Vicar's Letter

The secular world may seem to quickly and easily pack Christmas away until next year once holiday time is over, but for the church the season of Christmas continues a little longer. Early in the New Year the church celebrates two dates which complete the Christmas story. On January 6th we celebrate the Feast of the Epiphany when we recall the story of the visit of the - so called - 'wise men' to the infant Jesus, bearing their extravagant gifts, acting as a buffer zone between the baby Jesus and King Herod, offering the first insight into the reality of Christ for all people; which serves to remind us that from the moment of the incarnation the message of the Christian gospel is for all people – Jews and Gentiles, rich and poor, wise and not so wise – everyone is included in the new world order that comes into being with the birth of Jesus.

On February 2nd we have Candlemas when we hear the story of the presentation of the infant Jesus in the temple. It's a day which marks forty days since Jesus' birth when traditionally parents would take their baby to the temple and present an offering to God in thanksgiving. In the temple Jesus and his parents encounter two people, Simeon and Anna. Simeon declares Jesus to be, 'a light to enlighten the nations,' and that image of Christ as the light has led to the celebration of light countering the darkness – which we recall with the blessing and lighting of candles.

The Feast of the Epiphany and the story of Candlemas serve for Christians as a meditation. We hear the last chapters of the story we've been a part of over recent weeks, we ponder the message that the story's end presents to us and for us, and we prepare to travel onwards and to hear once again, through the coming months, the story of Christian faith and Christian life.


For the future the magazines will be sorted for distribution and available in St Weonards Church.

How does it work?

People may wonder how the magazine came about and how it is organised. Diane Williams has sent me a copy of a slim publication from 1973, the *Ross and Archenfield Rural Deanery Magazine* which lists services and a brief message from the parish priests, all 13 of them!

Our magazine, a charity, was set up as a service to the community by the church. It includes information about parish activities and is distributed as widely as possible across the benefice. Advertising helps to cover costs and the opportunity for small grants for distribution to local charities. A small committee meets three times a year to discuss matters, to review the accounts, which are formally audited, and consider the applications for the small grants. We usually have about £1500+ to distribute per annum, and the details of the grants are published in the magazine. Apart from the monthly payment to two people who set up the magazine in Publisher, and the external printing costs, all the others involved are volunteers from the church and local community. At the moment we only have committee representation from St Weonards, Orcop and Garway parishes and would welcome members from other parishes. The commitment is only three short meetings a year. Seasonal Flu Vaccinations

Over the last 3 months we have held 7 flu clinics over week-days and weekends and have vaccinated a total of 2071 people aged 50+ and patients under 50 with an existing medical condition. We received many positive comments about the smooth running of the clinics. Our staff worked incredibly hard, on top of normal working hours and we are very grateful to them. If you are over 50 and have not had your vaccination please call the surgery as we have some limited stock remaining.

Covid-19 Vaccinations

We have now begun the first phase of the NHS Covid-19 vaccination programme.

Our Practice are starting vaccinations from 19th December.

When it is the right time patients will receive a phone call or letter. This will be either from the Practice or NHS England. The letter will include all the information you will need to book appointments, including your NHS number.

The main risk factor for severe Covid infection is age, so we will be starting with our most elderly patients, and then working our way down the priority list.

Vaccinations are not taking place at the practice. The Practice is working with a group of other local practices (The Primary Care Network, PCN) to administer the vaccine from a central location in Ross on Wye. You will be given the details with your appointment.

Please do not contact the practice to get an appointment.

Information on the vaccine is available on the <u>Coronavirus (COVID-19) vaccine - NHS</u> (www.nhs.uk) website.

The surgery are doing this in addition to our normal work, so we appreciate your understanding that we may not be able to offer our usual number of appointments while our staff are also delivering the vaccine.

Dispensary

Since the beginning of the pandemic the dispensary has done everything it can to enable patients to continue to order and receive prescriptions safely and efficiently, including those high risk shielded patients getting a delivery from our wonderful volunteers and staff (thank you once again for your continued hard work).

Many of you may have noticed the new collection unit in the car park where patient medication is ready to be collected. I'm very pleased to say this is going well and has reduced queuing and waiting times but I've not quite managed to control the weather just yet, I'll keep working on that one!

In recent weeks we have encountered more and more patients registering for online pharmacies and medication services such as Pharmacy2U (P2U). The services they offer seem very appealing. However, if you choose to sign up for those services you then become a non-dispensing patient meaning all prescriptions have to be sent to this service and could result in a delay of your treatment.

