi-storey block of flats for birds at nesting time. Right at the top in the penthouse suite is a pair of pigeons who have nested here for at least four years. They provide us with much amusement when they crash land and try to struggle into their nest with sticks that are far too long.

Many overgrown shrubs such as Rhododendrons, certain Viburnums and Osmanthus can benefit from the same treatment. It is well worth peering inside them to see if there is a beautiful trunk or pattern of branches waiting to be revealed. It is also a very satisfying task to take on. About ten years ago I turned a small *Cornus mas* shrub into a lovely multi-stemmed tree shape. It is now a sizeable tree and although we need to remove a branch or two every year to keep its shape, it is a handsome thing and does attract attention.

On a final note, I was amused that announcing that we were removing the vegetable plot should cause such consternation in the Parish (see Nov. issue). No-one need worry too much – we love our vegetables and we have left a small patch by the greenhouse for our favourite vegetables such as leeks and sweetcorn. We are

planning to grow climbing beans over arches over one of the paths and the greenhouse will be full of yummy things. We won't starve and the garden will still contain plenty of edible plants!

50g cocoa powder additional topping


#### Method

- 7. Break up the dark chocolate and either melt in the microwave or in a bowl over simmering water
- 8. Top the tiffin with the chocolate and add sprinkles of your own choice!