My appeal to you is to consider your surgery dispensary when you sign up to these services. Every prescription they gain, is lost from us which could cause financial loss to the dispensary and could potentially affect the viability of the surgery as a whole.

I understand some patients have chosen to do this as they don't wish to put any more pressure on the surgery, this is incredibly kind natured and understandable but we are prepared for this and will happily continue to provide medication to you.

For those patients that require

a delivery service due to being clinically high risk we can arrange to help you as best we can.

Reflections on the "r number" of installing a water butt

We are bombarded daily with statistics and projections related to Covid 19. These are frequently meaningless and usually depressing. By now, we are all familiar with the dreaded reproduction number (R). It is defined, in the context of Covid, as "the average number of secondary infections produced by a single infected person". Why it does not apply to married people I do not know. We all know that, if it is less than one, we are OK and, if greater than one, we are in big trouble. Fortunately, it seems to be on the way down in England as I write this.

"R" is no more than a measure of exponential growth or decline and can be applied to almost anything. I thought it might be interesting to apply it to a recent DIY project, namely the installation of a slim-line water butt to harvest rainwater from our barn roof. Those readers who do these modest domestic jobs will know that a seemingly simple task can spawn many others. This particular assignment was no exception, and I enumerate below the manner in which matters unfolded:

- 1. Cut downpipe to install water butt diverter. Entire system of bends and pipes up to gutter level fell to the ground, not having been stuck together by the installers. By the way, my wife, Sue, was holding the ladder and one rather weighty component fell on her head. Fortunately, there was no serious injury, but I would suggest that all ladder-holders should wear hard hats. As my Marley cement had set solid after donkeys' years of storage, I riveted together the various components into a single entity of great beauty and complexity.
- 2. Upon offering up the result of Step 1 to the wall, I discovered why the bits had not been stuck together. The downpipe was now about 50mm from the wall, requiring the manufacture of wooden spacers to take up the gap.
- 3. The water butt stands on sloping concrete, so it was necessary to make a tapered wooden base to enable it to stand vertically.
- 4. The water butt was not of the highest quality, but came complete with a plastic base in four segments. These fell apart repeatedly, requiring them to be riveted together.
- 5. With the water butt now installed and looking quite tidy, it was noted that the downpipe would now discharge, once the butt was full, directly onto the aforementioned timber base. This was solved by diverting the discharge using a short piece of old gutter.

So, to sum up, one could say that the r number was 5.

Fortunately, the five spawned tasks were not, in themselves, infectious. However, it is interesting to examine what would happen if each of these spawned 5 others.

Returning to Covid, if there were only one case today, with an r number of 5, the entire population of the United Kingdom would be infected in 11 days.

So, let us all stay safe, keep an eye on the r number and make sure it stays below **ONE!**

Samos Volunteers

New Year Present FOR SALE ONLINE! £12!

A wonderfully illustrated cookbook of Middle Eastern recipes, donated generously by refugees living in Samos Refugee Camp.

This lovely tribute to the several thousand refugees living on Samos island, was published 2 years ago, now in its second edition! 100% of the £12 each book costs to buy, goes to an organisation called *Samos Volunteers* which was set up 6 years ago. The volunteers support the running of the camp, and the people living in it, who show extraordinary gratitude and resilience. A timeless limbo land.

There are usually about 40 Samos Volunteers, working for a month or more, under the guidance of 3 or 4 full time volunteers. There are 3 main buildings that each cost €500 a month to keep open; one for laundry to be done 12 hours a day; one 'school' and one warm central hub for chess, draughts, language classes, recreation, relaxing and limitless tea drinking!

Necessities, from shampoo to school books and musical instruments; money to buy fabrics for sewing, trowels for vegetable growing, ingredients for celebration meals, are bought with donated funds. There is no government financial support.

The website for the book is delightful, a flicking cookbook icon! And the ordering instructions quick and clear.

Wildlife in our Garden

We were most grateful to Diane and David Williams for enlightening us about the garden birds' moult in late summer which explains the scarcity of sight and sound of birds that we commented on the previous month. Thank you also to David and Christine Pleace for their very informative article.

As the colder weather has finally hit our garden and we have kept our bird feeders well filled up, the birds have increased in number and variety. Large numbers of blue tits and great tits are visiting the nuts and the seeds, but after an initial



visit to the nyjer seed, we have not yet seen the numbers of goldfinches that we had last year. Chaffinches gather up what is dropped from the feeders, along with robins, blackbirds, sparrows and dunnocks. On really frosty days we have been delighted to see a marsh tit (or could it be a willow tit?) on the seed feeder almost all day.

A pair of greater spotted woodpeckers are also regular feeders on the nuts. I (Margaret) was fascinated by the behaviour of a female woodpecker taking a whole nut out of the feeder, flying up into the hazel tree with it, lodging it in a crevice of the tree and then breaking it up with her beak. This was precisely how the female woodpecker who visited us regularly last winter behaved. So it has made me question, is this indeed the same pair of woodpeckers coming to our feeders again this winter? If so, do pairs of these birds stay in the same territory year on year? And if they do, where do their young go? For though we saw the young woodpeckers around the garden through the summer and early autumn, there only seems to be one pair in the garden now. Are they the young or the parents? Any ideas to our editor please!

Recently I have been struck by the wonder of camouflage in wildlife. I was trying to point out to John a treecreeper climbing up a silver birch tree opposite our kitchen window. I could follow it scuttling up the trunk as I had seen it fly over and land on the tree. But try as he might, John just couldn't see it. If you can picture in your mind's eye the bark of a silver birch tree, browny-grey with white and dark grey patches. Now look up in your bird book or Google a picture of a treecreeper. Perfect camouflage! It begs the question, though, why do other birds, like the woodpecker with their bright red plumage, or even the various members of the tit family with their bright blues and yellows, stand out for all their predators to see? It suggests to me that procuring a mate to carry on one's line is more important than not getting eaten!



Our family is divided into those who love brussel sprouts and those who hate them. I (John) am very partial to them, so Margaret has been dutifully growing them for me for several years. This year there promised to be a really good crop of not too many, but fine, large sprouts. Towards the end of October I was disturbed to see that one or two of the biggest ones had been hollowed out, leaving a shell-like exterior something like a green egg-cup! I said, "Slugs?" Margaret said, "Mice!" Going out at night with a torch failed to reveal the answer.

This process continued through November, gradually more sprouts being nibbled and hollowed out, till I thought there would be none left for Christmas. One day in mid- November, near dusk, I was heading

towards the brassica patch when I spotted a little movement. I stood quite still; then very soon a small, brown creature popped out of one of the nearby holes, stood on its hind legs, held on with its front feet to a sprout stalk and nibbled away at it. With its short tail and ears and its rounded nose, it had to be a vole. There are quite a few holes under the sprouts, so I think there is a nest there. But was it a field vole or a bank vole? By then I had gathered the remaining sprouts and put them in the freezer, so the voles are welcome to the stalks!

More Wildlife notes - from Rob Taylor of Kynastone House

I can see that some of your contributors are seeking answers to questions. John & Margaret Oubridge have asked what triggers fieldfares to migrate.

The answer is that on their breeding grounds, high in northern Europe, they typically live in birch, alder and pine forests, feeding on invertebrates, particularly earthworms, during the summer months, switching to berries in the autumn and in severe winters to apples. As the food supplies in their breeding grounds dwindle, they start migrating south - including to the UK, where we see them feeding on our more abundant berries and apples.



So, the migration is triggered - as in most species - by a lack of food on breeding grounds, often associated with autumn/winter weather, lower light levels etc. The weather is therefore an indirect, but important trigger. High winds blowing down from Scandinavia will often also act as a stimulus, leading to large numbers crossing the north sea and arriving on our eastern seaboard and then spreading westward across the UK, and finally ending up in the gardens and fields of Herefordshire.

BOOK REVIEW

Small Pleasures by Clare Chambers

A brilliant evocation of the 1950s pervades this story of a woman claiming parthenogenesis – that her daughter was born to her when she was a virgin. Author Clare Chambers hears a radio programme about an old article in *The Sunday Pictorial*, inviting women who believe that they have had a virgin birth to write in with their stories, and she weaves a fascinating tale around this premise and the genuine scientific research into this that went on at the time.

The story is more about the journalist who picks up the story than about the mother herself. Jean Swinney, approaching 40 (very much on the shelf in the 1950s) leads a dull life looking after her neurotic and demanding mother, with whom she lives, and working on the local paper, where she is the solid workhorse on the home and gardening tips, and the one who never goes to the pub after work with the rest of the staff. She is gently tolerated, benignly patronised, being regarded as in need of protection, as she threads her way through the modern world.

But her insistence on being the person who picks up the story when a local woman stakes her claim to a virgin birth changes her life. She becomes closely involved with the family: mother Gretchen, her husband Howard and the "miracle" daughter,10 year old Margaret. Jean's attachment to Margaret, and

subsequently to Howard, is encouraged by Gretchen, for reasons that become clear as the book progresses.

Jean turns detective, delving into the possible explanations for Margaret's conception, which could only have occurred while Gretchen was in a convent sanatorium with arthritis, confined to bed and diligently watched over, hawk-like, by nursing nuns 24 hours a day. And constantly in the company of the three other sick young women on her ward. Jean tracks down Gretchen's fellow patients, and for me, this brought back vivid memories of the polio epidemics that held the nation in fear each summer, and of the iconic and unimaginably grim iron lung which became the treatment of choice and filled the news pages with grey photographs of stoical sufferers locked in their metal cladding.

This book is less of a scientific mystery tale and more a compassionate examination of the drab lives of so many women in that era - here the 50s are laid bare: the dull food, the ubiquitous smoking, the gendered behaviour stereotypes, with women left lagging behind and kept in their place.

Definitely worth a read.

Garden Notes

In reply to the three witches' prophecy about Great Birnam Wood coming to Dunsinane Hill, 'Macbeth proclaims, 'That will never be. Who can impress the forest, bid the tree, Unfix his earthbound root'. He wouldn't have said that nowadays of course, because we have mini diggers at our disposal...

Around here it is the hedges not the woods that are on the move, or to be precise a 12 metre length of hedge in our neighbour's garden which runs along part of the boundary between our gardens. A wire stock fence marks the boundary, and until a few days ago, on our neighbour's side a scruffy and rather pointless path ran alongside the fence, made of a few slabs of stone but mostly heavy municipal concrete paving slabs. Beyond the path was a hedge in dire need of renovation – dead sections, gaping holes and a few brambles and nettles woven through. It was never very beautiful, and the path, which didn't really go anywhere, was full of weeds.



'I am thinking of moving this hedge closer to the fence,' announced our neighbour last week. It was an ambitious project, but with the aid of a mini digger it was achieved in only a couple of days. Each section was lifted with as large a rootball as possible, the tatty bits - quite a lot of tatty bits - discarded and the path removed. A new trench was dug, where the path used to be, and the hedge was replanted with plenty of compost and a scattering of Rootgrow (mycorrhizal fungi) around the roots to give the plants the very best chance to re-establish themselves.

For a few hours we revelled in the view that we gained of our neighbour's lovely green lawn and the view across to the distant hills. It disappeared again the next day of course, but we now have a much tidier hedge running along the boundary. We don't even have to wait for it to grow as it is already six feet high. It has given our neighbour more lawn - his pride and joy – and as it is all laurel it has given us a good solid green backdrop to our own garden.

It was a project most people would not have had the courage to try but with the soil still being warm and moist and with the plants being lifted with a large rootball, I have every confidence that it will be successful.

There is only one problem; having lost the path and all the gaps, we are no longer able to have our occasional chats over the fence. Perhaps a window needs to be cut in the hedge to enable the nattering to continue...

Pork chop with sage & apple mash

Ingredients

- 1 tsp oil
- 6 dried sage leaves
- 1 British free-range pork chop
- 1 small bramley apple
- 150g potatoes

- 125ml milk
- 2 tbsp crème fraîche
- 25g butter
- Vegetables of your choice and wholegrain mustard to serve

Method

- 1. Heat the oven to 200°C/180°C fan/gas 6.
- 2. Peeled, core and roughly chopped the apple and potatoes.
- 3. Chop 2 sage leaves. Put them in a small pan with a lid, along with the chopped apple and potato. Add the milk and just enough water to cover, then put the lid on and bring to the boil.
- 4. Turn down the heat and simmer for 10 minutes until the apple and potato are soft.
- 5. Heat the oil in a small ovenproof frying pan and season the pork chop on both sides with salt 7 pepper.
- 6. Fry the chop for 8-10 minutes on each side until just golden. Add 4 sage leaves to the pan, then transfer the pan to the oven and cook for 10 minutes until the sage leaves are crisp and the chop is just cooked through. Set aside for the chop to rest in the pan for 5 minutes.
- 7. Once the potatoes are soft, drain, reserving the cooking liquid, then return the apple, potato and sage to the pan and mash until smooth.
- 8. Mix in the crème fraîche and just enough reserved cooking liquid to give a smooth consistency. Taste and season with salt and pepper.
- 9. Serve the chop, mash, and your choice of vegetables with wholegrain mustard.
